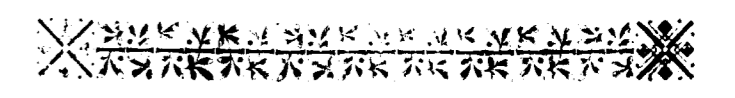

"A MAN'S SMOKE."

THE CIGARETTE SUPERSEDED BY THE PIPE.

The pipe is coming back to its own. During the Great War it began to disappear completely, for everyone, from generals to privates, smoked cigarettes. Profiteers alone were able to afford cigars. As for the pipe, but a few literary gents, who still stuck to their calabashes, and giffers, who remained true to their briars, it would have vanished completely.

Come to think of it, the cigarette seems to be a war-time smoke. Although invented hundreds of years ago by the Indians, who rolled chopped tobacco-leaf in wrappers of maguey, the cigarette was practically unknown in Britain until the Crimean War. Then the craze was all for Turkish cigarettes. The Virginia brand came later, and reached their apotheosis during the South African War.

I remember Sir W. Gordon getting up in the House just after that war and begging for a special tax on cigarettes. He declared that, had we not poisoned our soldiers with cigarettes, the war would have been over sooner. He pointed out that cigarette-smoking Spaniards had been beaten by cigar-smoking Americans, but he evidently forgot that the pipe-smoking Boer was, man for man, the heaviest consumer of tobacco on earth.

When smoking first became fashionable in England the pipe was the only method of burning tobacco. "Quality" had silver pipes. You may remember that Sir Walter Raleigh created a considerable scandal by smoking out of a silver pipe while he watched the execution of the Earl of Essex. Poorer folk smoked pipes made of walnut-shells, or of clay.

In the reign of Charles II. children went to school with their pipes in their satchels, and teachers called a halt in their studies while they smoked. In the year 1702 a Frenchman, spending an evening at a Leeds coffee-house, wrote: "I was surprised to see a sickly child of eight years old fill his pipe of tobacco and smoke as unconcernedly as a man of three score—after that, a second and a third pipe, without the least concern."

In the nineteenth century the pipe fell out of favour. In early Victorian days no gentleman smoked at all in public, and after dinner, in his own house. It was usually a cigar which he enjoyed. It was not until 1845 that a smoking-room was first established in that inner shrine of Dandydom, White's Club, while at Brooks's no smoking was allowed below the attics until the year 1881. Then, by degrees, the pipe returned to favour.

As I have pointed out, the cigarette came near to killing the pipe habit, but now, in the year of grace 1924, the pipe is coming back. Stand in a crowd anywhere, and you will find pipes are in all mouths, and my tobaccoist tells me that it is years since he sold so many pipes as he is selling to-day.

SHORT WAY WITH PROFITEERS.

As every housewife knows, the cost of living is still very high, and the profiteer continues to flourish unabashed.

In the circumstances, it is rather a pity that some ingenious lawyer cannot devise a system under which an appropriate penalty would be provided for every form of profiteering. He would find some excellent models in certain of the customs of the Middle Ages. The men of those days certainly knew how to make the punishment fit the crime.

Bakers who sold short weight bread, for example, appeared in all galleries around their necks. The wine-seller, or vintner who used a false measure also had it suspended from his neck.

But perhaps the most hapless lot was that of the fishmonger who sold bad fish. He had to stand in public with his malodorous wares suspended beneath his own nose!

If these methods of dealing with the profiteers of the past could be modernized for the benefit of their brethren of the present, the effect on the cost of living might be quite remarkable.

MERCHANT ADVENTURERS.

The recent blossoming out of Southern Rhodesia as a self-governing colony of the British Empire calls attention to the part played by merchant adventurers in the building-up of the Overseas Dominions.

Had it not been for Cecil Rhodes and the British South Africa (chartered) Company, the British flag would probably never have flown over this great territory, with its vast resources, both actual and potential. Indeed, it is just possible that Rhodesia would have fallen into German hands.

But it is not only in South Africa that the flag has followed trade. The Indian Empire was built up by the great East India Company, and it would be difficult to over-estimate the part played by the Hudson's Bay Company in the early history of Canadian development.

Going back still further, the Empire owes a great debt to the merchant adventurers of Elizabethan days—men like Hawkins, Drake, and Sir Walter Raleigh, who did so much to open up the world to our colonies.

It is a pity that the modern-day merchant adventurer is so seldomly aided in the way of removing a fly from your friend's forehead—with a hatchet.

KILL OR CURE!

MEDICINES AND DEADLY EXPLOSIVES FROM COAL.

If you have a headache a small dose of antipyrin will generally relieve the pain, while for a really severe attack of neuralgia a few grains of phenacetin are by far the best remedy known.

Aspirin has gained a well-deserved reputation as a cure for rheumatism, while salicylic acid is prescribed for gout.

All these are coal-tar products. Indeed, half the drugs in the Pharmacopoeia are nowadays extracted from that black, ill-smelling stuff which was formerly run down the drains as waste.

It was in 1825 that aniline was discovered. "Anil" is the Portuguese word for "indigo," and aniline is now the base from which dyes of every sort and colour are extracted.

What is perhaps the most curious point about this amazing treasure-house of dyes, drugs, oils, and antiseptics is that, while some manufacturers have been using it for the purposes of healing, others have been busily extracting from it the most appalling material for dealing death and destruction.

Almost the first product which comes away when you begin to heat or distil coal-tar is methyl benzene or toluol. From this is made trinitrotoluol, better known as T.N.T., one of the most terrific of explosives.

Lyddite, first used in the Sudan, is a somewhat similar explosive. To obtain it, pure phenol or carbolic acid is mixed with sulphuric acid, and the temperature raised to boiling point. Nitric acid is added and the whole cooled, the result being a mass of yellow crystals. These, by the way, are sometimes used for adulterating beer.

But the list of contrast does not end there. Lyddite, as has been explained, is made partly from carbolic acid, which is one of the best-known disinfectants in the world, and saves in hospital at least as many lives as lyddite destroys on the battlefield.

THE WITCHING HOUR.

The clock on the dining-room mantelpiece had just struck midnight.

As the last stroke merged into silence the watcher looked up from his meal and listened intently. The fire had died down almost to extinction, and the full moon, shining through the French windows, threw eerie shadows across the deserted room.

A slight sound, hardly discernible to ordinary ears, came from the outside of the window, as if something were scraping on the stonework underneath the window.

Instantly the watcher was on his feet, crouching in the shadow of a big armchair, his head on one side, every sense on the alert.

While he listened thus, the moon disappeared behind a cloud. When it appeared again, a shadow was silhouetted against the window; and even as the watcher, his heart palpitating, descried the mysterious appearance, the window slowly began to open noiselessly. An authority on such matters wrote: "The remarkable similarity in customs all over Europe points to the conclusion that tree-worship was an important element in the early religion of mankind, especially of the Aryan stock, and the singular uniformity of rites and ceremonies which can easily be shown to exist in widely separated countries warrants us in believing that they cannot have changed much from very remote ages; and that the practices continued down to a very recent period—some even among ourselves—were substantially identical with the rites and ceremonies observed by Egyptians, Etruscans, Greeks, and Romans."



STACK MEASUREMENT.—To find the contents of an oblong stack with perpendicular ends, multiply the length by the average width (between bottom and ends) and the product by the height from the ground to the eaves. For the top multiply the area at the eaves by half the height to the right. The weight may be ascertained very accurately by measuring the cubic contents of a tray, and from this calculating the height at the top.
