## Thistle Club's Boxing Day Sports Gives Promise of Great Revival.

### BEAUFORT THISTLE CLUB

#### GREAT IMPROVEMENT IN BOXING DAY SPORTS.

#### INCREASED GATE RECEIPTS.

As several light showers of rain fell, and the aspect of the weather was decidedly unsettled, the success of the Beaufort Thistle Club's Boxing Day sports remained in the realm of doubt until early in the afternoon. By that time a large crowd had gathered, at the Park, and a subsequent smart shower of rain did more good than harm, as it settled the dust on the cycling track. The efforts of the club to restore the local sports to the high position they held in the estimation of athletes and the public in years gone by, met with gratifying results. The attendance was the largest seen on the local ground in recent years, the programme was of a high standard of merit, and the 48 athletic events and dancing competitions were got off well up to scheduled time; the last race being finished by 5.30 p.m. The club, having increased the prize money, was guaranteed against loss by a number of public-spirited citizens. Those outside the arena are the best judges of whether a meeting is well-conducted or not, and on every side the comments heard were complimentary. Over 100 motor cars lined the oval, and the gate receipts amounted to about £66, compared with £41 last year. Among the competitors were L. Foster, who won the cycling championship of Australia for youths when he was under 16 years of age, and T. Banner, an ex-champion Australian runner. The American champion, Eddie Tolan, and W. McFarlane, champion of the British Isles, entered, but did not put in an appearance. Naturally, some disappointment was felt at this fact, but the general excellence of the programme provided, made ample amends for that. Many close and exciting finishes were witnessed, and there were three minor falls in the cycle races. Happily, no one was injured, although L. Foster was unfortunate enough to part company with his machine on two occasions. The Victorian Athletic League was represented by Messrs. R. A. D. Sinclair and J. Schafe, two members of its council. The official representative of the Victorian Amateur Cyclists' Union was Mr J. H. O'Dwyer. The Beaufort Cycling Club's officials were Messrs. P. Hains (president), E. R. Martin (vice-president), D. R. Brent (secretary), and F. Latch (handicapper). The dancing competitions were judged by Mr Jas. Stewart, and the piper was Mr Chris. Henderson.

The club was fortunate in the possession of a hard-working and enthusiastic team of officials, who carried out their duties thoroughly, and worked together in perfect harmony. As chief, Cr. C. H. McKay proved a leader of the right type, his energy, courteous manner, and ready tact contributing greatly to the smooth working of the human machine under his control. The secretary (Mr W. Manson) excelled himself, and had given very careful attention to detail. The bulk of the preparatory work fell on his shoulders, and was well done. He had a competent assistant in Mr W. A. Skene. A word of praise is also due to the starter, Mr Geo. Boyd, whose work was very

satisfactory. The judges and stewards were:—Messrs. R. Ward, R. A. D. Sinclair, C. H. McKay, W. A. Skene, D. Manson, W. Thompson, H. V. Martin, E. R. Martin, L. Symons, J. J. Dunn, H. Brown, G. Boyd, P. T. Stevenson, R. Woodall, H. J. Miller, W. R. Glover, D. F. Troy, D. R. Brent, W. Connor, J. McErvale, G. W. Green, R. T. Macdonald, H. J. Buchanan, and P. Hains.

The greater part of the work of finally preparing and marking the tracks, and making the last-minute arrangements on the ground fell on the shoulders of Messrs. H. Brown and R. Woodall. Senior-constable R. McCormick and Constable J. Duke, who were on duty at the sports, had no difficulty in preserving order among so well-behaved a crowd.

Mr A. R. Luker, of the Golden Age hotel, conducted the publican's booth; the fruit and sweets stall was in charge of Messrs. F. Blay and A. Lewell, and Messdames J. T. Glover and L. Miles were the lessees of the luncheon booth.

The Ballarat Pipe Band was in attendance, and considerably enlivened the proceedings with a programme of Scottish music, whilst their kilts lent a dash of colour to the scene inside the arena.

