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BEAUFORT POLICE COURT DEBT CASES. Messrs J. R. Wetherpoon and R. A. D. Sinclair, J's. P., were on the Bench at the Beaufort Police Court on Sunday, when a number of undefended debt cases came up for hearing, in which Mr. W. E. C. Trevelyan, solicitor, Melbourne, acted on behalf of complainant. R. M. Grant sued C. Pullen for the recovery of £21/12/11 owing for goods sold and delivered. No notice of defence had been filed, but defendant was present in court. The Bench gave a verdict against him for the amount claimed, with 15/6 costs. R. M. Grant proceeded against J. Fisher for the recovery of £11/1/8 owing for goods sold and delivered. No notice of defence had been filed. The Bench gave an order against defendant for payment of the amount claimed, with 15/6 costs. R. M. Grant sued T. Johnson, J.P.M., for the payment of £5/5/7 owing for goods sold and delivered. No notice of defence had been filed. The Bench gave a verdict against defendant for the amount claimed, with 15/6 costs. J. McDougall, who had not filed notice of defence, was proceeded against by R. M. Grant for the recovery of £11/1/7 owing for goods sold and delivered. The Bench gave an order against defendant for that amount, with 15/6 costs. C. M. Grant sued T. White for the recovery of £3/11/4 owing for goods sold and delivered. Defendant did not file a notice of defence, and the Bench made an order against him for payment of the amount claimed, with 15/6 costs. C. M. Grant sought to recover from David McCormick £3/14/2 owing for goods sold and delivered. Senior-constable McCormick said that in this case notice of defence had not been given in the required time. He received it that morning. Mr. S. Young, solicitor, Beaufort, appeared for defendant, and asked for an adjournment for seven or 14 days. Defendant had received the summons some time ago, and had only called on him that morning. Defendant said he had written to complainant, collector, and told him he did not owe all the money. He had not received an answer, and came to him (Mr. Young) to-day. He thought their writings could well adjourn the case for a fortnight, as no harm would be done to anyone. Defendant was not likely to leave the district. They only wanted to get the items. If an order were made, he would only have to apply to the court to re-open. The notice of the court in default summons, in which there was any objection or objection was to adjourn the matter. Mr. Wetherpoon—There could be no hardship on anyone. Mr. Young—His client contended that only about half the amount was owing. There might be a settlement in the meantime. Mr. Wetherpoon said the Bench would adjourn the case to October 10th. R. M. SWIMMING. ANNUAL MEETING OF BEAUFORT CLUB. The postponed annual meeting of the Beaufort Swimming Club was held at the Shire Hall on Monday night, and was presided over by Mr A. L. Witherspoon (president). Twelve members were present. An apology was received for the absence of Mrs R. J. Macdonald.

The balance-sheet for the past year showed receipts totalling £21 13/6, and expenditure £17 10/6, leaving a credit balance of £4 3/6. Mr P. T. Stevenson verified to the correctness of the figures.

Mr J. J. Fitzpatrick (secretary) submitted the following annual report and balance-sheet for the year 1931-32. I wish to mention that the club by the following year had been re-elected to the position of being the club of the year.

The club's property has been valued at £27 10/6, being the total received in members' subscriptions. This will have to receive the serious consideration of the meeting, and some action will have to be taken.

The club has now a small credit balance of 4/6, after all expenses are paid. This, in view of the small amount collected in subscriptions, and the amount owing at the beginning of the year, is a very healthy position.

It is a happy omen for the future, and the president mentioned with congratulation on bringing the club out on the right side of the ledger. He moved that the balance-sheet and report be adopted. Seconded by Mr P. T. Stevenson, and carried.

The president thanked all who had done so much for the club and the secretary, Mr J. J. Fitzpatrick, and Messrs Stevenson, Brose, H. Glover, and A. L. Witherspoon (who had recently resigned the position of secretary).

The following office-bearers were elected for the ensuing year:—President, Mr J. J. Fitzpatrick; vice-presidents, Messrs P. T. Stevenson and H. Glover; secretary, Mr J. J. Fitzpatrick (who was heartily praised for his valuable past services); treasurer, Mr P. T. Stevenson; and members, Mr J. J. Fitzpatrick, Mr P. T. Stevenson, Mr H. Glover, Mr A. L. Witherspoon, Mr W. R. Glover, Mr G. Green, Mr A. E. Day, auditor, Mr A. J. Saph.

The members' subscriptions were met at 2/6 for a family, 2/6 for men, 1/7 for ladies and boys and 1/6 for the motion of Messrs Glover and A. L. Witherspoon.

In accordance with notice, the newly-elected president (Mr John) moved that the annual meeting be held at a date to be fixed in due time.

The president said the membership had dwindled from over 70 the first year to just over 20. The secretary had asked them to consider the matter of collection of subscriptions.

Mr Witherspoon said that Mr Hartley, a returned soldier, had done very much for the club, and was given a small fee. If membership were increased, it would be of great use as caretaker.

