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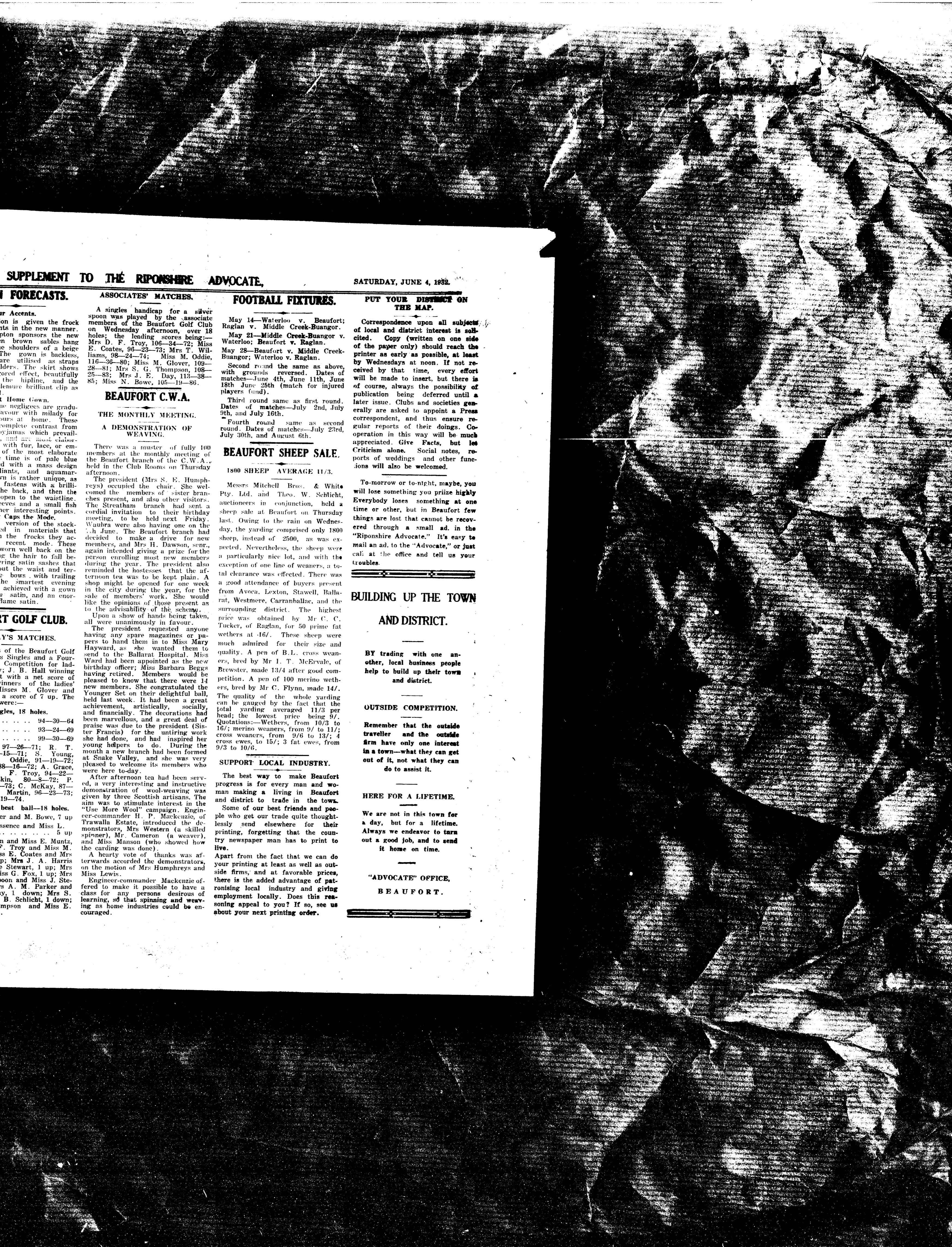

BOWLING CLUB.

THE ANNUAL DINNER. AN ENJOYABLE GATHERING.

