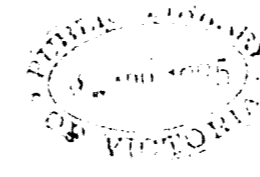

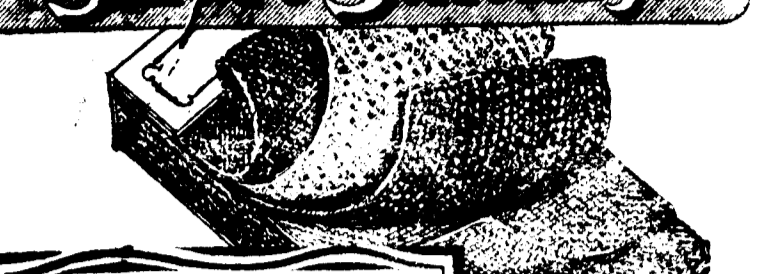

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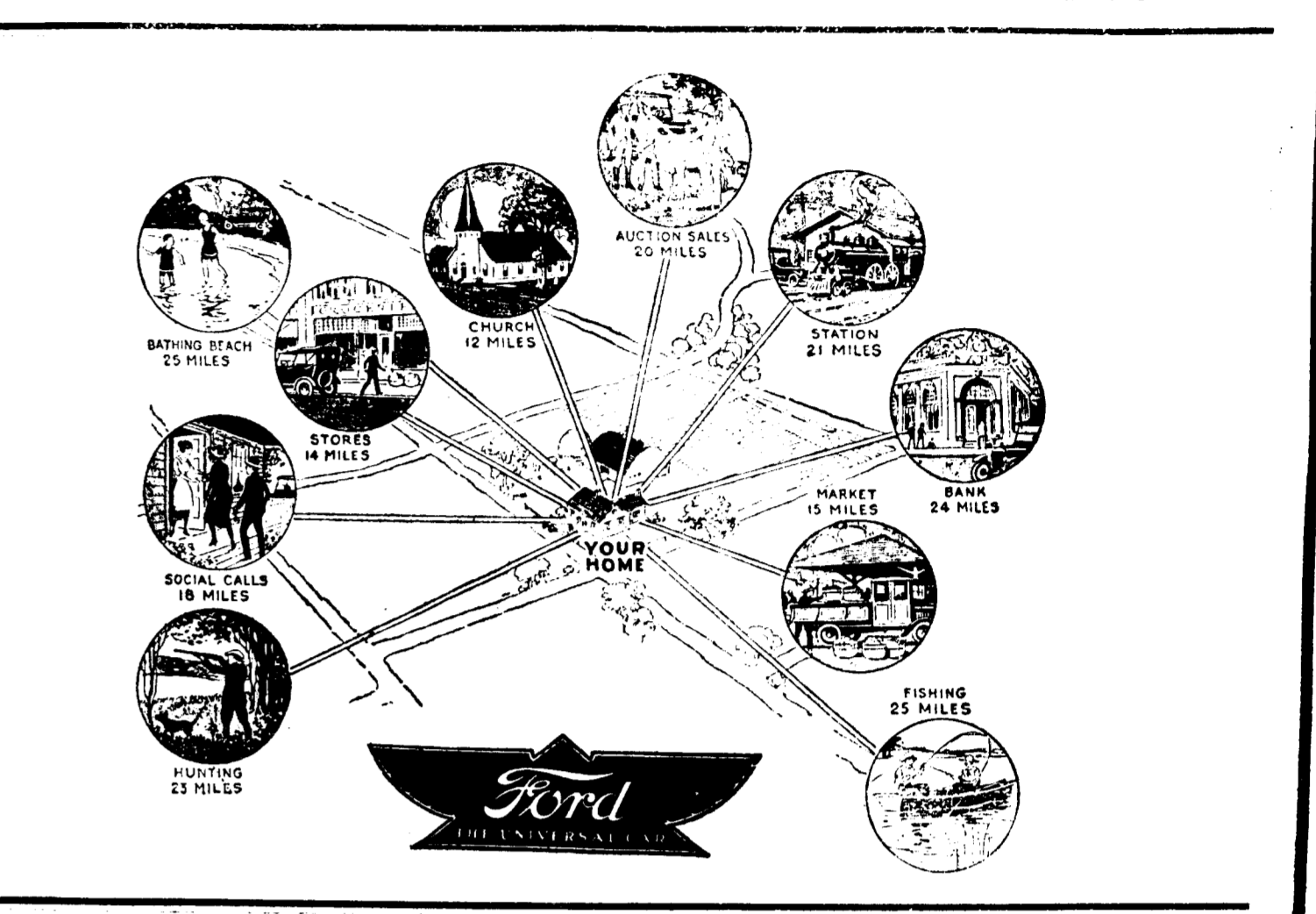

