When they finally reach the lower layers of the atmosphere they part with a good deal of their energy and in doing so they give rise to a dracharge which is in appearance vermuch life that of a vacuum tube. It is this discharge which produces th flaming curtains and brightly flacture; rays of different colours which stir kind every time they appear in the

Some astronomers are inclined to believe that the Aurora is due not only to the discharge of electrified particles from the sun, but also to a discharge of similar particles from the earth itself. They think that the entrance of these particles into our atmosphere over the parts of the globe on which the sun is shining set up a compensating outward flow of electricity over other portions of the

earth's surface. Some hold that it is this outward flow rather than the inward flow that makes the Aurora Borealis visible to us, and others are inclined to the belief that both the entering and the emerging charges have a hand in producing this remarkable phenomenon. Danes. Every one of the dogs died. Tropical Africa swarms with intenselv poisonous snakes. There is a black one which lives in trees and bill's many a negro honey-hunter. Another, mottled grey in colour, destroys great numbers of goats and cat-There is a small black-andwhite cobra which leaps at you as you pass, and a great, greenish snake which hangs from a brough over the

path and strikes down at your head.

But of all African snakes perhaps the hideous puff adder is the most dread-Parts of British Guiana and Brazil are almost paved with snakes. In the dry uplands live the pit-vipers, bett.r known as rattlers; lower down rasides the huge, yellow bush-master, bright yellow and eleven feet long, whose bite is almost instant death. What is worse, like the great king

cobra of the East, this creature attacks on sight. Then in the swamps luck monstrous anacondas, of which the Indians live in deadly fear. They are the largest snakes in existence. Colonel Fawcett killed one no less than sixty-eight feet in length, and with a body more than three feet in circumference. In the southern parts of the United

States that sluggish yet deadly water viper, the mocassin, is terribly common. I have counted fourteen lying coiled on a river bank in a length of thirty paces. Rattlers are plentiful right up to the Canadian border. Martinique is infested with the aw

means death in twenty minutes. Even in the warmer countries of Europe poisonous snakes are far more plentiful than is usually supposed. In Bosnia, for instance, scores of human beings, and thousands of cattle, were killed yearly by snakes, until, in 1966 the Government offered a reward of about sixpence for each snake's heal, and so, to some extent, subdued the

plague.

At present the number of human beings killed yearly by snakes is probably not much less than sixty thousand. The death-roll from this cause is certainly four or five times as great as the toll taken by all other will creatures put together.

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
