## COMMERCIAL.

### BALLARAT LIVE STOCK MARKET.

#### Tuesday.

A lighter offering of 133 cattle. There was a scarcity of bullocks. The majority consisted of cows and some exceptionally choice station-bred heifers, which attracted keen competition. For all best quality the market was 10/ to 20/ dearer. Other grades were firm. Quotations:—Prime heavy-weight bullocks, £13 to £14 17/6; prime medium bullocks, £11/10/ to £12/10/; good, £9 to £10 10/; prime light weight bullocks, £8 10/ to £9/10/; useful, £7 to £8; prime cows, £8/10/ to £8/17/6; good, £6 10/ to £7/10/; useful, £4/10/ to £5 10/. Calves totalled 79, being mostly good and useful quality. Values were unchanged, and best made £7 13/6. Sheep had a smaller penning of 2174, with a fair proportion of prime quality wethers. Others were good and useful descriptions. Ewes were not too plentiful. Values were sharp; an increase of 2/ being recorded for best quality. Other grades were in strong demand. Prime crossbred wethers, 17/ to 19/; extra, 20/ to 22/7; good, 14/ to 16/; prime crossbred ewes, 14/ to 16/; extra, 18/1; good, 10/ to 12/; prime merino wethers, 14/ to 16/2; good, 11/ to 12/7. There was a light supply of 1088 mbs. Prime quality was limited. Competition was brisk, and values showed a further rise of 1/ to 1/6 a head. Prime, 16/ to 18/; extra, 19/; a few, to 22/1; good, 12/ to 15/; useful, 10/ to 12/.

Sinclair, on behalf of the president, and toasts incidental to the occasion honored.

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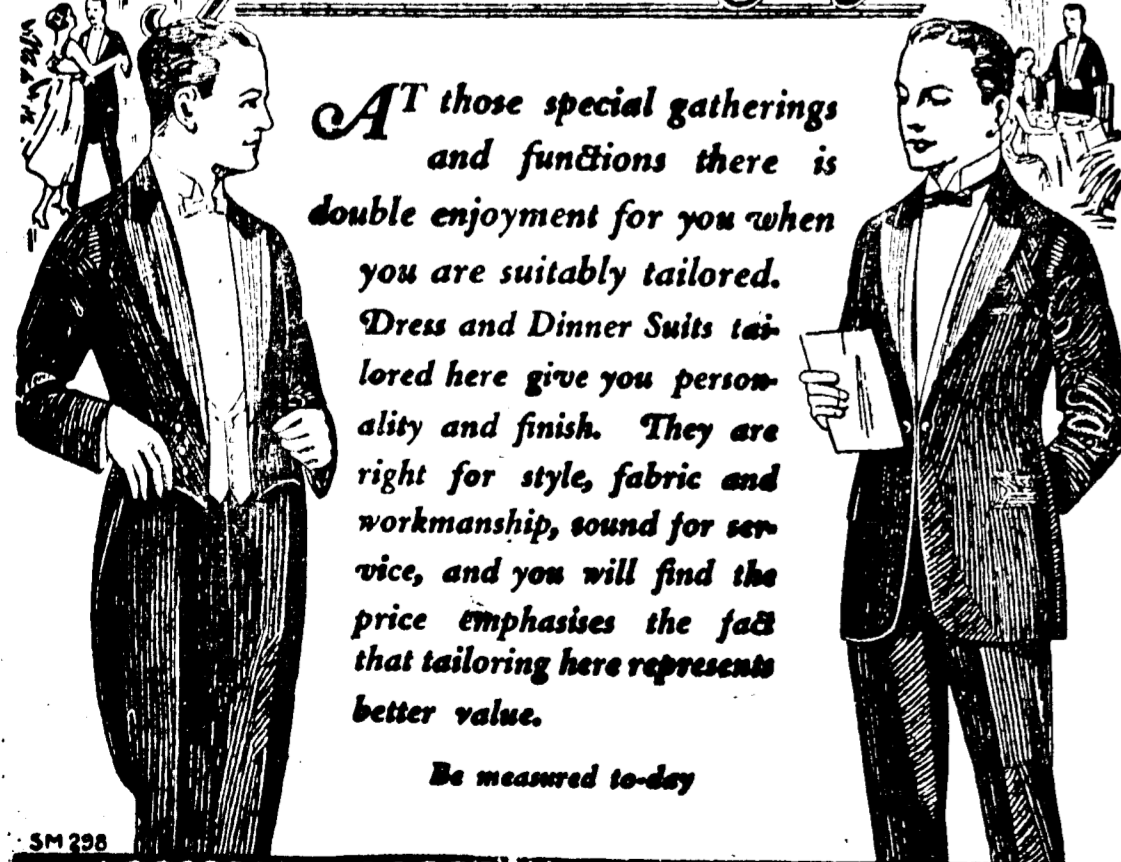

**MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.**

The monthly meeting of the com-  
mittee of the Beaufort Mechanics'  
Institute on Monday evening was at-  
tended by Messrs W. V. C. Jenkin  
(vice-president, in the chair), C. H.  
McKay, G. Beggs, W. Ashley, T.  
Williams, A. Parker, H. V. Mar-  
tin (secretary), and R. A. D. Sin-  
clair (trustee). The secretary ap-  
pointed for the absence of the presi-  
dent (Dr. S. E. Humphreys). The  
offer of Mr H. Cuthbertson to place  
3-inch skirting boards round the  
meeting room and paint them for  
12/6 was accepted, on the motion of  
Messrs Williams and Beggs. Repairs  
to fireplaces were left in abeyance,  
on the suggestion of the secretary,  
until the building repairs had been  
effected. The secretary said the large  
window in the meeting-room would  
be mended by Mr Cuthbertson. He  
also reported that the bridge even-  
ing had passed off very pleasantly,  
and brought in a profit of £2/7/1, and  
that it had been arranged to run one  
on the third Wednesday in each  
month. As the Thistle Club's enter-  
tainment would clash with the next  
bridge evening, a small sub-commit-  
tee, consisting of the president, vice-  
president, and secretary, was ap-  
pointed to fix the dates. Arrange-  
ments had been made, the secretary  
said, to have the spouting periodi-  
cally attended to, and the side of the  
building had been lined with sheets  
of iron. He read a letter from the  
Lands Department, dated 14th Ap-  
ril, 1921, giving the names of the  
trustees, and stating that any altera-  
tion in the Crown grant could only  
be done by the Department at a cost  
of £2/2/. Mr Sinclair mentioned  
that the Crown grant could not be  
found in the bank, but that Mr  
Young had seen it, and that a loan of  
£50 to £100 could be obtained from  
the bank on a joint and several signed  
by the trustees and members of  
committee. As only two of the five  
trustees (Mr Cougle and he) were  
living, he suggested that three fresh  
trustees be appointed. It was decid-  
ed, on the motion of Messrs McKay  
and Williams, that a public meeting  
be called for the purpose of electing  
three trustees in the place of those  
deceased; the secretary to ascertain  
from the Department whether the  
meeting should consist of citizens or  
subscribers to the institute. Mr Sin-  
clair apologised for the absence of  
Mr Cougle. The secretary stated  
that the room had been booked for  
the repatriation branch for 1st June.  
He also reported that the receipts  
for the month had amounted to £13  
10/8. The librarian's salary was  
passed for payment. Mr Williams  
mentioned that Mr Cuthbertson had  
informed him that if concrete were  
used for the underpinning of the  
building the cost would not be more  
than £10 or £15. Mr McKay sug-  
gested that this matter be held over  
until the new trustees were ap-  
pointed.

