employee, Ararat, stated that he remembered the 3rd November last. At about 4.15 p.m , in company with his brother, Arthur Cyril Isaac, he was riding a motor cycle in a westerly direction along the Ararat road, about three miles from Beaufort. His brother was riding a motor cycle about 20 yards in front of him. They had just come off the deviation of the road on to the metal, when he saw his brother start to wobble. He appeared to have struck a hole, and witness saw him trying to straighten up the bicycle, and he second to twist the front wheel right around practically square with the bicycle, and then fell off on the roadway, and seemed to land on his chin and nose. When witness came to deceased, he was lying on his face, and was unconscious. He turned deceased over, and wiped the blood off his face, and as there was no one coming, he jumped on his cycle and went back along the road about 100 yds. to where some men were camped at the road works. He got two men to come down in a car, and they put deceased in the car and brought him back to Dr. Humphreys' surgery at Beaufort, and then he was removed to the hospita!. At the time the accident occurred, his brother and he were travelling about 15 miles per hour, as the deviation of the road was rough, and they had to steady down. About three miles on the Ballarat side of Beaufort, he had trouble with the cycle. It would not null, and had to be pushed into Beaufort, where it was repaired. The mechanic who repaired it stated that he could not stop the engine when it was started, but after adjusting the control between the handle and the carburetta, the machine was all right, and went along all right till the ac-

cident occurred. H's brother was an experienced rider, and as far as with news was aware, had not previously had an accident. His brother was perfectly sober, and like witness, was a total abstainer from alcohol.

To Mr Troy—No other person wit nessed the accident, because witness called out, and no one came on the

The acting-coroner (Mr Troy) returned a finding to the effect that death was due to a fracture of the skull, sustained when deceased was thrown from a motor cycle, on the Ararat road, on the 3rd November, 1929; and that the injuries received were accidental, and no blame was attachable to anyone.

Williamson, a person lawfully bound to appear and givevidence at the Supreme Court at Ballarat, on 10th Decr., 1929, in the case against Lily Belter was a second case against Lily Baker, upon a presentment for larceny from the person; the said Jas. Williamson having on 25/11/1929 been bound in the sum of £100 to appear and give evidence.

Massey James Lynn: the alleged offence having taken place at Middle Creek. The accused were remanded to appear before the Police Magistrate (Mr Elligett) at Beaufort on Monday, 2nd December. Both accused were allowed bail on entering into a recognisance of £50 on the first charge, with another surety in a like amount; and a recognisance of £100 on the charge, with another surety in a like amount.
