ELMHURST DEFEATED BY RAGLAN.

The final match of the Ripon football competition attracted a good attendance at the Raglan Sports Ground on Saturday afternoon. About 75 motor cars lined the arena, and the gate receipts amounted to £18. The opening teams were Raglan (minor premiers) and Elmhurst. Although the weather was very threatening and windy, the rain held off until half-time; the game being well-contested up to that stage, and Elmhurst having a lead of two points. Heavy showers fell in the interval and thereafter, and made the field very slippery and the ball difficult to handle. This gave the heavier team (Raglan) an advantage which they put to the best use in the third term, and obtained a lead of 22 points. There was much crowded and scrambling play in the closing quarter, during which the teams had an equal number of scoring shots, and Elmhurst succeeded in reducing their opponents' lead to 29 points. Raglan won premiership honors by that liberal margin. The game was well umpired by W. Young, of the Ballarat League, and the other officials were—Goal umpires, Messrs W. J. Haplin and W. Smith; boundary umpires, Messrs H. Hovey and J. Clough; timekeepers, Messrs J. J. Dunn and C. M. Flynn. The Raglan captain was R. Beggs, and Hyde had charge of the Elmhurst team. Elmhurst were without the services of their smart and tireless little rover, Pyke (who was suffering from a scalded foot), and Raglan put their best possible combination into the field.

The game opened with a strong wind blowing diagonally across the field, and slightly favoring the southern goal, towards which the home team were kicking. Raglan immediately took the ball forward, and scored a try. E. Drew went out of bounds near the uprights. Raglan resumed their attack, and scored a try. E. Drew kicked after, and a snapshot. J. Thorpe, Irving, and Grant again sent the leather into position, and E. Drew's shot was marked by Van Every just in front of the opening. A. Wilkinson took the ball forward with a dash, and added a single to the home side's tally. Gillingham and Drew's shot was ineffective. McLinden and McCann sent the leather to Bryant, who registered Elmhurst's third goal. The visitors resumed the offensive, and Sandiant snapped a behind for them. Dawson then did a dash which went out of bounds close to the Elmhurst goal. After give and take play in the centre, Elmhurst forced the ball over the right boundary close to their objective. Cluding several opponents very smartly, E. Dawson raised one hand for Elmhurst. Connor sent the ball to Raglan's forward line, and Drew's kick went harmlessly across the front of the goal-posts. 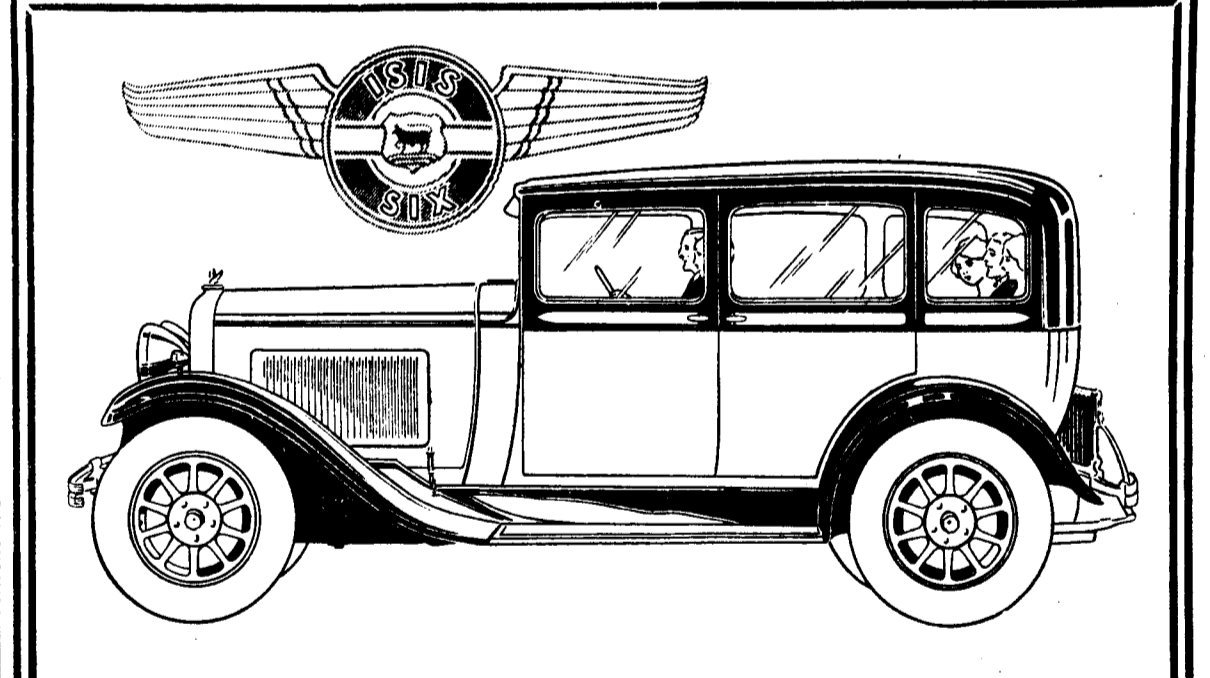

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FOOTBALLERS' DINNER.
BEAUFORT AND LEARNMOUTH TEAMS ENTERTAINED.