**NEW DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION.**

Mr J. McRae, Acting Director of  
Education, was on Tuesday night ap-  
pointed director in place of the late  
Mr Hansen. Mr McRae was born at  
Ascot in 1871. He was educated at  
the Creswick Grammar School, where  
Sir Alexander Peacock was a scholar,  
and entered the teaching service in  
1888 as a junior teacher, and in 1891  
he was a head-teacher. He rose to  
the position of district inspector,  
vice-principal of the Training Col-  
lege, lecturer on education at the  
University, and chief inspector of pri-  
mary schools. Mr McRae said he  
hoped to be able to carry on the ser-  
vice on existing lines. He was es-  
pecially proud to have been intima-  
tely associated with a teaching staff  
that had done so much for the child-  
ren of the State.

**RIPON SHIRE SEVENTY  
YEARS AGO.**

Cr. Sinclair has kindly handed to  
us a copy of a directory for shires  
and road boards for the year 1866,  
and we glean therefrom that the first  
board for this district was elected on  
May 26th, 1863. The district was  
proclaimed a shire on May 26th,  
1863.

Area, 520 square miles. Net an-  
nual value of rateable property,  
£58,042. Population, 8,000.

Number of tenements, 1400. Num-  
ber of ratepayers, 1027.

President—John Simson, Esq., Tra-  
walla.

Members.—North Riding—John  
Simson, Trawalla, elected May, 1863,  
and August, 1864; Joel Tompkins,  
Beaufort, elected May, 1863; Law-  
rence Henderson, Beaufort, elected  
May, 1863, and August, 1865. East  
Riding—James Grigg, Carngham, el-  
ected February, 1863; Thos. Dalvan,  
Carngham, elected April, 1866; Phil-  
ip Russell, Carngham (grandfather of  
the present Cr. Philip Russell, of  
Carngham), elected Feb'y., 1863, and  
August., 1865. West Riding—Hugh  
Campbell, Stockyard Hill, elected  
May, 1863; George Beggs, Euram-  
be, elected May, 1863, and August,  
1864; George Newall, Stockyard  
Hill, elected August, 1865.

Officers.—Secretary and treasurer  
—John Wotherspoon, Beaufort. En-  
gineer—James Stirling. Valuer, col-  
lector, and thistle inspector—W. R.  
Nicol. Revenue officer, dog inspec-

Daly, Skipton. Inspectors of Slaugh-  
teryards—For Beaufort, Robert  
Chamberlain. For Skipton, J. P.  
Gannon. For Carngham, J. W.  
Mough. For Stockyard Hill, —  
McCoppin. Auditors—Thomas Gracie,  
elected 1st March, 1866; William  
Watts, elected 3rd November, 1866.

The shire offices were situated then  
as now in Lawrence street, Beaufort,  
and were open daily from 10 a.m.  
to 3 p.m.

The council met on the first Thurs-  
day in every month, at 10 a.m.

**POLICE COURT.**

Messrs R. A. D. Sinclair and D.  
F. Troy, J.S.P., occupied the bench  
at the Beaufort Police Court on Mon-  
day. In a debt case, in which R. M.  
Grant sued "Mr" Crocker for the re-  
covery of £3/15/5 balance of a debt  
owing for goods sold and delivered,  
Mr Troy expressed a doubt as to  
whether an order could be given un-  
less defendant's Christian name were  
stated in the summons. Constable J.  
Duke stated that defendant (Alex-  
ander Leslie Crocker) had accepted  
service of the summons. Mr Troy  
claimed that the summons was not  
in order. Mr Sinclair said that the  
constable had stated that defendant  
had said the summons was for him.  
Mr Troy said that the complainant  
could collect on a previous order for  
£6/5/5, in existence at the present  
time. Senior-constable R. McCor-  
mick said that he had no doubt about  
the legality of making an order. The  
Bench ultimately adjourned the case  
to 12th June.

On Saturday night 55 points of rain were registered at Beaufort, and on Monday evening 22 points fell. On Tuesday 29 points were recorded.

NOT A CANDIDATE.

Mr Arthur R. Beggs, of "Niau-wanda," who was approached and asked to contest one of the North riding seats against Cr. D. F. Troy at the annual Ripon Shire Council elections in August, has declined to do so, owing to his time being too fully occupied in managing his property.

SALE OF OLD TIMBER.

Messrs T. W. Schlicht and Mitchell Bros. & White conducted a successful sale of secondhand timber from an old two-storied house at Beaufort on Thursday. The building was brought from overseas in sections in the pioneering days. Some of the timber, 70 years old, brought more than half its original value. The sale was held on account of the purchaser of the building, Mr S. Young.

"VALUERS LIKE OSTRICHES."

Making an attack upon the methods adopted by the Taxation Department in valuing pastoral properties for land tax, Mr Russell Martin, counsel for an appellant taxpayer, told the Land Tax Assessment Court on Monday that the Department's valuers had hidden their heads like ostriches and failed to "face up" to the fact that there had been a marked drop in the values of land. Mr Martin (instructed by Messrs Blake & Riggall) appeared for Philip Russell, owner and manager of Carngham Station, of 17,000 acres, near Ballarat, who is objecting to his land tax assessment for the year 1929-30. The department assessed tax on the basis of an unimproved value of £4 7/6 an acre, but Major Russell contends that the value should be only £3/10/. After Mr Martin had delivered his address, the Court reserved its decision, and arranged to inspect the property the following day. Mr Norman O'Bryan (instructed by the State Crown solicitor) appeared for the Department.

CARNGHAM ESTATE.

