DESTRUCTION OF OPOSSUMS.

Many applications for licences for the destruction of opossums have been received at police stations, and it is expected that 6000 trappers in Victoria will have taken out opossum licences when the season opened. The Chief Inspector of Fisheries and Game (Mr. F. Lewis) states that the season is not an open one in the sense that anyone will be permitted to kill opossums. The general law will be enforced as strictly as usual, but trappers, on payment of a licence fee, will be permitted to trap the animals, or to shoot them with rifles. Shooting with guns is prohibited. The last time opossum trapping was permitted in 1926, 2800 licences were issued, and 500,000 opossums were destroyed. Mr. Lewis says that although the number of trappers is greater this year, he did not expect there would be any disastrous reduction in the number of opossums in Victoria.

ANZAC DAY.

The increase of 41,770 males of 15 years of age and over accounted for 68,448, while the excess of arrivals over departures for 1929 was 8993 persons. The year was 1.22 per cent. compared with 1.64 per cent. in 1928.

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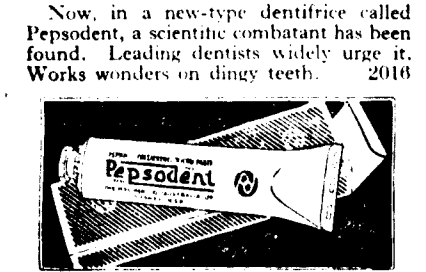

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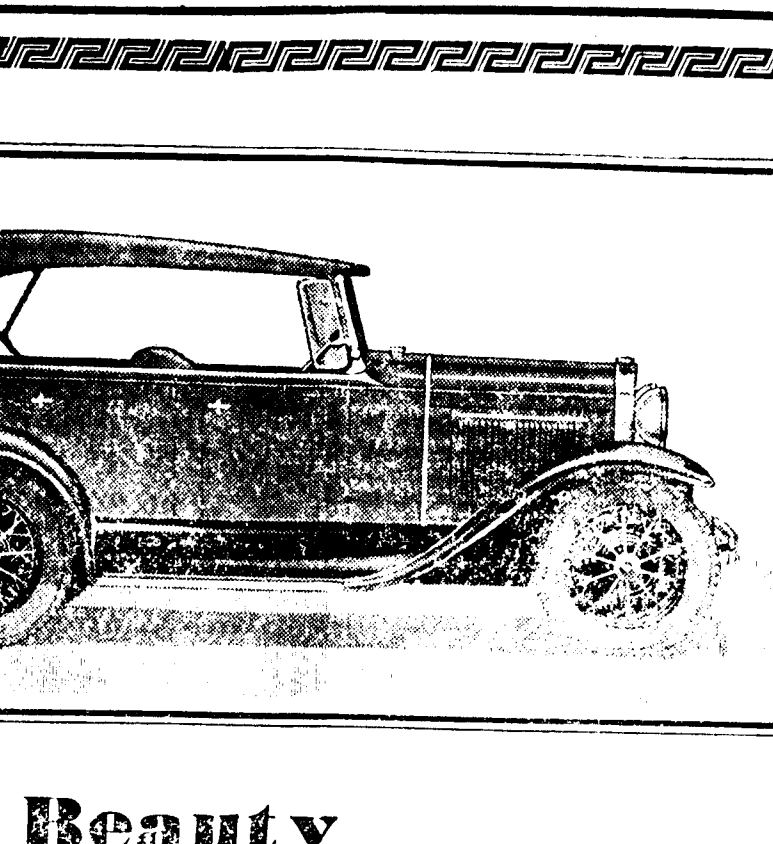

The magpies at the manager's house are real pets, the wild ones, I mean, for caged birds are not allowed on this place. All here, to a man, are bird lovers. When the manager's daughter goes to throw them their regular meals, the magpies alight on their heads, and on their laps if they are sitting in the garden, and eat out of their hands."

Emu school on Wednesday, 14th inst., in connection with an effort to establish a picnic and prize fund for the local children, but owing to unfortunate and unforeseen circumstances arising, it was not as well attended or financially successful as it might have been. Martin, of Nerring, were the musician and M.C. respectively, and left nothing to be desired in the way they discharged their duties. BALEARAT MARKET.

Tuesday.