**RIPONSHIRE CRICKET COMPETITION. FINAL COMMENCED. BUANGOR V. BEAUFORT.**

Buangor and Beaufort, who at the end of the rounds had obtained 29 and 27 points respectively and subsequently defeated Hagley and Waterloo in the semi-finals, met in the final of the Ripon cricket competition at the Beaufort Park on Saturday afternoon. There was an attendance of only about 100 spectators, and the play was not able for a batting collapse on both sides. The Buangor skipper was J. Murray, and H. V. Martin captained Beaufort. Messrs. A. Tregown (Western) and W. P. Tongue (Hagley) officiated as umpires. The Beaufort batsmen supplied afternoon tea for the players, and were thanked by the Buangor captain, who said the members of his team appreciated their kindness very much. The Buangor captain won the toss, and sent Beaufort in to bat. The local team was disposed of for the small total of 40 runs. Nearly all the batsmen were cheaply dismissed; W. J. Hamley (17 not out) being the only one to reach double figures. A. J. Saph was next on the list with 8. C. Maher and L. O'Neil did some smart fielding, and D. M. Rogers was thrown out in good style by W. Foster. J. Murray was in good bowling form, and captured 7 wickets for 16 runs. W. Murray taking 2 for 21. The scores at various stages of the innings were: 5 for 24, 6 for 31, 8 for 31, 10 for 40. With the exception of G. W. Green, who batted freely for a well-made tally of 31, the Buangor batsmen were not up to their usual form. W. Murray (11) and J. Murray (10) were the only other two players to get into double figures, and their scores were far below expectations. Buangor's total was only 40. W. J. Hamley took 1 wicket for 15 runs, N. Miller 3 for 12, R. Pringle 1 for 15, and A. J. Saph (who bowled six overs) 0 for 18. The progress totals were: 1 for 11, 2 for 51, 3 for 56, 4 for 57, 5 for 62, 10 for 62. A word of praise is due to D. M. Rogers for his excellent fielding and for the smart throw-in with which he scattered J. Murray's stumps. Green and Foster were caught out by Hamley, the last catch being particularly difficult one. At 5 p.m. the light was becoming embarrassing owing to the pine trees casting long shadows across the field. Beaufort again went to the wicket, and when play finished for the day they had only scored 36 runs for the loss of 7 wickets, and their best batsman had been cheaply dismissed. A. D. Rogers and E. Meyer, with 8 each, obtained the most runs. The match is to be continued at Beaufort to-day (Saturday), and unless the local batsmen wags with unexpected vigor and the Buangor team has another batting collapse, which is unlikely, the home side is certain to be defeated. L. O'Neil and C. Maher again showed great keenness in the field, and early in his innings T. Williams twice narrowly escaped being run out. The unfinished bowling averages were: J. Murray, 3 for 13; W. Murray, 3 for 22. Progress totals were: 1 for 4, 2 for 14, 3 for 25, 6 for 32, 7 for 36. Details of the play are as follows:—First innings—Beaufort—H. V. Martin, b. W. **THE MAGIC VITAMINE.**

At a recent meeting of the American Chemical Society, Professor W. Eddy took from his pocket a small vial and passed it round among the assembled chemists.

"All they could see was a small quantity of white powder at the bottom of a bottle. Yet it created a sensation, since it was the first vitamin that anyone had ever seen or handled.

An amount no more than three-hundredths of a milligram, which is about as much of the powder as could be caught on the point of a pin, given every day to a young rat starved by living on deficient diet, would cause it to grow again at a normal rate.

**HOW TO ENJOY YOUR SWIM.**

Too much bathing—even one swim too many or one taken at the wrong time—is injurious and destroys the benefits of a holiday.

"Many holiday-makers make a great mistake in bathing as soon as they reach the seaside without giving themselves time to become acclimated to the sea air," said a prominent physician.

"Twenty-four hours at least should elapse before the first dip, otherwise the bather may contract a heavy chill.

Others is always a tendency to bathe too soon after meals. A full four, and if possible, two hours should elapse. A bath should never be taken when one is heated. This is a frequent cause of cramp in the water. Ten to fifteen minutes is long enough to spend in the water. Even a few extra minutes produces a feeling of fatigue that undoes all the good of the swim."