In a recent letter to the "Argus," Mr A. S. Kenyon, of the Historical Society of Victoria, states:—"The reference on May 23rd to the first taking up of the Carngham Estate is incomplete. The facts are that early in 1838 James Dennistoun and Thomas, third and fourth sons respectively of Sir William Baillie, of Polkemmet, the first baronet, took up the country later known as Carngham. Broken in the great crash of 1840-41, the brothers failed to 'make good,' and in March, 1843, the station, with 3500 sheep, was sold by auction to Robert Simson and Philip Russell for £950. The price was considered to be very high, and the transaction was regarded as the first sign of the recovery of the grazing industry. Lady Mary Baillie, relict of Sir William Baillie, later in partnership with Robert Hamilton, her brother, established Thomas Baillie at Polkemmet, on the Wimmera, below Horsham. Thomas died at Queenscliff in 1889, and his son, George, became the third baronet in 1890. The Baillies formed part of the Great Scottish—one might say Glasgow—invasion of 1838-39, urged on by the super-optimistic letters of David Waugh, published in the Glasgow papers."

GENERAL NEWS.

Chief Judge Dethridge said in the Arbitration Court that the 48-hour working week would not remain for ever.

After reaching the lowest point in February of this year, Melbourne wholesale prices maintained in April the recovery which was noticeable in March. The index figure is now at the level obtaining in December and January.

The Commonwealth conversion loan of £11,410,000 issued in London was over-subscribed in two hours.

Details of the peace treaty between China and Japan show that a demilitarised zone of 5000 square miles will be established south of the Great Wall.

The German Government proposes to subsidise young couples wishing to marry, in order to remove women from the labour market.

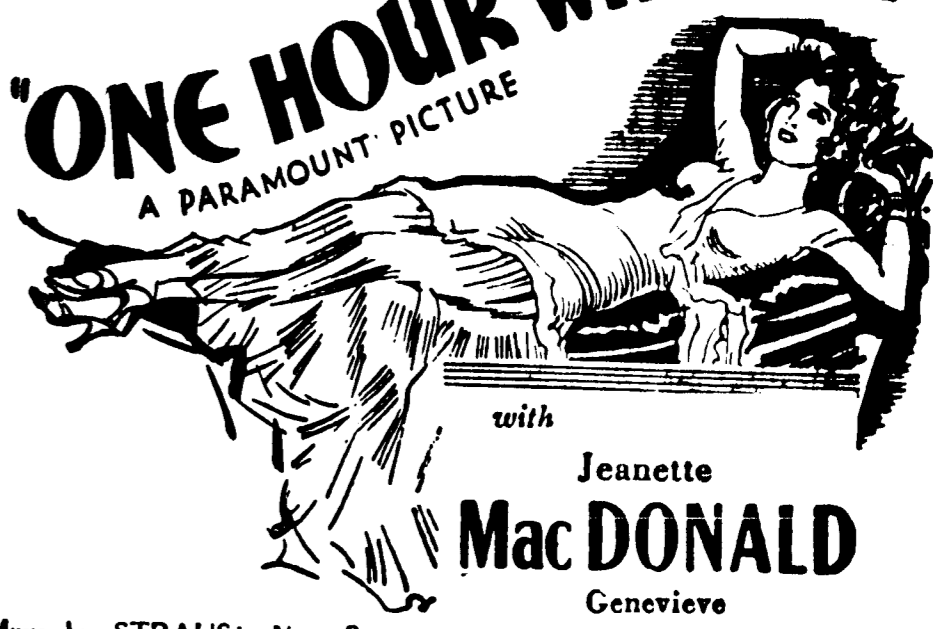

## BEAUFORT DISTRICT COMPETITION.

## WATERLOO V. RAGLAN.

(Contributed).

Conditions were favourable for a good display on Saturday last, when the above two teams met at Waterloo. The ground was in good order, the day was fine, and the wind very light. There were flashes of good football, with some scrambling play, an exhibition of good shooting by the Waterloo forwards, and poor shooting by the visitors. The scores were close throughout, and although the play was inclined to be rough at times, the umpire (M. Wallis) kept good control, and no trouble developed.

Raglan found themselves short of a team, mainly owing to men being detained at work, and gave a first trial to a local junior, A. Crocker. Even then the team was one short. Waterloo fielded a full side, but seemed to have several weak spots. If these could be remedied, the team would be a strong combination.

Waterloo had first use of a slight breeze, but Raglan defended well, and Waterloo led by 5 points only at the first change, 2.1 to 1.2.

Raglan dominated the play in most of the second quarter, but the forwards gave a poor exhibition. Men failed to make position at the right time, and those who did move out generally had the mortification of

seeing the ball sent somewhere else. With the exception of the captain (G. Grant), their passes lacked speed, and the home side's backs had little difficulty in spoiling passes, and driving the forwards into the pockets. As a result, shots were taken hurriedly from bad positions, as the score of 2.9 for the quarter shows. As a contrast, Waterloo scored 2.2 from their few excursions goalwards, and Raglan led by only two points at half-time, 3.11 to 4.3.

Raglan indulged in some plain speaking during the interval, which bore immediate fruit. Men fell into position, handled the ball better, shepherded, and marked better. As a result, two goals were added in about three minutes, and were soon followed by two others. Waterloo seemed helpless for about half the quarter, till Joe Lamb was sent into the ruck. He helped Waterloo forward several times, then scored a goal himself.

With a lead of 7.14 to 5.3 at the final change, and the last use of the slight breeze, Raglan seemed safe; but Waterloo were far from done. They emulated Raglan's efforts in the third quarter, and rattled on goals at a great rate; four goals giving them the lead. Then the Raglan backs steadied. Grant went into the ruck, and Joe Lamb, who had played a wonderfully good game for Waterloo, was solidly stopped by J. Wilkinson, and stood for a while. Drew scored a much-needed goal from a sharp angle, and Raglan seemed safe when

Day received a free less than 10 yds. out; but his shot hit the post, and in the recoil, Marshall marked, and goal. Again Raglan attacked, and Drew kicked a behind off the ground. Play then went to the centre, and R. Tiley, forced out of position, hand-balled to J. Gillingham, who sent a long kick up to be marked close up by J. Cuthbertson; but again only a behind resulted, and Raglan were glad when the bell rang, with the scores:—Raglan, 8.18 (66 points); Waterloo, 10.4 (64 points).

The goal-kickers were:—Raglan—Drew (4), McErvale (2), Grant, and Ed. Gillingham. Raglan's strength lay in the centre line, where C. Irving, L. Welsh, and R. Tiley had the call over their opponents all day. It was this that partly made up for the shortage of a man up forward. R. West and S. Maher showed great improvement. Grant set his side a good example in all features of the game; J. Gillingham needs only a game or two more to get back to his old form, and the rest of the side, in common with these men, made up an even team, all doing a little extra to make up for a man short.