Replying to Dr. Humphreys, he had been asked a lot of money for the club, and a great deal more needed to be spent. The deep cut had silted up, and part of the concrete path was undermined in one place. They roughly estimated that it would cost £200 to put concrete sides and a concrete bottom in the bath.

The council would give them all the authority they wanted to legally make any charge at the baths they thought fit, on the payment of a nominal rental, after having the bath repaired.

Mr Glover said the club practically swam there. The difficulty was swimming in the Park.

Mr Stowell said if they allowed swimming in the Park for members of the club, and issued a members' ticket, he would issue an invitation to them to swim there. He thought they should not swim there. If they made a charge at the baths, they would deter a fair number from it.

Mr Witherspoon said that from what Mr Sinclair said, it was clear that it was dangerous for children to swim there. He had a similar suggestion to Mr Stowell's, but he thought it was objectionable to picnic.

The president said that the council would not allow people to bathe at the Park without drawing up regulations to govern bathing there. Mr Glover said they should wait until the bath had been repaired, and if they did not need to their request to the council should stand over the bath. The club could go up to the Park and the president said he had arranged for a deputation to meet the council on the 28th inst.

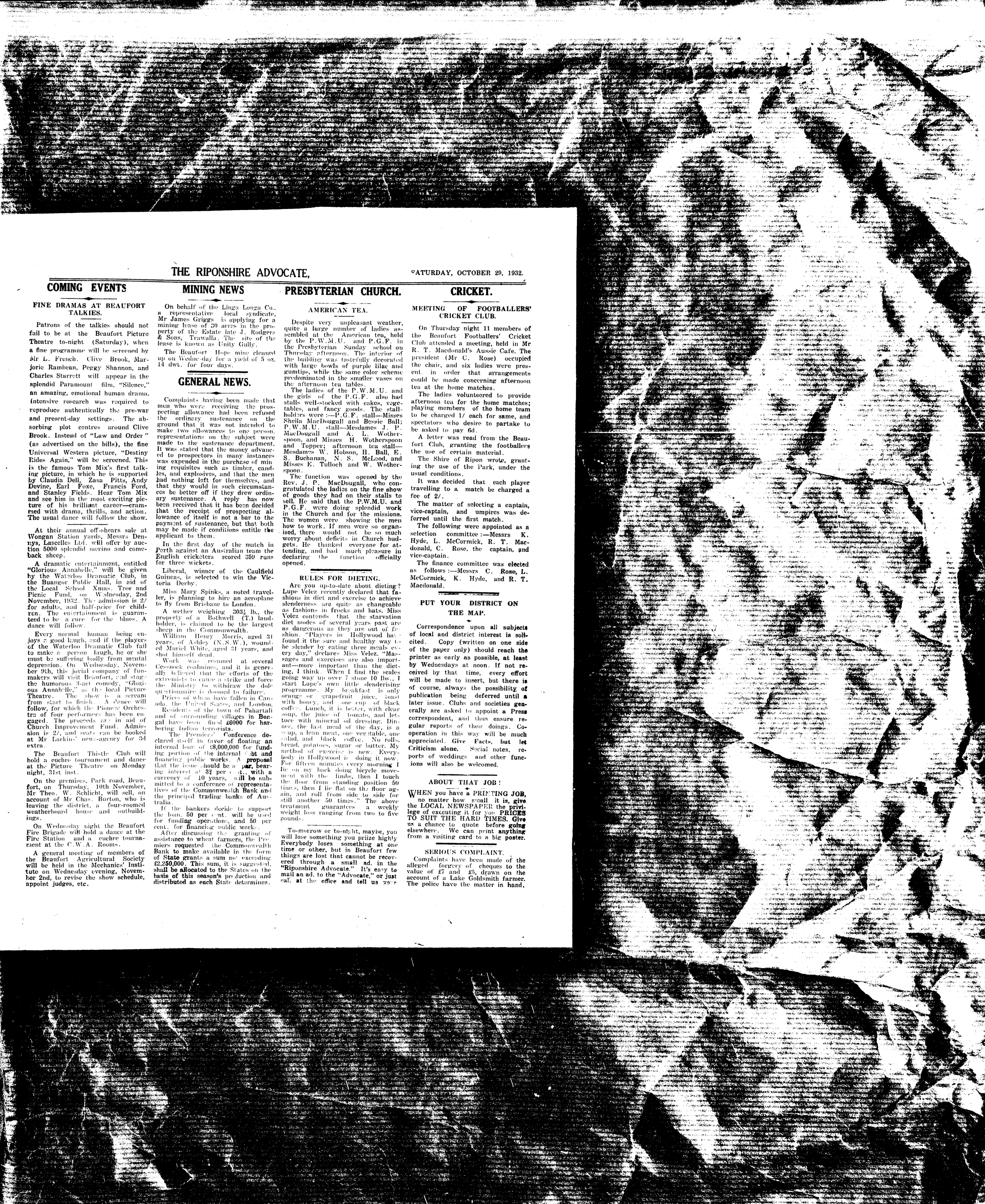