What was aptly described on the natty three-colour souvenir booklets (provided by President J. R. Wotherspoon) as "a night out with the bowlers" took place at the Masonic Hall on Wednesday night, when the Blues of the Beaufort Bowling Club entertained the Reds at a dinner, as the penalty for their defeat in this year's colour competition. About 46 bowlers and visitors from Ballarat were present. All wore carnival caps, the general president occupied the chair, and the leader of the Reds (Mr. W. Stevens) and the Blues' leader (Mr. Fred Webster) occupied seats of honour at the president's table. A very appetizing dinner was provided that did great credit to the caterer (Mr. J. F. Glover) and the members of his staff. The tables were nicely decorated with flowers. The proceedings opened with the singing of the National Anthem, after which the Rev. A. Talbot said grace. The souvenir booklets, which were compiled by Messrs J. R. Wotherspoon and W. Stevens, contained many appropriate Christmas carols, which were heartily sung during the evening. Verses by the club's "poet laureate" (Mr. A. L. Wotherspoon) were included, in which there were humorous allusions to leading members of the club. The books were autographed by Messrs J. R. Wotherspoon, G. H. Cogle, R. Halpin, W. Liston, J. W. Harris, A. J. Saph, and P. Laby. The secretarial duties were well carried out by Mr. C. Dowling. The accompanist was Mr. W. Stevens. Songs were given by Messrs J. Duke, A. L. Wotherspoon, and J. R. Wotherspoon.

The chairman briefly introduced Messrs R. Ramsay, A. Kerr (Ballarat Control Club), S. Whykes (president Ballarat City Club), and J. Chalmers (secretary). He also warmly welcomed Mr. A. Gayatt, who had not been present during the season, and expressed the hearty good wishes of the bowlers for Mr. Gayatt's welfare. Mr. S. G. Thompson read a number of very humorous "answers to correspondents" which caused great laughter. "Success to Bowling" was proposed by the Rev. A. Talbot, who said he could not claim to be a good bowler, as he had a long way to go. It was a very scientific game, and a great game for comradeship. Speaking in a humorous vein, he alluded to the club (including the "brindle" club). The green was a place where they had a jolly good time, and met many fine chaps. He was not a good bowler, because he was more interested in men than the game. He wished the club success for the coming season, and said they had had a good year in the past season. In the colour competition they knew the better team won. In supporting the toast, Mr. D. F. Troy said their green and play had much improved. Mr. E. J. Muntz congratulated the Blues on the fight they had put up and jokingly said they had to get a bowl that would stand up and water all the year round to make the game a real success. The president was largely responsible for the success the club had achieved, despite the depression everywhere else. Mr. J. Hosking remarked that he had enjoyed himself more at bowls in Beaufort than he had in Melbourne. Mr. F. Laird said a night like this proved the success of the club, and in which the members had worked. The president referred to the secretary as the "working-bullock" of the concern. Mr. Dowling, who had been asked to present the trophies won by the victors in the pairs match (Messrs C. Vowles and H. E. Cuthbertson), congratulated that honour to the donor, Mr. Robt. Beggs. Mr. Robt. Beggs, in presenting the pipes, said he regretted that Mr. Vowles was not present, as he enjoyed the game of bowls more than anyone. He had much pleasure in handing the other pipe to Mr. Cuthbertson. The president said that no man in the club had made more progress as a bowler than Mr. Cuthbertson. Mr. Cuthbertson, in responding, said he was keen on the game. He thanked Mr. Beggs for his trophy. Mr. Dowling returned thanks on behalf of Mr. Vowles. Mr. J. F. Wotherspoon played a number of fine records on the Columbia Kolster—a gramophone with electric amplifiers. Mr. Fred Webster (leader of the Blues) proposed a toast in honour of the Reds. He said that the Reds had made a great recovery, not so many matches before the finish. It gave him great pleasure to know that Mr. Stevens was the leader of the Reds, as he took the credit of talking him into becoming a bowler. The competition had given them great pleasure, and had been played in a wonderful sporting spirit. All had done their work well, and he had great pleasure in proposing the toast. Mr. F. Laird, in support, said the Blues looked like being top-dogs at the start, but the other side waited and kept their wind for the final run. Their win was well deserved, and all credit was due to them. Mr. S. G. Thompson also supported the toast. He said that no one had any complaints to make about the season; everything going well. It was a good "go." With a little luck and science, the Blues would have won their achievement. He congratulated the winners in responding. Mr. W. Stevens (leader of the Reds) thanked the Blues, on behalf of the Reds, for keeping up the tradition of the bowlers' dinner so well. He hoped that the celebrations would long continue. In regard to the season, it was quite successful, and the matches were interesting in the extreme. It looked at first as if the Blues would win. Messrs R. Ramsay, A. Kerr, J. Chalmers, and S. Whykes humorously responded to "The Visitors," and said they were looking forward to inter-club visits in the coming season. Mr. Chalmers congratulated the organizers of the Reds and Blues' competition, which was unique in the history of bowling clubs in Australia, and said this was the best night he had spent in 20 years' experience in responding to the toast drunk in his honour, the visitors had been very happy, and their remarks were appreciated. He appreciated the remarks of Mr. Beggs and other speakers in regard to himself. It was the duty of all to do their best when placed in the position of president, and give convincing reminiscences of a visit of a party of Beaufort bowlers to the Ballarat City Bowling Club. The function then terminated.