For Waterloo Joe Lamb was outstanding, particularly in the third and last quarters. E. Broadbent and A. Pearce were little behind him, R. Smith marked well at centre half-forward, Dromey scouted well at full forward, Lytle brothers and Finch defended well, J. Evans did fairly well in the centre, and the rest of the side were all at times in the picture. The most pleasing feature was that last year's juniors on both sides showed greatly-improved form, and the games should show no deterioration as the older players drop out.

## ENGINEER'S REPORT.

The following report by the engineer (Mr. E. S. Crouch, C.E., L.S.) will be dealt with at the meeting of the Ripon Shire Council on Monday:—

1. Blockage of Middle Creek.—Application of John O'Brien, Adjoining Allotment 17B2, Parish of Woodnagerak, this creek is blocked by willow roots and sand for a distance of two chains. In adjoining sections of the creek, the water appears for the most part to be retained by raised banks; being in effect levee banks, higher than the adjoining lands. To bring the blocked section into uniformity with adjoining sections is estimated to cost £10, and a quote at that price has been received. Though the work should be done, I cannot recommend the Council to do it before ascertaining its legal responsibilities in the matter, particularly on account of the possibility of later requests for more to be done than is involved in the present request. Any damage done is in Ararat Shire, and the creek forms the boundary with that and this shire. Any action taken should be effected conjointly.

2. Telephone Poles, Ballarat—Hamilton Road.—The application by the Postmaster General's Department for permission to alter the line of poles, as set out in sketch, accompanying letter of — ult., should be granted.

3. Contract 5/33.—Messrs Broad-bent Bros. were awarded contract for the crushing of spall oversize at the pit into crushed rock, and also received Contract 141M/118, for the supply of 300 cub. yds. of crushed covering material. In working the two conjointly, it was found difficult to secure sufficient fines, and rather than insist upon the specified grading, which would have involved additional plant, it was found advisable to accept for Contract 5/33, crushed metal in place of crushed rock, at a reduced valuation. This material has been supplied, and is recommended for acceptance at valuation.

The installation of officers of the Ancient Order of Druids, Beaufort, was conducted by Bro. P. Fahey, A.D., of the Ararat Lodge. Among the officers appointed for the ensuing six months were:—A.D., Bro. J. E. Loft (re-elected); J.P.A., Bro. D. McDonald; V.A., Bro. T. E. Sands; secretary, Bro. L. A. Jaensch; treasurer, Bro. W. B. Cochran; and assistant-secretary, Bro. A. Welsh. The lodge numbered 77 members. Six candidates were proposed, and there were 15 others for election at the next meeting. The lodge had only been in existence for 12 months. The installation was celebrated at a social, which was attended by 56 couples. In one of the dances the Druids appeared in their quaint costumes of white or black gowns, and flowing beards.

Captain Sinclair, who presided over the monthly meeting of the Beaufort Fire Brigade, made a presentation of a dinner set to Lieut. F. Glenister, on the occasion of his marriage. CARNHAM LAND TAX ASSESSMENT.

The appeal by Major Philip Russell, grazier, of Carnham Estate, near Ballarat, against a land tax assessment issued to him by the State Commissioner of Taxes for the year 1930, was on Wednesday unanimously allowed by the Assessment Court, Melbourne. Major Russell said that he was assessed for State tax on an unimproved value of £4776 an acre, and claimed that the value should be only £310/. His estate consists of over 17,000 acres. The Court's judgment, which was very brief, stated that there was no evidence of any comparable sale. Where there was no such evidence, the Court must rely on the evidence of valuers called before it. "We have agreed unanimously that the evidence called by the appellant has established his objection to the assessment," continued the judgment, "and we find that he should have been assessed at the rate of £310/ an acre, and not £4776. The appeal will be allowed, with costs." Mr Norman O'Bryan (for the Commissioner) said that costs should not be fixed on a Supreme Court scale. After discussion with the other members of the Court, the Chairman (Judge Macindoe) said, "We agree that the costs should not be fixed on a Supreme Court basis. It was, however, a very important matter, and involved a great deal of work. Some of the witnesses' fees are not even charged for. We assess the costs at 300 guineas." The amount of the tax was £164/8/2. According to the Court's decision, it should have been £131/10/7.

Mr Sinclair—it was understood that a man could play for three Saturdays, and then return. An account for £2/16/4 was passed for payment.

It was resolved that Mr Duke again write to the secretary of the Learmonth Association, relative to the holiday match on June 24th.

Mr Glover suggested that if the Learmonth Association team did not come, a match be arranged between two combined teams in the local association.

The suggestion was adopted, and it was decided that Messrs W. R. Glover, H. Dunn, R. Davis, and J. Hewitt act as selectors.

It was decided by ballot that Raglan and Waterloo play Beaufort and Middle Creek-Buangor.

Mr Glover said the Beaufort Club were agreeable to a team being sent to the Ballarat Country Week competition.

Mr Hewitt said the Waterloo Club were also favourable. Mr Harry Dunn said the Middle Creek-Buangor Club did not think it possible to get five players to go in the middle of the week.

Mr Irving said that Raglan were also favourable.

On the motion of Messrs Scriven and Irving, it was decided that the association be represented by a team in the Ballarat Country Week competition.

Mr Scriven (Beaufort) asked that a permit be granted for Saturday, 10th June, for T. Tresize to play with Beaufort, providing that his clearance was not through.

The permit was granted, on the motion of Messrs Hilton Dunn and J. Hewitt.

Mr Hewitt (Waterloo) asked for a permit for J. Harrison to play on Saturday, 3rd inst.

After some discussion, it was decided to grant a permit conditionally; the secretary to get in touch with the secretary of the Learmonth Association next morning, and ascertain if the clearance had not been refused.

Middle Creek-Buangor were granted a permit to play R. Coburn on 10th June.

In accordance with notice, Mr Irving moved that I. Grant's disqualification be referred back to the tribunal and re-heard. He would have to travel 100 to 150 miles back to play, in order to qualify.

This was seconded by Mr R. Davis. The secretary—He had written to the V.C.F.L. in regard to the matter, and had received a reply that in view of rule 19 of the association, Grant could not do otherwise than stand down for eight Saturdays. The matter could, however, be referred to the tribunal. As the personnel of the tribunal was different to the one that imposed the penalty, the case could not justly be referred to it for re-hearing.

The secretary—Any player could appeal to the V.C.F.L. by depositing £5. These rules should have been queried when they were drawn up at first.

The motion was lost; only the mover and seconder voting for it.