There was a large gathering of footballers and supporters at the Railway Hotel, Beaufort, on Saturday night, when the members of the Learnmouth and Beaufort teams (premiers and minor premiers respectively) in the Learnmouth district competition) were entertained at a poultry dinner by Mr and Mrs W. Liston.

After justice had been done to the tasty meal provided, the loyal toast was honored.

The chairman (Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair) proposed "Learnmouth, Premiers of the Association." He was delighted, he said, to offer Learnmouth his congratulations on having won the premier-ship fairly and squarely. They were at the bottom of the list until they met Waurara, and then came to the top. He was proud to see the "Fire Brigade Football Club," because he was a representative of Victorian firemen on the Country Fire Board, and he hoped that in years to come, the firemen would be invited to Learnmouth and give that team a good looking. (Laughter).

The Beaufort seniors might have won the silver football this year, but they would keep going, and it would be their having won the premier-ship between the Beaufort and Learnmouth clubs would exist for many years to come, and that the members of the team would have long life and prosperity. He coupled the toast with the name of the captain (Mr J. Ryan).

Mr Ryan had been playing in Ballarat, and knew too many tricks for the country boys, and it would be impossible to get a better captain.

Mr Jack Ryan, in response, thanked Cr. Sinclair for the nice remarks he had passed about the Learnmouth Club, and for his congratulations on their having won the premier-ship. It was very pleasing to him to be in the proud position of being captain of the premier side. He considered it a big honor for any team to win a premier-ship, and to win it against opposition like there was in this association this year was a big thing. Every one of the five teams had a chance. Little did most people think, half-way through the season, that Learnmouth had a chance. They had then a good team, but experienced great difficulty in placing 18 men in the field. They never lost after they got their side together, and that they did at the right time. They had to win five matches in succession to gain the premier-ship. It looked a big thing for them to do, and he was very proud of the Learnmouth boys for the way they had played in those five matches. They had an improved side, had played the game, and trained hard, and it was a case at the last of "the survival of the fittest." Learnmouth men were in a bit better condition, and that was why Beaufort lost the match. Beaufort had had three weeks' rest, and that was a big handicap, whilst the Learnmouth boys were playing every Saturday but one. One thing he admired about their opponents was that Learnmouth got congratulated all round from Beaufort, and the defeated team made no excuses. He congratulated Beaufort on the way they had played during the season, and on being the runners-up. Last year he represented Learnmouth at the dinner given to Beaufort as premiers, and Cr. Sinclair was the chairman on that occasion, and had a good deal to say about the club going through the season undefeated. He (Mr Ryan) said, "Look out for Learnmouth next year." Little did he expect at the time that they would be premiers, but they had the makings of a team. He had an idea that they would be playing with them this year. He thanked Beaufort for the sporting way in which they had taken their defeat.

At the call of Cr. Sinclair, three hearty cheers were given for Mr Ryan.

In a humorous speech, the chairman presented a "certificate and blue ribbon to a district 'sport' for, he alleged, being the champion 'tale-pitcher' of the district, and the recipient made an equally witty response.

The chairman also referred with regret to the absence of Mr A. J. Saph, with whom, he said, there was no better "sport" in any town in Victoria.

"The Beaufort Football Team and Captain W. Gray," was proposed by Mr Dan Ryan, who said it gave him great pleasure to do so; Beaufort being absolutely the best "sports" in the competition. They took their knocks and gave them a return, he said. He hoped they would stick to the competition, although he took the count in the final match. Beaufort players took their knocks as all men should, and forgot them a return on the next day. He congratulated Learnmouth on winning the premier-ship so fairly and squarely. Beaufort were not only beaten in the final, but Learnmouth lasted longer. Jack Ryan knew how to handle a team, and the Beaufort boys were beaten in every part of the game. He hoped that next year they would meet in the final again, and that Beaufort would get the silver football back again.

Mr J. E. Wallish also responded; complimenting Learnmouth on winning the premier-ship, and the captain on the way he had handled the team. Beaufort had faded out and lost confidence in one another, and as they were going down the grade, Learnmouth was coming up. Beaufort lost the premier-ship in the semi-final at Lexton. They said they had previously beaten Learnmouth with 14 men and a few stragglers, and they went to Lexton with a weak side just when Learnmouth were starting to climb up the hill. Lexton did the right thing in the final by boring in on Beaufort, and playing hard, vigorous football.

"The Host and Hostess" was proposed by Cr. Sinclair. Last year, he said, Mr Liston gave 20 medals to the premiers, and Beaufort got them. At the beginning of this season he said he was going to give a dinner each to the premiers and runners-up of the Learnmouth and Ripon competitions. Next Saturday the Raglan and Elmhurst boys would be similarly entertained here. It was very fine to have a citizen like that. Mr Liston was one of the best publicans they had had in Beaufort, and as a hostess, there was nothing better than Mrs Liston. She had given them an excellent dinner. He hoped the business would prosper, and that Mr and Mrs Liston would enjoy the best of health.

In responding, Mr Liston said this kind of thing helped to preserve friendship between rival clubs. Beaufort were beaten, and that was the end of it, but he warned Learnmouth to be certain here. It was very fine to have a citizen like that. Mr Liston had got to rather a low ebb this year, and the previous season was the best they ever had. Certain ones tried to find fault with one or two little mistakes, and as soon as the club started, ran round the town crying "stinking fish." They had had their "go," and next year the team would go into the field stronger than ever. If things were not going quite right, and they got short of a few shillings, they would always get pulled through. All of them had