Cattle—A heavier supply of cattle came forward for to-day's sales, totalling 141. There were two or three trucks of prime, weighty, station-bred bullocks, and some decent quality light weights, also some well-bred cows and heifers, but the remainder were only plain and useful steers and chopping cows. All the regular town buyers were in attendance, but there were fewer country butchers. Nevertheless, the demand was keen for all good and prime quality; values being about £1 per head above late rates. Quotations: Prime bullocks, £19 to £21; extra, £22 to £25; good, £16 to £18; useful, £14 to £15; prime cows, £18 to £17; good, £13 to £15; useful, £11 to £12. Calves—A light offering; the total being 62. Quality was not so good; more chopping sorts being forward, for which there was only a fair demand. Sheep—The total sheep entered, including stores, was 6107. Quality was much on a par with last week. Wetters, mostly, and fairly numerous, but only a small proportion was really prime; the bulk being moderately represented. Opening sales were slack at 17 to 16 1/2 per head last week's closing rates, and throughout the greater portion of the sales, competition showed no improvement. Towards the close inquiry became better, and a slight recovery was noted, but on the whole, it was a cheaper market. Country buyers were not so numerous as of late. Quotations: Prime crossbred wethers, 21/ to 23/4; odd sheep, 20/; good, 17/ to 19/; useful, 13/ to 15/; prime crossbred ewes, 16/ to 19/; extra, 20/ to 22/10; good, 13/ to 15/; useful, 10/ to 12/; prime merino wethers, 18/ to 20/; extra, 21/ to 24/2; good, 14/ to 16/; useful, 11/ to 13/.

Stores were not so plentiful as last week—about 1500 being yarded. Decently-bred sheep were scarce; ewes being mostly full-mouthed and aged lots. Some nice lines of weaners were forward, and a few good wethers. There was a good attendance of graziers, but sales lacked animation, and no improvement could be quoted for the most attractive lots, whilst ordinary sorts were very difficult to dispose of. Lambs—3448 were yarded. Although numbers showed an increase, there was no improvement in the quality; the majority being middling and useful. As for sheep, inquiry was not too brisk, and lower values were realised for all grades. Quotations: Prime, 19/ to 21/; extra, 22/ to 23/7; good, 16/ to 18/; useful, 12/ to 14/.

LEARMONTH COMPETITION.

LEARMONTH V. BEAUFORT.

In anticipation of a closely-contested match, there was a good muster of the public at the Beaufort Park on Saturday; when the local team were at home to Learmonth. The gate receipts were about £8. Learmonth, however, had to make the trip with only 16 men, owing to an important local wedding, and as no team can afford to have two of the opposing side running loose, the result was a foregone conclusion. Although the visitors played a hard, uphill game, Beaufort won by a wide margin. Many hard knocks were given and taken during the match, and on three occasions pairs of players were unable to keep their tempers, and gave short-lived displays of the fistic art. The central umpire was J. Jones, and Messrs R. Phillips and P. Ryan had charge of the flags. The boundary umpires were J. Egan, Ivan Buchanan, and James. J. O'Sullivan, Pringle, and Jones acted as timekeepers. J. Yawkins captained Beaufort, and the visiting skipper was J. Ryan.

Immediately the ball was bounced, Learmonth took it forward, and Griffin got a free in position, but failed to score. O'Sullivan thwarted the next attempt by the visitors to open their account. Beaufort then took the offensive, and Gray's shot was rendered futile by the Learmonth back man, Gellie and Gray passed the ball to Pringle in front of the sticks, and that player registered Beaufort's first goal. Allender gave Gray an opportunity, and as the result of his kick, two flags were again raised for Beaufort. J. Ryan figured prominently in a Learmonth counter-attack, and would have scored but for the good defence put up by Leicester and O'Sullivan. Yawkins drove the leather to Gray, who was given a free within scoring distance, and Beaufort's third goal came to light. A single was snapped for the home side by Broadbent. Beaufort's fourth marker was the outcome of a snapshot by Pringle, within easy distance of the opening. Norman was given a free and passed to Allender. A scramble in front of the Beaufort goal followed; Allender snapping their fifth "sixer" against strong opposition. Learmonth took the leather to their forward area once more; O'Sullivan preventing them from scoring. The ball was returned to the opposite end of the field, where Norman smartly snapped a goal for Beaufort out of a scrimmage on the forward line. Pearce and Allender snapping two more. Learmonth forwarded the ball by a nice chain of hand passes; and Beaufort returned it in similar fashion, but did not score. Pringle and Yawkins each added singles to Beaufort's tally, and Broadbent's shot went over the boundary. Lardner placed Broadbent in possession of the ball, and he scored a behind. Learmonth forced the ball to their end, where it went over the boundary very close to goal. Soon after, A. Dean kicked Learmonth's first "sixer." Beaufort resumed the offensive, and Allender registered a single for them. Learmonth were again testing the Beaufort back line when a free to O'Sullivan relieved the pressure.
