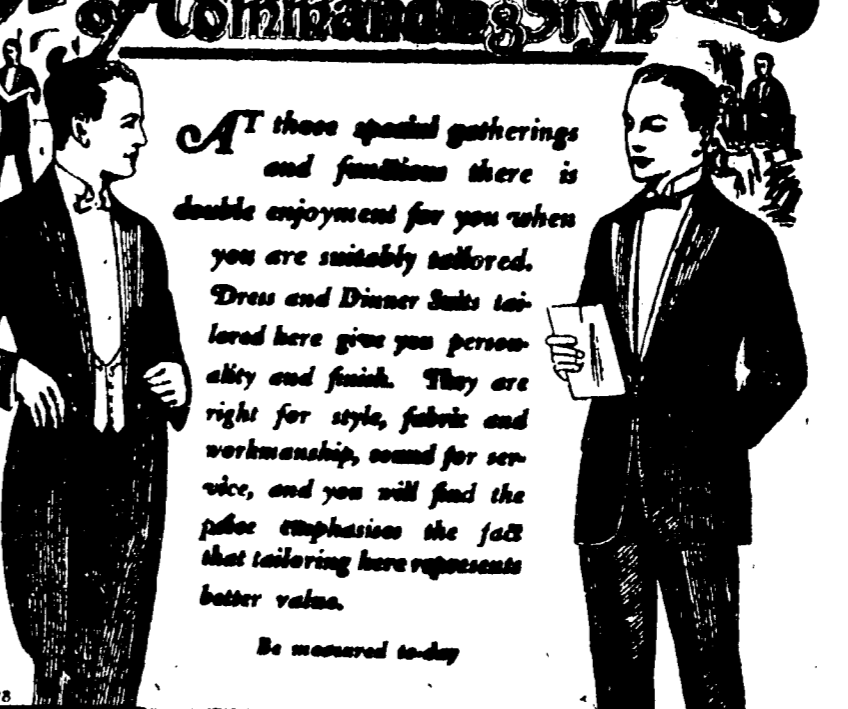

CR. W. J. DOBSON.

The sad news of the sudden death on Tuesday of Cr. William James Dobson, of "Walton," Burrumbect, came as a great shock to his many friends in the Beaufort district. He had been ill only a day or two, but it was not thought that the condition of his health was serious. Cr. Dobson was a well-known and successful Burrumbect farmer, and was highly respected throughout that district, where he had resided for many years. Twelve months ago he was elected a member of the Riponshire Council for the North riding, and has since been closely associated with the affairs of Beaufort and district.