The Beaufort Bicycle Club's mile race resulted in an easy win for G. Wilson; inches separating the second and third riders, G. Anderson and C. Stewart. There was a close finish in the Caledonian Handicap (130 yds.); C. N. Longhurst only getting home by inches, with inches separating J. Fitzmaurice (second) and W. G. Hodgson (third). C. E. Lane won the Underhand Woodchop by a blow, with two blows between the second and third competitors—A. Beissert and H. Broadbent. In the Amateur One-mile Bicycle Race, C. Bilney beat N. Oaff for first place by a little over half-a-length; V. Campbell being half-a-length away third. The Beaufort Cycle Club's Half-mile event resulted in a victory for W. Cleary by a length; half-a-wheel separating G. Wilson and J. Hains, who finished second and third respectively. W. Green had a win by a blow in the Standing Block Woodchop, and there was only a blow between the second and third men (H. Broadbent and W. Dunlop). C. N. Longhurst also won the 220 yds. Footrace; having a yard to spare at the finish, with a foot separating J. Fitzmaurice (second) and R. Sargent (third). The winner of the Amateur Half-mile Bicycle Handicap was L. Hammond, who gained the judges' verdict by inches. There was half-a-length between the second and third riders (E. Jonas and C. Crick). The dancing aggregate for Mr R. Ward's blue ribbon was won by Miss Esma Cooper.

During intervals between the events, the blue ribbons were presented. Cr. D. Stewart (president of the Ballarat Caledonian Society) decorated C. E. Lane, winner of the Underhand Woodchop, with the blue ribbon presented by Mr W. Manson, and congratulated him on his win.

Mr Lane, who is a tobacco grower at Pomonal, returned thanks. He said he was pleased to be here today, and it was his first appearance. He hoped to be here to chop again at such a nice little meeting. He thanked the officials and those concerned

for preparing the blocks so nicely for the choppers, and for the way they had carried out the meeting.

Cr. C. H. McKay (chief) decorated Miss Esma Cooper with the blue ribbon (presented by Mr R. Ward) as she had won for the dancing championship. He said it was a great pleasure to adorn this handsome girl with the championship blue ribbon for Highland dancing.

Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair presented to Gordon Wilson the blue ribbon (the gift of Mr W. Manson) he had won in the local Cycling Club's Half-mile Race. He said he was delighted to have the opportunity of decorating this boy. This kind of thing was generally done at agricultural shows. (Laughter). Gordon Wilson was one of the coming cyclists of Beaufort, and he hoped he would have many more wins, and that he would gain a valuable prize before long. He was sure his father was proud of him. He looked forward to seeing young Wilson win some big bicycle event in Melbourne.

The Picture Theatre was crowded at night, when the club ran a cinema entertainment, in conjunction with the Beaufort Amusements Co. This was followed by a dance, which was also well attended. Mr L. Symons acted as M.C., and the musicians were Miss C. Baker and Mr E. Wilson. A novelty dance was won by Mr R. Saph and Miss Antonio. Mr W. Manson acted as secretary, and Messrs H. Miller and W. Skene as ticket-sellers.

## Eleven Cases Before New P.M. at Beaufort Court on Monday.

### TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

#### CHARGES AGAINST MOTOR TRUCK DRIVERS.

Before Messrs. Hill, P.M., R. A. D. Siffclair, L. Smith, and C. H. McKay, J's.P., at the Beaufort Police Court on Monday, Allan Ramsay Martin, C.R.B. inspector, charged Reginald T. Richards with being, at Beaufort, on 3rd Decr., 1934, the driver of a motor car, primarily constructed to carry goods; the weight of the said car and the load carried exceeding 3 tons, but not exceeding 8 tons; and driving it at a greater speed than 20 m.p.h.

Allan R. Martin, C.R.B. inspector, Stawell, gave evidence that at 5.45 p.m. on 3rd Decr. of last year, he was on duty on the Western Highway, about three miles on the Ararat side of Beaufort. He saw a truck loaded with bales of wool, proceeding to Beaufort. He took a position at the rear of the truck, and followed for a distance of a mile; the speed ranging from 28 to 30 m.p.h. He stopped the truck, which was owned by R. T. Richards. In answer to questions, Richards said that his accelerator was jammed down, and he could not control the speed to a slower pace. The load consisted of 18 bales of wool, weighing 3 tons, and the truck weighed 3 tons 14 cwt., the gross weight being 6 tons 14 cwt. Defendant admitted travelling over 20 m.p.h. Witness produced his authority.

To the P.M.—The accelerator had come off. He would not say whether it was left off on purpose. It was disconnected.

Defendant did not appear.

The P.M. said defendant would be convicted, and would be fined £3.

Inspector Martin asked for 3/6 costs, which were allowed.

Arthur Thos. Kelly was charged with a similar offence at Burrumbeet on 4th Decr.

Mr S. Young appeared for defendant.

