BUANGOR.

In reply to local representations that the B-lyragon school should remain open, the Education Department has replied that the matter has been carefully considered, but in view of the very small attendance, the continuance of the school is not warranted. The department was not prepared to alter its decision. SWIMMING.

LOCAL CLUB FORMED.

The public meeting held in the Shire Hall, Beaufort, on Friday night, 15th inst., for the purpose of forming a swimming club, was attended by 19 residents, including a number of ladies. An apology was received for the absence of Mr S. Young.

Mr W. R. Glover was voted to the chair, and explained the object of the meeting.

Mr A. J. Saph consented to act as secretary for the evening.

Dr. S. E. Humphreys moved that a swimming club be formed. Seconded by Mr W. J. Bruce Johnson, and carried.

Mr Johnson moved that the newly-formed swimming club accept the responsibility of conducting the baths, and that a committee be formed to draft regulations to place before the shire council. Seconded by Dr. Humphreys, and carried.

It was decided that the same sub-committee as recently met the council be re-appointed to meet them again, namely, Dr. Humphreys, Messrs S. Young, W. Glover, F. G. Green, and A. J. Saph, with the addition of Messrs A. L. Wotherspoon, and W. J. Bruce Johnson.

Mrs R. T. Macdonald expressed the opinion that on Wednesdays a period should be reserved for ladies, between 2.30 and 4 p.m.

Mr F. G. Green suggested that there be no swimming on Sundays, between the hours of 11 a.m. and mid-day, 2.30 and 3.30 p.m., and 7 and 8 p.m.

The sub-committee was instructed to meet the North riding councillors on Monday about 2.30 p.m.

The next meeting was arranged for Tuesday evening, when it was arranged, the election of officers would take place, and the regulations would be drafted.

A vote of thanks to the chair, moved by Mr Johnson, closed the meeting.

TUESDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

The newly-formed swimming club met at the Shire Hall on Tuesday night, and Mr W. R. Glover was voted to the chair. Seventeen residents were present, including a number of ladies.

Mr W. J. Bruce Johnson was elected secretary pro tem.

The chairman reported that the deputation from the club had waited on the councillors of the North riding on Monday, and had been treated well. The council had agreed to give them free light and water, and thought the councillors were pleased that the club had come into existence. They recognised that the baths had not received fair treatment from the boys, and that the behaviour at the baths would be controlled, and the property taken care of by the club. It was to the best interests of the club to do that. He was sure they would have the hearty support of the council in anything they did in regard to improving the baths.

Mr Johnson, in supplementing the chairman's report, said the council would give them a switch, with which to switch on the light as they thought fit. The council would supply the

fighting material if the club provided the poles, and he understood that Mr J. Day had already promised the poles. While the council were not pumping from the Park, there would be restrictions on the water supply, because it would cost £20 to fill the baths by pumping especially. When pumping was in progress, and it was necessary to change the water, the council would have no hesitation in filling the baths. The council suggested that a gravitation pipe be laid from the Goldfields Reservoir, as by that means they would only have to turn on a tap to get an abundant supply of water. Roughly, the estimated cost of this was about £30 or £40. Some pipes from an old pumping plant were still in existence, but putting the pipe through the bank would be the greatest expense.

The chairman—He understood that the old pipes were there for half the way down.

Mr Johnson—There was a 3-inch pipe a third of the distance. They would not be able to do much with the water this year. If they got the gravitation scheme from Mr. Cole, there would be plenty of water. The council would still remain the owners of the baths. The members of the club would conduct the baths, and the council would discuss any amendment of the regulations with the council. The council were willing to have certain days set aside exclusively for the use of the club for carnivals, etc.

Cr. Sinclair—The council did not think it advisable to hand the baths over solely to the club. The council should be the custodians of the baths in the interests of the ratepayers. The council realised that the baths belonged to the ratepayers, and would give the club all the assistance they could. They could not expect the council to pay the whole of the expenses. Altogether it was very satisfactory.

Mr Johnson—The council had no objection to mixed bathing, if the club accepted the responsibility. The council had also promised to put the road to the baths in good order.
