SPORTS TO LAPSE THIS YEAR.

HOSPITAL MAY HOLD SMALL BOXING DAY MEETING.

After many years of usefulness, the Beaufort Athletic Club is in a precarious financial position. At the annual meeting held at the Mechanics' Institute on Monday night, Mr J. J. Duffin (president) presiding.

Mr W. J. Bruce Johnson (secretary) said it had been impossible, owing to circumstances over which he had no control, to call the annual meeting in October, as decided last year.

Routine correspondence was dealt with.

Mr Sinclair mentioned that the V.A.L. was now in a good financial position, and was going ahead.

The balance-sheet for the past year showed that the receipts totalled £253 17/5 and the expenditure £247/15/8, leaving a credit balance of £6/1/9.

There is also about £2 owing in outstanding accounts. The year commenced with a Cr. balance of £60 10/8.

The expenditure included a donation of £37 to the Shire Council towards the new building at the Park. There was a loss of £16/8/11 on the last sports meeting.

Mr W. Stevens, who audited the accounts, reported that everything was in order, but he had yet to verify the balance by the bank book.

The secretary said the balance of £6 was all the funds the club had. They had about £4 actually.

Mr H. V. Martin said that last year's was the best sports meeting they had had.

In answer to Mr A. Parker, the secretary said that the members' subscriptions were £5 better than the previous year.

Mr Williams—It would cost them about £4 to wind up.

The balance-sheet was received, on the motion of Messrs A. M. Parker and J. Hall.

Mr A. Parker said it was impossible to hold a meeting this year with the small credit balance they had.

Mr Sinclair—It was useless trying to carry on without the support of the business people; the club having been run for the benefit of the town for the past 40 years.

At Xmas, time nowadays, people went away motoring, and did not turn out to sports like they did in the past. It was the same all over the State.

Mr Parker—If they went back to Boxing Day they would get a crowd.

Mr Hall—They could not run a registered meeting then, as permission would not be granted.

Mr Sinclair suggested running a small meeting for their own hospital on Boxing Day.

Mr Williams—They could plainly see that the Athletic Club could not carry on, as it had been doing. It had been drifting for some years. They should revert to their old day on Boxing Day, and hold a small meeting.

Mr Sinclair—Raglan and Waterloo was well-organised and successful meetings, which were well attended and supported by district people.

Mr Parker—And the Beaufort business people, who did not support the local club.

The secretary—The three hotels were full of lodgers last Xmas, and not one publican was here to-night.

Referring to the last four meetings, Mr Johnson said the club had given their day and helped to raise £305 for the war memorial and £425 for the Park Improvement Fund, and the next two meetings were run at a loss; as well as £37 having been given away last year for a building at the Park.

Mr Martin suggested that a Back to Beaufort meeting be run every year, and the proceeds devoted to some local object, as was done in other towns.

Mr A. Parker said that if they ran a gymkhana for the hospital, they would have to get the consent and co-operation of the hospital committee.

They should adjourn for a week to get the opinion of the hospital committee.

Mr Johnson—What support had the club got for running for other objects in the past? He claimed that they should run 50-50 with other societies.

Mr Williams—He could not say anything definite in regard to the hospital, but for any local organisation they would get the support of the people. He was afraid that as an Athletic Club, the time for sports had gone.

Mr Sinclair—Scarcely of unemployment in Melbourne, it was going to be a hard year for clubs, owing to runners not having the money to travel.

Mr Johnson—Every year the club ran, it should try and get a little for itself.

The president asked if all present were unanimous on the point of running for the hospital.

Mr Stevens said it would be a good

idea to adopt a suggestion made by Mr Williams that the club go into recess for 12 months.

Mr Johnson moved that the club go into recess till October, 1930. Seconded by Mr Stevens.

Mr Parker suggested that they meet the hospital committee and allow them to run a meeting, and that the members of the Athletic Club cooperate individually, and meet next year with the object of considering whether they would run a meeting themselves.

Mr Williams said he would consult the president of the hospital and the trustees about calling a meeting to consider the matter.

Mr Sinclair moved, as an amendment, that the meeting stand adjourned till Monday night, with the object of getting in touch with the hospital committee. Seconded by Mr J. Bates.

Mr Martin spoke in support of the motion.