Inspector Martin stated in evidence that at about 1.30 p.m. on 4th Decr., he was on duty on the Western Highway, near Burrumbeet, and saw a motor truck being driven towards Beaufort. He took up a position at the rear, and followed it for approximately two miles. The speed ran from 26 to 37 m.p.h. He stopped the truck, and questioned defendant. Defendant did not deny travelling at that speed. By means of a mechanical device, he weighed the truck, and found that its weight was 5 tons, 1 qr. 26 lb. Defendant said he did not know he was allowed to travel at only 20 m.p.h., and thought he could travel at 25 m.p.h.

To Mr Young—He tested the speed by the speedometer of his car. It was tested every month, and the time before last on the 26th November. He stopped defendant at the bottom of the hill. There was little difference in the speed down or up hill. There was apparently something wrong with the truck, as defendant left it at Ararat. Defendant did not mention to him that the speedometer was not working. He had seen defendant carrying on the road for three years. He could not say what kind of a driver defendant was. He did not know of any previous offence by him.

Mr Young said his client pleaded guilty. Owing to his manner of driv-

ing, he was not aware he was proceeding more than 20 m.p.h. He had been driving for five years with one employer, and had never been in trouble before. His licence was quite a clean one. His speedometer went wrong as he left Ballarat, and something internal of the truck also. He was subsequently picked up by the informant, and driven into Ararat. When defendant attended the court, he should receive more lenient treatment than a person who did not. When a man came and admitted the offence, and put the facts before them, he did not treat the court with contempt. He thought, in connection with the penalty, that should weigh with the Bench, who should inflict on him a lighter penalty than on the person who did not attend.

Arthur T. Kelly gave evidence that he was a driver at Horsham for A. J. Adams, for whom he had been working for five years. He was proceeding from Melbourne to Horsham. The truck was in good order at Ballarat. He took no notice of his speedometer when the C.R.B. inspector pulled him up, and did not notice it had gone until he had got through Beaufort. He did not get it fixed there, because he had no money. He could not take the speed by the speedometer. When he ran down the hill at Burrumbeet, he did not know what pace he was going. He got the speedometer fixed at Ararat; borrowing the money from his brother. He had no idea what speed he was going through Burrumbeet. There was no previous conviction on a motor offence against him.

Inspector Martin said he had no questions to ask.

In answer to the P.M., defendant said he had been driving for seven years. He could not tell whether he was doing 20 or 30 m.p.h.

The P.M.—He could if he were an experienced driver.

The P.M. said defendant would be convicted and fined £3.

Inspector Martin asked for 2/6 costs.

The costs were allowed, in default distress.

### C.W.A. NOTES.

Mr and Mrs E. Tassell, old residents of Mt. Cole and Buangor, have sold their farm near Buangor to Mr W. Sharrock, and are leaving the district to reside in Hamilton.

### BEAUFORT A.N.A.

The first meeting of the Beaufort branch, A.N.A., for the New Year was held on Tuesday night at the Mechanics' Institute, and was attended by 10 members; Mr J. A. Pearce (president) presiding. Correspondence was read from the Board of Directors in regard to Australia Day celebration, and forwarding New Year greetings from the Chief President to the officers and members. The Metropolitan Committee wrote, regarding the A.N.A. Centenary Celebration. One new full benefit member was proposed. The treasurer (Mr N. S. McLeod) reported a credit balance of £32/1/6. Accounts and sick-pay totalling £66/18/3 were passed for payment. The president referred with regret to the deaths of Mr Thos. Broadbent (father of two members of the branch) and Mr Jas. Fullerton (a former secretary), and it was decided to forward letters of condolence to Messrs. Broadbent Bros. and Mrs Fullerton and family; the motion being carried in silence while the members remained standing. The secretary (Mr W. ## ENGINEER'S REPORT.

The following report by the engineer (Mr E. S. Crouch, C.E., L.S.) was dealt with at the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday:

1. Re Drainage, near W. J. Camp's, Snake Valley.—I have inspected the site with Mr. Camp. The difficulty can be overcome by the clearing of an existing drain, and extending it about one chain, which action is recommended.

2. Re Road to Robt. Howlett's, Snake Valley.—This road is open for about 5 chains, and has been formed for that length. Scars have occurred, and require patching, which is recommended.

A specific complaint made by a councillor against sustenance men was referred to engineer to investigate.