Mr Glover moved that the 24th June be taken as a playing Saturday, and I. Grant's disqualification would end on that date. Seconded by Mr Hilton Dunn, and carried.

The secretary—I. Grant had to get in four of the six Saturdays, but it was open to the association to grant him a permit.

Mr Sinclair—if the association were satisfied, I. Grant would get a permit.

Mr Scriven urged that all players have numbers on their guernseys. He moved to that effect. Seconded by Mr R. Davis.

The secretary—it was a rule of the Country Football League.

Four voted for the motion, and four against; and it was carried on the casting vote of the president, who said the numbers only cost 5/.

It was resolved that every player must wear numbers from the beginning of the third round.

Mr Harry Dunn said the game was getting beyond the umpires, who were not enforcing the rules strictly enough. There were too many casualties at the Beaufort match the previous Saturday.

Mr R. Davis—The games were too crowded, and it was the players' own fault.

After further discussion of an informal nature, the meeting closed.

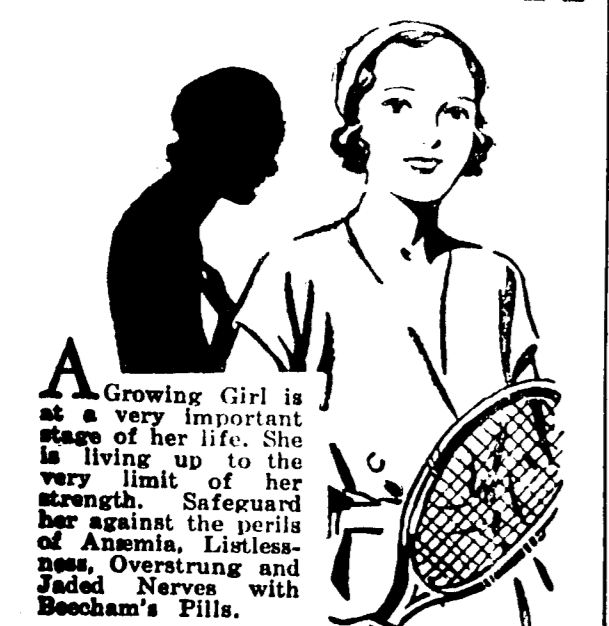

THE WOOL TRAIN.

TOUR ENDS AT BEAUFORT.

To give an insight to country residents of the State into the manifold uses of wool, a couple of cars from the Better Farming Train were fitted up as a special Wool Train.

The demonstrators arrived the previous day, and were entertained by the members of the C.W.A. at their Club Rooms.

On Saturday morning the president of the local branch of the C.W.A. (Mrs S. E. Humphreys) was present with a large following of members; and the State president (Mrs R. G. Beggs, of Buln Gherin), who returned to Beaufort after a country tour in time to meet the train, said that she had heard excellent reports of the demonstrations, as she came through towns that had been visited by the Wool Train.

The Hon. Theodore Beggs, of Eurambeen, remarked that he represented the local Agricultural Society, and in a sense, the wool-growers. The position of the wool industry was vital to the country, because it affected every man, woman, and child in Australia.

He himself had for some years now used woollen ties, and he found them more durable, and they did not get into folds and creases, and were in every way better than the silk ones. There was a big discrepancy between the price of wool and the garments which they bought. It was said that

a woollen suit contained 6 lb. or 7 lb. of wool—that was, scoured wool. If they put that down, they had about 1/2 per lb. in the grease; and took off 50 per cent. for washing, it would represent 2/ per lb. for scoured wool.

Mr. Sinclair—He had one in his pocket better than the one they sold him.

Mr. Beggs—He bought his at Myer's, and it was 4/6. Australia was one of the greatest countries in the world for sheep at the present time. From the 1st January last, there were 115,000,000 sheep in Australia.

Mr. Sinclair—When does the divide come? (Laughter).

Mr. Beggs—He could only hope. He thanked the several demonstrators for inducing the idea of using wool fabrics wherever they went.

Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair said that, as one of the city fathers, he offered his congratulations on the excellent work being done in connection with advancing Australia. As a matter of fact, he was not a wool-grower, but for years he was a draper's assistant.

windows packed with woollens and the women's with artificial silk. He went further and saw fur coats made of rabbit skins, which the women wore instead of going in for good tweeds, made of Australian wool.

The suggestion was adopted, and cheers also given for the King.

Mrs. Moreton (managress of the train) thanked the speakers for their nice welcome. They had had a wonderful trip, had been away three weeks, and had had over 4000 attendances at some places, which was rather a wonderful record, considering that there had been much bad weather. They were trying to-day to do what Cr. Sinclair had suggested—induce women to use wool both in the home and for personal apparel.

Miss Lalla Stewart said that Mrs. Moreton had been a wonderful managress. They could not have got on without her. When they set out, they hardly knew how they would get on together—seven women! (Laughter).

During the tour, Miss Stewart had the misfortune to injure her right thumb somewhat severely.

CR. TROY COMPARES RIPON WITH OTHER SHIRES.

At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, Cr. D. F. Troy said a considerable amount of talk about overhead expenses was heard of ten. When ratepayers were asked what was meant, they said it was the matter of salaries. A lot of recommendations were going about, and among others was the appointment of a consulting engineer, combination of offices, etc.

Cr. Troy said Cr. McKay was quite right in regard to the areas. It was accepted that the Ararat engineer had a little further to travel. The amount controlled and to be spent had to be considered. They paid their salaries on revenue, not area.

The president—That was right. They had no say in that. Complaints about the officers' salaries, like the poor, were always with them.

Cr. McDonald—The engineer should specify where the gravel was to come from throughout the shire.

Cr. Troy—Only one man should decide the quality of the gravel, and that was the engineer.

The Ripon Shire Council on Monday received a letter from the Victorian Railways, asking whether request for council's co-operation in the display of posters at Shire hall had been considered.

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**RIPONSHIRE REPORTS.**

The following reports were dealt with at the Riponshire Council meeting on Monday:

**Beaufort Water Supply.**

Mr F. J. Walters, consulting engineer, reported, re the Beaufort Water Supply, Jonathan's Reservoir contract.—I desire to report that the contractors for this work, Messrs Wm. Loud & Son Pty. Ltd., continue to make satisfactory progress. Concrete footings and core wall have been completed, together with the bulk of the reinforced concrete diaphragm, while 3000 c. yds. of embankment have been placed in position, although progress of the earthwork has been somewhat impeded by wet weather, which, however, will have a beneficial effect on the construction. The estimated value of the works completed at schedule rates is £1866, and I am recommending a third progress payment of £400, making a total payment to the contractor of £1400. Following out an inspection which I have made of the works on May 9th, I have arranged with the contractor to excavate and re-fill with selected clay a cut-off trench, 3 ft. deep by 2 ft. wide, along the face of the bank, at the rate of 2/6 per cubic yard, to intercept a gravel strata at a level 5 ft. below the old crest; this strata being a definite weakness in the old embankment, and the chief cause of the face of the bank opening up during the excavation of the core trench. Samples of the concrete which is being used in the diaphragm were forwarded to the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission for testing, and the results of such tests proved the concrete quite satisfactory.—Received.

