At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, a letter was read from the Town Clerk, City of Ballarat, MAIN LEAD. forwarding press report of conference in reference to the charging of a flat rate by the State Electricity Cr. Troy-The resolution was that

each set of delegates ask their councils to favor a flat rate, and that the council ask members of Parliament to support it. The flat rate meant the same rate all over the State. Nearly every council carried that resolution, but at the same time, he would not like to see it carried, as it was making councils look ridiculous and was not practicable. It had not the remotest chance of being brought into force.
Cr. Mackenzie supported Cr. Troy, and said the current would be

continually rising in price as it came practicable if they had decided on a flat rate of 1/ all over the State, but Yallourn and Melbourne would be paying far more than it cost. They might as well say they should have the State coal at the same price all over the State. They had to pay a different rate everywhere for telephones. The Government had to be guided by its technical advisers to guide the fools in the country. (Laughter). Cr. Sinclair supported the flat rate, as he had always supported decentralisation. Crs. Troy and Mackenzie were making out that Ripon was the most brainy council in the State. (Laughter). Why should they pay more for a State commodity than Melbourne? Why did not the

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