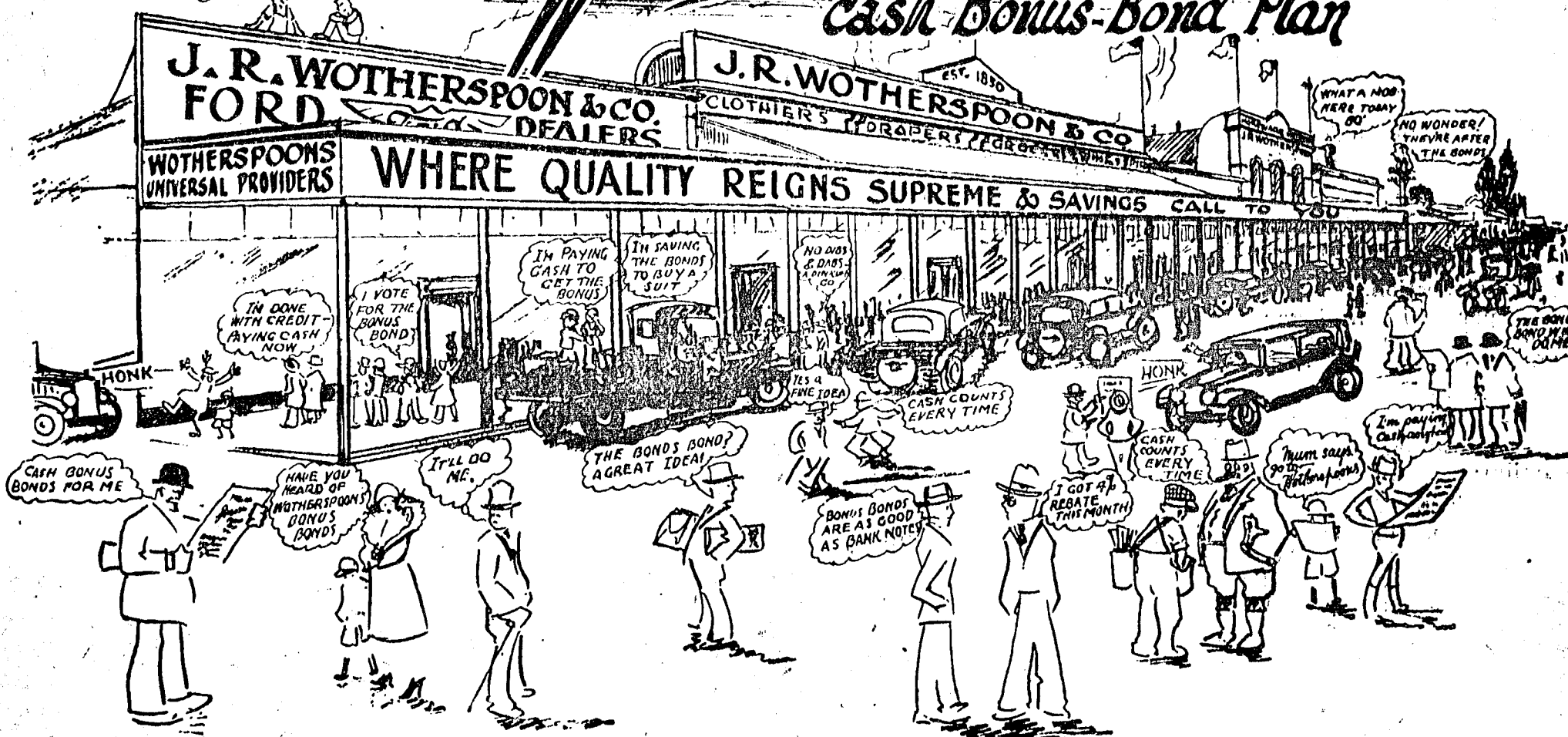
## MATERIAL FOR SUSTENANCE WORK.

A letter was read at the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday from the Department of Labour, pointing out that money for the purchase of material would be made available to councils on the basis of 10 per cent. of the total amount of wages paid each week by the municipality, and reimbursed from unemployment relief funds, as work in return for sustenance, and asking if council was prepared to accept the subsidy, under such conditions, or did it prefer to avail itself of the grant of 10 per cent. of wages, in respect of work in return for sustenance.—The secretary replied that council was prepared to accept the subsidy of 10 per cent. on amount of sustenance wages paid for materials. The secretary added that for every £100 expended for sustenance wages, the council would get £10 for material. Last year they spent something over £2000, and that meant about £200 for material on the same basis. The action of the president and secretary in making the claim was endorsed, on the motion of Cr. Roddis. Cr. Russell suggested that the claim be made on each month's return, and his was noted by the engineer. Cr.