**Secretary's Report.**

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

**POLICE COURT.**

Messrs R. A. D. Sinclair, D. F. Troy, and L. Smith, J.P.s, presided over the Beaufort Police Court on Monday. R. S. G. Roxburgh obtained a verdict against William Morvell for £30/19/4, with £1/19/0 costs, for goods sold and delivered. In the adjourned debt case of R. M. Grant v. "Mr." Crocker—a claim for £3 15/ for goods sold and delivered—Constable J. Duke said he served the summons on 20th May on the right person, whose initials were A.L., he thought. Defendant said it seemed strange that a second summons should be served on him, and made no objection. Senior-constable McCormick said that in a garnishee case it would make no difference whether the Christian name was given or not, if defendant received the summons. As clerk of courts, he had given notice to defendant that the case had been adjourned, and explained why, but had received no reply. An order was then made for the amount claimed, with 18/ costs. ENGINEER'S REPORT.

The following report by the engineer (Mr E. S. Crouch, C.E., L.S.) was dealt with at the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday:—

1. Blockage of Middle Creek.—Application of John O'Brien. Adjoining Allotment 17B2, Parish of Woodnagerak, this creek is blocked by willow roots and sand for a distance of two chains. In adjoining sections of the creek, the water appears for the most part to be retained by raised banks; being in effect levee banks, higher than the adjoining lands. To bring the blocked section into uniformity with adjoining sections is estimated to cost £10, and a quote at that price has been received. Though the work should be done, I cannot recommend the Council to do it before ascertaining its legal responsibilities in the matter, particularly on account of the possibility of later requests for more to be done than is involved in the present request. Any damage done is in Ararat Shire, and the creek forms the boundary with that and this shire. Any action taken should be effected conjointly.

Clause 1.—Cr. Troy reported that Cr. McKay and he, together with the engineer, inspected the place; the damage being caused by willows. It was a difficult matter, and Ararat Shire seemed to be mixed up in it. The man had just cause for complaint. Cr. Sinclair — They had no right to interfere with a creek. He moved that the matter be referred to the Municipal Association for legal advice. Seconded by Cr. McKay, and carried.

2. Telephone Poles, Ballarat—Hamilton Road.—The application by the Postmaster General's Department for permission to alter the line of poles, as set out in sketch, accompanying letter of — ult., should be granted.

Clause 2.—Adopted. 3. Contract 5/33.—Messrs Broad-bent Bros. were awarded contract for the crushing of spall oversize at the pit into crushed rock, and also received Contract 141M/118, for the supply of 200 cub. yds. of crushed covering material. In working the two conjointly, it was found difficult to secure sufficient fines, and rather than insist upon the specified grading, which would have involved additional plant, it was found advisable to accept for Contract 5/33 crushed metal in place of crushed rock, at a reduced valuation. This material has been supplied, and is recommended for acceptance at valuation.

Clause 3.—The engineer.—The figure he set was 1/ a yd. It meant a saving of about £28. The 11/6 a yd. at Streatham saved them £80 on other covering material, and Mr Muntz said the Fiery Creek sand would not be accepted for use by the board. Carr's swamp gravel was an impossibility for covering material, and its resistance to fracture was very poor. The clause was adopted. In his supplementary report, the engineer estimated expenditure for the coming year on the Beaufort—Skipton main road at £2550, on the Ballarat—Hamilton main road at £2650, and on the Western Highway at £240; total, £5480.

Cr. Kirkpatrick—They were asking for too much, and they should cut this amount to £2500. They should not bank up corners, and have bitumen sealing at the present time. He moved that £2500 be asked for.

Cr. Troy—It was a question of whether it was wise to cut down the engineer's estimates. If they could get a reduction in their payments to the C.R.B., they would be getting something worth having.

In answer to Cr. Russell, the engineer said he did not know how loan money was this year. This year it was imperative that all bitumen sections should be re-sealed, or they would go back. If they cut the estimates down, they would have to keep re-sealing, and do away with any new works. He mentioned that about

MINING NEWS

In regard to the Ray of Hope gold mine, Waterloo, it is some months since the boring operations ceased on this property, when it will be remembered, we reported in our columns that 10 bore holes had been sunk, seven of which seven bottomed in a wash. The property was then placed by Mr Hal Sheppard, of the Melbourne Stock Exchange, with a leading company of Melbourne investors. Work has been delayed, pending a report on their behalf. A report was made, and the statement finished, with a tracing taken off old leases, plans at the Mines Department, which showed the leases which had been applied for in the eighties; and as the area comprising the present Ray of Hope leases had previously been taken up by the Waterloo and Hobart Pasha companies, it has been assumed that the areas must have been worked out, although there is no proof or evidence from plans of any previous workings, or any figures showing returns from these areas referred to. It is unfortunate that this statement should have been made without first making personal inspection of the property, and making enquiries from local residents, who have lived here for many years, and are thoroughly conversant with all work that has been done; especially such residents as Mr G. Vowles and Mr T. Lewis, who are the present occupiers of the land, and when mining operations were in progress, have worked in the mine. They have been communicated with by the consulting engineer for the Ray of Hope Co., and have been asked to verify the fact that the area of the present Ray of Hope (as proven by recent bores) is virgin country. It is now hoped that a start with mining operations by sinking a shaft and opening out on the wash, will demonstrate the position of the lead and its value.

**SCORIA DEPOSIT.**

**FENCING OF PIT CONSIDERED.**

At the monthly meeting of the Ripon Shire Council on Monday, a letter was read from W. Notman, Skipton, asking council to erect a rabbit-proof fence from main road to end of scoria pit at Monmot, and also to pay a rental of 9/ per acre for enclosed area, and 3d per yard for scoria taken.

Cr. Russell—The council should settle what portion they wanted fenced off as a reserve for scoria. He believed a boundary fence had fallen in.

Cr. Kirkpatrick endorsed this. He thought they could probably get scoria nearer the road, and it might be worth while having a look.

Cr. Russell—They did not know where to put the fences. He was against the council doing any fencing on private land. The council should come to a definite decision about the reserve.

Cr. Kirkpatrick—The writer of the letter was on a pretty good wicket.

Cr. Elder—It seemed unfair for the council to make an excavation like that and leave it.

