WRITERS AT FULL SPEED

'SICK HEADACHE.'

Sick headache, scientifically known as migraine, causes more discomfort, more days in bed, more failures to get social engagements than almost any other of the lesser complaints.

Sick headache is usually a family complaint; it is inherited and is perhaps the result of faulty hygiene throughout many generations. The headaches usually begin in childhood, occur on an average of once a month, and usually decrease in severity and frequency after the age of forty years.

Proper living, though instituted later in life, will often cause the headaches to be fewer and milder. In a general way, migraine victims should eat little meat, eat plenty of vegetables and fruit, drink milk and olive oil, and then exercise sufficiently to keep from getting fat.

The least important measures relate to the treatment of the attacks themselves. In some persons, but not nearly all, they can be cut short by taking, at the very onset, a dose of a medicine which a doctor may safely prescribe.

Coal tar remedies may relieve the pain for the time, but it is better to avoid them as they tend to cause the attacks to be more frequent and prolonged, and to undermine the general health.

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LOCKED IN.

AMUSING ESCAPES OF ACCIDENTAL PRISONERS.

Of all places to be locked in, accidentally, a refrigerator is about the least desirable. A car assistant has had an alarming experience while working in a large refrigerating chamber attached to the cafe.

By some means or other, while he was busy, the massive door of the chamber swung to, and made him a prisoner in the icy atmosphere. The door is a massive one, twelve inches thick, through which he could not effectively make himself heard.

He gathered up an armful of something, which he wrapped around himself in order to keep out the piercing cold. In the very short time he was in a state of collapse, but, fortunately, another assistant had cause to go to the refrigerator and there found his half-frozen colleague.

Accidental imprisonments in meat and fruit boats' refrigerators are and are carefully guarded against, and are extremely rare.

An apprentice on one of these boats told the writer, once, of a foolish trick played on an unpopular youth by the other apprentices.

It was the unpopular one's first voyage and the others led up to their prank by telling gruesome tales of men who had been locked in the refrigerators and had been found stiff and frozen a few hours afterwards.

When the ship had unloaded her cargo, the unpopular apprentice was sent on a bogus errand into one of the chambers and the door was suddenly locked on him. He was left a prisoner for only a few minutes, but when the door was opened again he was almost hysterical with fright.

With great minuteness, he described the terrible grip of the cold through what he thought was about twenty minutes' imprisonment.

His tale was received as a huge joke, for when he was locked in, the refrigerating apparatus was "silent" and the atmosphere was at the same temperature as outside. The apprentice's imagination had done the rest.

Freedom was still a long way off, however. The caretaker's rooms were at the top of the premises which were shut off from the suite in which the prisoners were. Loud beating on the street door, hollering in chorus from the street, and telephone calls were equally useless for awakening the sleeping caretaker.

Finally, a fire escape was sent for, and firemen climbed up to the caretaker's window and roused him to come down and unlock the doors.

By the time the prisoners were free it was three o'clock in the morning. A direct rescue by ladder had to be effected on another occasion when a girl clerk, working high up in a block of offices, was locked in while working late one Saturday afternoon.

When she found that she was a prisoner, she telephoned a friend who sent a policeman to the rescue. Ladders of various lengths were brought along to try and reach the prisoner's window, but they were all too short, and many hours had elapsed before one sufficiently long was produced for her descent from the window.

A GENIUS WITHOUT KNOWING IT.

The finest violin in the world has been bought by M. Mischa Elman for £10,000. It is a Stradivarius.

Antonio Stradivarius, of Cremona, lived from 1644 to 1737, and spent most of his life making stringed instruments. His name, Nicholas Amati, whose fame is generally swallowed up in that of the gifted pupil, had brought fiddle-making near perfection. Stradivarius achieved that perfection.

He was a quiet figure of a man, tall and thin, caring for little except his home life and his work. In winter he wore a white woollen cap and a white leather apron; in summer a white cotton cap and leather apron. His industry was stupendous. He was frugal to a degree.

The fiddles from the Cremona workshop came as from a factory to the chief towns of Europe. We are told that in London in the eighteenth century there was a musician who was also a music dealer called Cerretti. To him arrived in the way of trade a consignment of Stradivarius violins. He returned the greater number of them, as he could not dispose of them at the price asked, which was four pounds apiece.

Stradivarius had no idea he was a genius. He looked upon himself as a maker of as good a fiddle as could be produced.
