POLICE COURT.

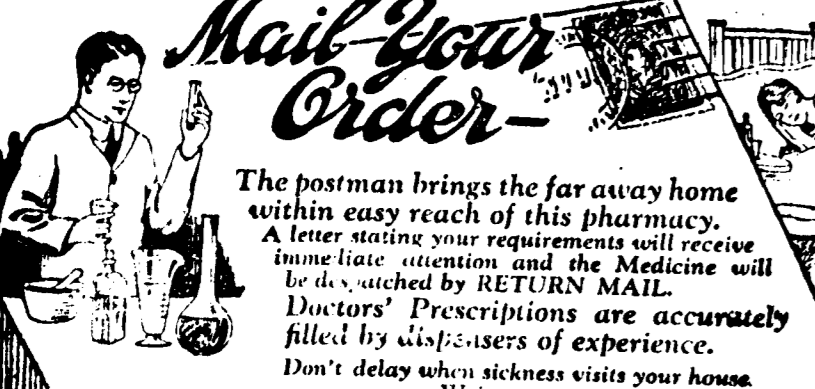