Cr. Troy—It had been a good payable proposition for the landholders.

Cr. Elder moved that the engineer meet Mr Notman and the Langi-Willi people, and see if they could come to satisfactory terms.

The engineer—He had discussed the matter of damage to wool, and the gate being left open, with Mr Notman. He referred them back to his report of August last year, showing how a big saving could be made in royalty by fencing the pit. He recommended the purchase of 10 acres, and he thought it necessary to fence. Mr Notman wanted quite a good end of the stick. The area should be fenced, leased, or purchased, and preferably purchased, to allow a deviation of the fence between that property and the adjoining one of Langi-Willi.

In answer to Cr. Russell, the engineer said it was necessary to purchase 10 acres, but some of it could be exchanged for their requirements in Langi-Willi.

In reply to Cr. Stewart (president), the engineer said they could come back to the track they were using at present.

Cr. McKay said that if Mr Notman forced the council to lease, the onus would be on him to fence.

Cr. Russell—The better way would be to mark a strip from the pit to the road, and lease or buy it. The landholders would then know where they could put their fences.

Cr. Troy—It was a mistake to go on paying royalty. He moved that the ground required be purchased. Seconded by Cr. Roddis.

Cr. Kirkpatrick—It was pretty hard to say which way the pit was going, but there seemed to be plenty of stuff in Langi-Willi.

Cr. Troy—The engineer had a private conference with the landholders, which came to nothing.

Cr. McDonald—He was opposed to purchasing at present.

Cr. Roddis—A conference should be held between the engineer and landholders.

Cr. Troy—The scoria was being successfully used, and since the damp weather had come on, it was going to be a complete success. It was better to purchase.

The engineer—They had paid over £100 already.

Cr. Elder—Had he been remaining in the council, he would have opposed putting scoria on by-roads, where there was better material close at hand. That caused dissatisfaction among ratepayers.

The engineer—They could not get at the local gravel at the time, and used 50 yds. of scoria instead.

Cr. Kirkpatrick—The road referred to by Cr. Elder was unsatisfactory to the ratepayers, and was in a very rough state. It was the roughest piece of bitumen work he had seen.

Cr. Troy's motion was further discussed, and Cr. McKay suggested altering it to the effect that preliminary steps be taken to purchase. The motion was carried in that form by five votes to four.

Cr. Elder—He was opposed to buying any land at present, as the scoria had yet to be proved. Some had been top-dressed with bitumen at Streatham, and they should stay their hand for a while.

RAGLAN V. WATERLOO.

Waterloo journeyed to Raglan last Saturday without their captain (A. Pearce), an absentee owing to injury, and had to play one short. In the circumstances, Waterloo did well for most of the game, but when their acting captain (Ed. Broadbent) was carried off near the end of the third quarter, with a ricked knee, their opposition died, and in the last quarter Raglan piled on the goals. Raglan won across the centre, and their followers were more effective, except for the actual knock-out from the bounce. They might have been further ahead, but the Waterloo backs did well, and kept the home forwards down to a moderate score; but two men short in the last quarter was a great handicap, and with Raglan playing good open football, goals came quickly. Quick was an effective central umpire; the other officials being:—Boundary umpires, C. Gillingham, and B. Smith; goal umpires, Messrs J. J. Cuthbertson and J. B. Hewitt; timekeepers, Messrs H. Tucker and J. Dunn.

Waterloo opened with the wind, but Raglan were able to keep them down to a one-point lead. S. Maher, oper-

ating at centre half-back for Raglan in place of J. Gillingham (injured hand) marked over R. Smith on several occasions, but the Waterloo man perhaps had the better of it on the ground, and was able to score the visitors' first goal. At the other end, T. Kelly found Marshall just about six inches too tall, and behind them Joe Lamb marked well. J. Lyttle played an improved game at centre half-back; having some good tussles with Ed. Gillingham. The last-named scored the home side's first goal with a long shot that bounced through.

With the wind in the second quarter, Raglan kept up a strong pressure, but the Waterloo backs worked well, and goals were a little get. Bill Lamb had some good tussles with C. Irving on the wing, but he should soon be back in his good form of three ago. Raglan rather overdid the short passing; the stab-kick not being used sufficiently. Slow short passes are useless. The forwards need better understanding. At half-time, Raglan led by 4.6 to 2.3, which had increased to 6.9 to 3.3 by three-quarter-time. Then the accident to Ed. Broadbent occurred. Raglan improved their play, Waterloo wilted, and Raglan added 10.4, to win with the final scores:—Raglan, 16.13 (109 points); Waterloo, 3.3 (21 points). The goal-kickers were:—Raglan—J. Cuthbertson (4), E. Drew (3), J. Wilkinson, Ed. Gillingham, G. Grant (2 each), McErvale, Kelly, Bending, Waterloo—R. Smith, Finch, Rutherford. Raglan were a fairly even side, and the one or two rather weak aspects of the team will be remedied by the inclusion of two or three good men in the next match against Beaufort. The Raglan boys are not inclined to be over-confident this year, but expect to do well as experience comes to the younger players. It will be a good thing for the association if Waterloo can build up to full strength before the finals, as they have the nucleus of a good side, and three or four good men added to Saturday's team will make them reasonably strong. Their older players are still young, keen, and vigorous, and the younger players, such as L. Lyttle and W. Lamb, are steadily improving. For one or two teams to be dominant is no good for football, so good luck, Waterloo.

LITERARY AND DEBATING SOCIETY.

The duties of chairman fell on the shoulders of Mr. J. F. Wotherston at the fortnightly gathering of the Beaufort Literary and Debating Society, and he performed them creditably. There was an attendance of 25 members and visitors, and the latter were cordially welcomed. Correspondence was read from the University Extension Board, stating that the following dates had been fixed for the University Extension lectures, to be held at Beaufort:—Friday, August 11—Dr. F. R. Mauldon, "World Economic Values"; Friday, August 18th—Professor E. J. Hartung, "Life and the Universe"; Thursday, 24th August—Professor W. A. Osborne, "The Romance of Scientific Discovery." The committee of criticism (Rev. A. Talbot and Messrs W. V. C. Jenkin and R. F. Manley) gave their opinions of the five-minute speeches delivered at last meeting. It was decided to transpise the syllabus items for July 18 (model Parliament: "Abolition of White Australia") and August 1st (essays and lectures). Great interest was shown in the syllabus item for the evening, a debate, "That Federation Has Proved a Success." Hon. Theodore Beggs acted as adjudicator. The affirmative side was taken by Messrs R. C. Hodgetts (leader), J. Pope, J. B. Hall, and T. G. Beggs; the negative side being put by Messrs N. H. Oddie (leader), Joyce, H. V. Martin, and W. J. Glover. Many solid and incisive arguments were forthcoming on both sides, and all-round improvement was shown by the speakers. After the leaders had replied, the adjudicator said that although he was not altogether satisfied with the debating of either side, he thought the affirmative was the better. He commented briefly on the effort of each speaker. Mr. Oddie congratulated the affirmative side on their victory, and the leader on the way he had handled the question. He also congratulated Mr. Beggs on the able way in which he had adjudicated. Mr. Hodgetts thanked Mr. Oddie for his congratulations, and paid a tribute to the members of his own side, who had worked very hard. He also complimented the opposing side, and thanked Mr. Beggs for his just adjudication. They realised that he would give a decision on the merits of the case. The chairman (Mr. Wotherston) thanked Mr. Beggs for the capital way he had judged the debate, and said they all appreciated his coming very much. Mr. Beggs briefly responded. On the suggestion of Mr. C. H. McKay, it was resolved that the secretary write to the Registrar of the University, and ascertain if there were a Debating League of Victoria, and also to make enquiries about a book on the adju-

