EVAPORATING FRUIT.

In evaporating fruit by artificial heat, says an authority, it has been proved a decided advantage to put it in a low temperature first and gradually work up to higher temperatures. Suddenly plunging the fruit over the furnace into high temperatures causes it to swell and burst, thus causing a large percentage of the fruit to run to waste. This is not only a loss in weight, but the flavor of the dried anticle is deteriorated and a lower price is the result. A common form of evaporator in use in California consists of a feeding room placed a few feet higher than, and about 25ft. distance from the furnace. From the feeding room a sloping box or tunnel, of about 25ft, in length, runs downward towards and over the furnace, above the front of which is the exit door The trays rest on racks which E. 2 so arranged as to permit of 1 free current of air between each trav As a tray is put into the evaporator it easily forces the one in front of it down the tunnel from the feeding room towards the exit door. Above the tunnel and adjoining the feeding room is the hotair vent, thus a current of hot air passes right through the tunnel from the furnace and up the hot-air vent By so arranging the evaporator the fruit first received is exposed to the minimum heat from the furnace and gradually comes into the higher temperatures. The furnace doors are conveniently placed so as to be fed from the ground level or slightly below it, and a low platform over the furnace gives access to the delivery opening. The tunnel is divided into compartments, each one of which provides space for only one tray in width, about four trays in length, and from six to nine in height, and each tunnel is provided with a separate furnace. This insures regularity of temperature and more even drying. The doors to the tunnel are in divisions so as to reduce the risk of lowering the temperature by wide openings.
