PUBLIC MEETING.

RACECOURSE, AEROPLANE LANDING GROUND, PLUMPTON COURSE GROUND.

Twenty-three residents of Beaufort and district were present at the Mechanics' Institute on Thursday night, to discuss a proposal to sell the racecourse at Waterloo Flat, and establish a new racecourse, a landing ground for aeroplanes, and a plump-ton coursing ground on the common on the Raglan road, close to Beaufort.

Cr. D. F. Troy (shire president) was voted to the chair, on the motion of Mr C. Vowles, president of the Jockey Club, and Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair.

The chairman—it was a matter that required a good deal of thought, and there were several bodies to be consulted. He could not commit the shire to anything, although the matter would be fully discussed, but as a citizen, his personal opinion was that the movement was a rattling good one, and he would support it as a citizen all he could.

Mr G. Dent was elected secretary to the movement. In answer to Cr. Sinclair, Mr Vowles said the racing club was in existence at present, as far as he knew.

Mr A. Parker said he was one of the trustees of the racecourse, and his co-trustees were Messrs E. Welsh and J. R. Wotherspoon. He was fully in accord with the movement, but the first step was to call a meeting of the Jockey Club to ascertain if that body was willing to have the course sold. The next step would be to get the common managers to agree to the use of their land. Then the trustees would have to take further steps, as a special bill would have to be brought through Parliament. There were 142 acres in the present racecourse, and it was leased at 4/6 per acre per year. That was all the revenue the club had. The course had been practically useless for years, and the gate receipts had been as low as £7. He thought the common managers would insist on retaining the grazing rights of their paddock, but the race club should insist on not being charged 10 per cent. on the gate takings. Certain formalities had to be gone through before he, as a trustee, could take any steps to further the movement.

A letter was read from Mr J. R. Wotherspoon, one of the trustees, who stated that he was in accord with the movement, and would not put any obstruction in the way of selling the course.

Cr. H. P. Mackenzie wrote, expressing his sympathy with the movement, and stating his views on the matter as a common manager.

Cr. Sinclair moved that the Jockey Club be asked to call a meeting of members, with a view of instructing the trustees to ask the Government's permission to sell the present racecourse, and invest the money in improvements, etc. on another plot of ground near Beaufort. The council, he thought, would get on with the matter of a landing ground at once.

In answer to Mr W. Fitzpatrick, Mr Young said the land at Waterloo Flat was a racecourse reserve at the present time, vested in trustees. The motion was seconded by Mr E. Nash, and carried unanimously.

Cr. Troy—the people who brought the movement forward picked the common from a horsing point of view, but supposing an expert condemned it as a landing ground for aeroplanes, would they be prepared to go on with it?

Mr Parker—that rested with the common managers.

Cr. Sinclair—their biggest obstacle would be the Government. Mr Parker—He thought Sir Alexander Peacock could manage that part of it. The common managers should meet.

Mr E. S. Crouch—the aerodrome proposal, he thought, would be the only exercise on which the Jockey Club could get the money from the Government for the sale of the land.

Mr Parker—they had given it in other places.

Cr. Troy—the expenditure of a few hundred pounds on the common would improve the property a great deal, but it went without saying that the club would not receive any rental.

Cr. Sinclair—the North riding members thought it an excellent proposal, personally.

Mr Crouch—He was very much in favor of the proposal, but Government bodies had been very strong in refusing to alienate reserve lands.

Mr W. R. Glover—they would find it would take four or five years to get a bill through the House permitting them to sell the racecourse, unless the Government gave them special consideration, because of the aerodrome proposal.

Mr S. Young moved that, in the event of the Jockey Club agreeing to the course proposed, that the council be approached with a view to allowing a racecourse to be established on the common, and the facilities provided for a plump-ton coursing ground and an aerodrome. Personally, he was more interested in the aerodrome part of it, as aviation had come to stay, and every town which did not have a landing ground would be left of the map. It was a first-class proposal. Any risk of cows on the common being killed by planes could be covered by insurance.

Mr T. Rodgers seconded the motion, which was carried.

Mr W. O'Sullivan said he thought all the members of the Jockey Club would agree to the proposal. Mr Young would be better to the Jockey Club, and the report of the committee as to the suitability of the ground.

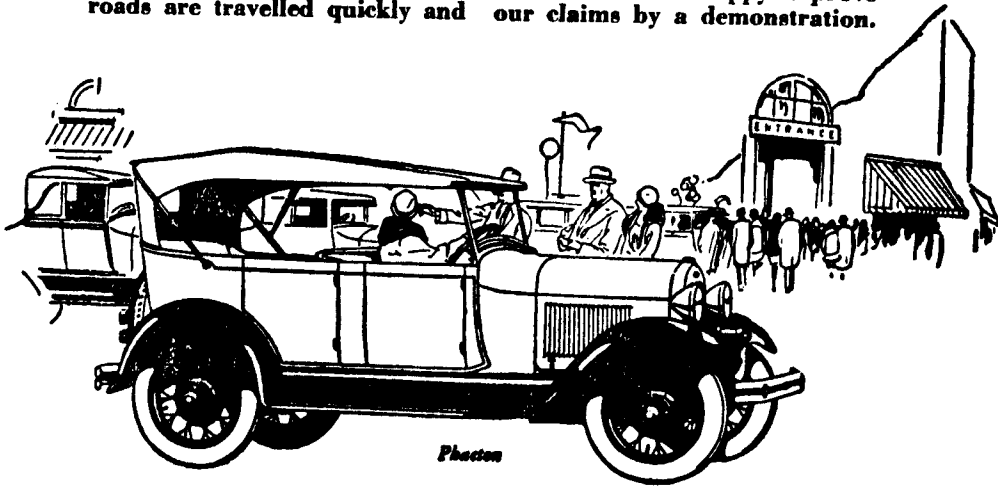

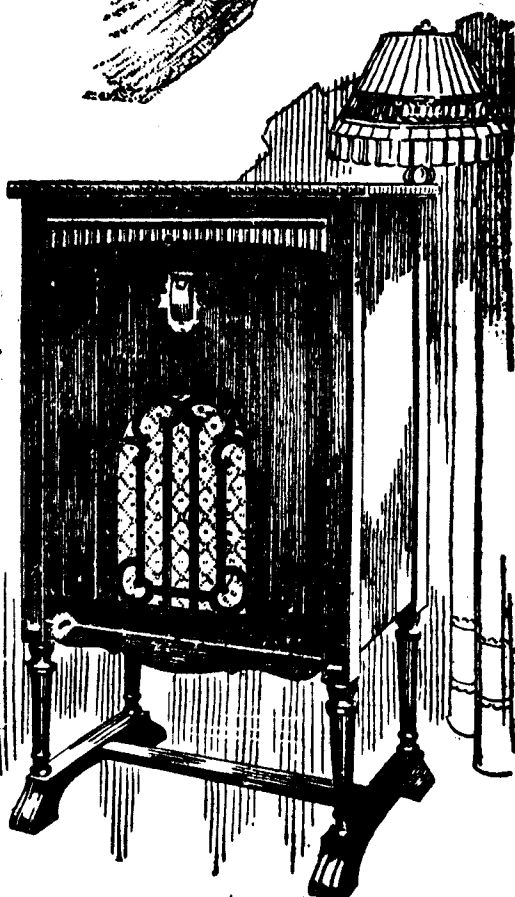