cation of debates. Mr. H. V. Martin was appointed by the president (Dr. Humphreys) to act as chairman at next meeting. Arrangements were discussed in regard to the debate on the White Australia Policy (model Parliament) on 1st August, and the matter of dividing the House was left in the hands of Messrs Manley and Roderick. Hon. Theo. Beggs was invited to act as Speaker on that night, but was unable to accept the invitation, owing to the date clashing with the Melbourne Sheep Show. The syllabus item for next meeting is a literary evening, when talks will be given by eight members on great scientists.

THE SALVATION ARMY.

ITEMS FROM OUR FILES. June 13th, 1903.

In the Ballarat produce market wheat sold from 5/8 to 6/9; oats, 3/ to 3/1; potatoes, 35/ to 45/; hay, 24 10/ to 24/15/ for best chaffing, 24 7/6 medium to good, and 25 to 25/5/ mangel; dairy butter, 9d to 10d, factory to 1/2; eggs, 1/8 to 1/9. Tenders were invited for the grazing of the police paddock of 38 acres, township of Beaufort, recently licensed to Mr Jas. McKeich.

The death of Mr Francis Martin, one of the oldest farmers in the Chepstowe district, is recorded. An enjoyable social, in aid of the funds of the Beaufort Mechanics' Institute, was held in the Societies' Hall; Mr S. Young carrying out the secretarial duties. A profit of a little over £4 resulted. Mr J. R. Witherspoon was appointed a member of the committee of management of the reserve for racecourse and recreation purposes, in the parish of Beaufort, in the room of Mr James Thomas Harris, deceased.

A clumsy attempt to effect an entrance into Messrs J. R. Witherspoon & Co's. drapery establishment was made. A crowbar or jemmy had evidently been used on the back door of the drapery department, in an effort to burst it open. The door above the lock was marked and chipped, but either through the lock resisting the pressure, or the would-be shop-breaker being disturbed, the attempt was unsuccessful. Once before a man was disturbed at the woodheap by the watchman. The firm afterwards secured the services of an armed watchman.

At the meeting of the committee of the Beaufort Mechanics' Institute, the secretary reported that in May a record had been established for payment of subscriptions. The balance in the bank was £47. A proposal originating in the Ballarat district to divert the waters of the Emu Creek into Lake Burrumbeet, was opposed by Hampden Shire, who decided to co-operate with other district councils in opposing the scheme.

The Skipton footballers defeated Beaufort by 5 goals 4 behinds to 2 goals 6 behinds in connection with the Stewart-Lauder trophy. S. Young captained the locals, and W. Stoddart the visitors.

The Sons of Freedom Central Co., Raglan, declared its fourteenth dividend of 6d per share, making 10/6 per share, or a total of over £13,000 in dividends.

The mining yields for the week at Beaufort, Raglan, and Waterloo totalled 236 oz. 14 dwt. At a meeting of the Ararat Shire Council, Mr Robt. D. Speed was appointed engineer and valuer at a salary of £275 per annum.

Beaufort was the scene of numerous petty larcenies; poultry, firewood, and foodstuffs being somewhat frequently stolen.  WEALTH CENSUS.**

**WHY WE NEED A CENSUS.**

In early times the Census was taken primarily for military or taxation purposes, but the modern Census is used much more generally for administrative, sociological, and economic purposes.

**A NATIONAL STOCK-TAKING.**  
 The periodical count and classification of the people may be considered as a national stock-taking. It is an endeavour to ascertain the stock of human units which constitutes the community; to classify that stock according to the categories of sex, age, birthplace, &c.; and to measure the changes which have taken place in its numbers and characteristics.

It is only by means of these periodic counts that governments, sociologists, and other interested persons can measure definitely the important changes which are taking place in the community as the results of immediate causes, or of the more gradual evolution of society. Without a Census, many matters of great interest would necessarily be the subject of conjecture and uncertainty.

**STATISTICAL.**

From a statistical point of view, the census is indispensable, since it provides a basis for the standardization of all other statistics relating to the affairs of the community. Statistics of production, finance, transport, communication, trade, shipping, and vital statistics, &c., however carefully compiled, do not attain their full significance until it is possible to relate them to the population affected. To know the value of production in different industries, without knowing the number, sex, and age of those engaged in such industries; to know the extent of a country's trade, without knowing the number of people in that country; or to know the amount of public debt, without knowing the number of the population responsible for the debt, would leave us in ignorance of a very essential aspect of these important matters.

**ADMINISTRATIVE.**

An accurate knowledge of the numbers and distribution of the population is of the utmost value, when consideration is being given to providing facilities for transport and communication, education, police protection, or any other of the many services which devolve on the Government. The equal representation of the people in their Parliaments, which is fundamental to democracy, requires accurate knowledge of the distribution of the people throughout the country. Whether a community is increasing or diminishing in number; whether the people are concentrating in the towns or spreading over the country; whether existing or proposed expenditures of public moneys are justified by existing or anticipated local populations; whether the production of wealth in any locality represents benefits to few or many, are questions which demand for their answer the solid basis of fact provided by the Census.

**PUBLIC HEALTH.**

Not least among the advantages of a Census is that it enables the risk of disease and death, due to sex, or age, or occupation, to be separated from other risks, when it is desired to ascertain the relative healthiness of different communities, or of the same community at different times. The health authorities are thus better informed as to significant differences in the prevalence of sickness and death, and the ground is, to that extent, cleared for them in their search for special causes.

For these and many other purposes the correction of statistical information by a periodic Census is as urgent as the need for the periodic correction of a ship's compass.