METHODIST CHURCH.

71st ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED AT SPECIAL SERVICES.

Although the weather was decidedly wintry, the special services held on Sunday to celebrate the 71st anniversary of the Beaufort Methodist Church were well attended. Among those present was Mr. C. Waldron, the veteran local preacher, who was three years of age when the Beaufort Church was established.

The Rev. R. Williams, of Ballarat, occupied the pulpit at the morning service, and gave a fine address. There was special singing by the choir, and a solo was contributed by the Rev. J. Mellor. The organist was Miss M. Jackson. The pulpit tablets were decorated with beautiful white heath from the hills.

At the pleasant Sunday afternoon service, Rev. J. Mellor presided, and was assisted by the Rev. R. Williams. An anthem, "Pilgrims of the Night," was excellently given by the choir; the solo parts being effectively taken by the Rev. J. Mellor and Mr. H. Brown. The solo "Sing to the Lord and King," was meritoriously contributed by Mr. A. Grace. The quartette, "God So Loved the World," was tenderly rendered by Rev. J. Mellor, Mr. H. Brown, Mrs. L. Dawson, and Mrs. J. Mellor. Mrs. L. Dawson sweetly sang "Abide with Me." The choir gave in a fine style the anthem, "Lead Us Gently Home" (a duet being taken by Mr. H. Brown and Miss S. Jackson).

Rev. J. Mellor heartily and sincerely welcomed the Rev. R. Williams, chairman of the Ballarat and Geelong District Synod, whose presence they greatly appreciated.

"The Coming Revival."

Rev. R. Williams, who spoke on the subject of "The Coming Revival," had seen Beaufort. He had preached in pretty well every church between the Murray and the sea, but had missed Beaufort. It was a great pleasure to see them and to worship with them to-day, and to listen to the excellent singing, which he did not know how they produced in so small a place. By the coming revival, he meant the Church revival. He blessed the Church to a broad river. She had had her palmy days, her days of revival, and her days of depression. They were all tired of hearing about the depression, but there was comfort to the tips and dawns of a Church in its morning town of its experience, and his old friend at the door who said, "Things are pretty bad, but thank God, none of the other churches have any better off." (Laughter). The reason was passing through a depression, too. The world was always passing through transition things were always difficult, and good people were always difficult to find. He had never been a time when their young people were so splendid, to notice what some of the old folk had to say. He believed that the revival was not what they were 25 years ago. He believed that the revival was a great revival of religion in the Australian, akin to the great revivals in the old land. The people were coming back to the safe paths their fathers and mothers had trod. The care and up-bringing of young people had a lovely about it, and the masses of the people were holding religion with a light hand. The man of the world would tell them that organized religion had had its day, and lost its charm. The words of a man who said that Christianity was sick and death were dreadful words, but thank God it was not true. Before every great revival there was a time of darkness and decay, as the history of England before the revival of John Wesley showed them. They believed the deadness of religion for the past 20 years was one of the things that had aided a revival. In 1883 an Italian named Emanuel Company secured £600 worth of gold from indicators, in a line of quartz reef, between Main Lead and Raglan, being worked by a local syndicate. The syndicate struck the reef at 40 ft., and it was 3 ft. wide and showed gold. It was known as the Emanuel quartz reef.

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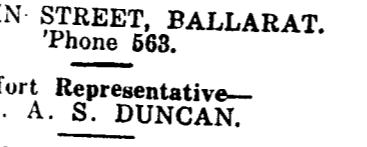
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