Mr Johnson—They should stand down for 12 months, and the hospital committee could decide whether they would hold sports, and the members of the club would help.

Mr Sinclair withdrew his amendment.

Mr Johnson—He took it that the balance-sheet would be presented at the meeting in October.

Mr Parker suggested that a general meeting be called in the beginning of September, 1930.

Mr Johnson altered his motion to that effect, and it was carried in that form.

Mr Johnson—Their roller was being used, and they were supposed to be getting hire for it.

Mr Sinclair—The North riding members had decided to charge rent for the tables at the Park, and the club should do the same with the roller.

Mr Parker suggested that the secretary take charge of the club roller and all other club property.

This was agreed to.

Accounts for advertising and hall rent were passed for payment.

The secretary was instructed to put the credit balance in the Savings Bank and to close the other bank account.

Mr Johnson moved a hearty vote of thanks to the president, starter, and other officials for the excellent way they had carried out their duties at the last sports. The meeting was one of the best they had had from an athletic point of view.

Mr Sinclair seconded the vote of thanks (which was carried), and supported Mr Johnson's remarks.

In responding, Mr Dunn said no one was more disappointed than he when he realised the financial position of the club. He was pleased with the officers who had worked, and disappointed with others who did not turn up, and had not even apologised. He thanked the speakers for their kind remarks.

Mr Williams thanked the club for the suggestion made to the hospital committee. He was sorry for the sake of the hardworking president that the last sports had not been a greater financial success.

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RETURNED SOLDIERS' LEAGUE.

The monthly meeting of the Beaufort sub-branch of the Returned Soldiers' League, which was held at Mena Park on Friday evening, 15th inst., was well attended. Mr L. R. Scott (president) presided.

Major Alan Currie, M.L.C., gave a very informative and interesting address on the amendments to the Soldier Settlement Act, and also touched lengthily upon the Rural Bank and home maintenance area proposals. He was accorded a very hearty vote of thanks upon the motion of Messrs A. Campbell and S. R. Pascoe.

Arrangements were completed in connection with the annual dinner and re-union, to be held at Beaufort on Thursday, 5th December, and at which the Wauabra, Skipton, and Ballarat sub-branches will be represented.

Messrs Scott (president) and Pascoe (vice-president) reported on the recent successful conference held at Ballarat to form a Ballarat district council. It had been decided to request the State branch, they stated, to allow Beaufort sub-branch to affiliate with the Ballarat district council. Mr D. Barnes was elected president, and Mr Youden secretary.

Mr Barnes, who is president of the Ballarat sub-branch, mentioned at the conference that there was a very fine concert party connected with his sub-branch, and made an offer that at any time they would go out to Beaufort or anywhere else in the district and give an entertainment in aid of the funds of the local sub-branch. 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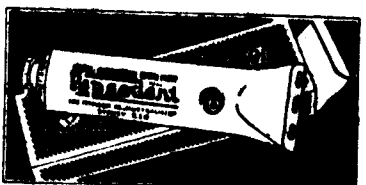

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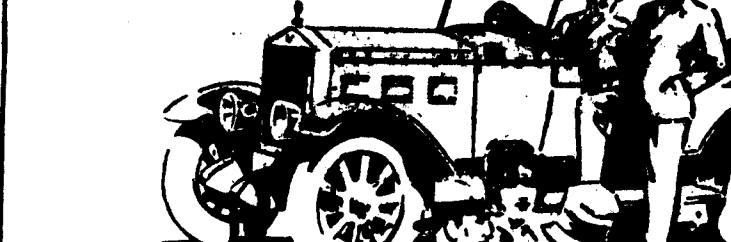
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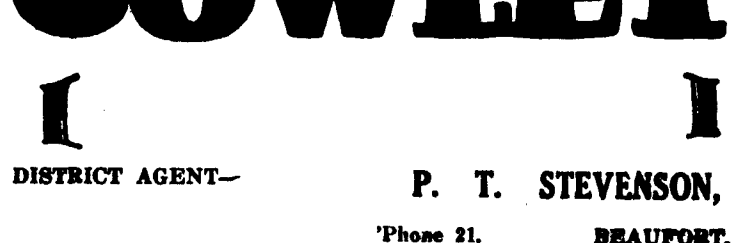
