## Low-Flying Aeroplane Scares Motorists Near Beaufort.

### LOW-FLYING PLANE.

MOTORISTS THINK IT TOO CLOSE TO BE SAFE.

Writing to the "Argus" on May 25, F. E. O'Sullivan, of Ardoch Flat, 48, Dandenong road, East St. Kilda, states:—On May 23, when returning from Beaufort to Buangor, along the main road, near the Fiery Creek bridge, two women, in a motor car, were terrified by an aeroplane flying very low, apparently coming straight toward them. Turning the car off the road slightly, they stopped, but still the plane came right over their heads. It could not have been more than 10 ft. above them. The terrific deafening noise almost paralysed them. Ducking their heads, and placing their fingers in their ears with fear and trembling, they became overcome and ill. Are unprotected women on lonely country roads to be subjected to such dangers? Had the women been driving a horse, it would have been a more serious matter; country horses not being used to terrifying noises such as the plane made when flying so low. As safety should come first, I report this incident.

Mr George Gordon, of Beaufort, who was driving a motor lorry, had a similarly alarming experience the same day.

The machine passed over Beaufort at a very low altitude, and the general impression was that it was about to land.

#### BURRUMBEET DISTRICT COMPETITION.

##### BEAUFORT v. WAUBRA.

On Saturday afternoon Beaufort was at home to Waubra, and there was a fair attendance of the public at the local Park. It was a well-contested game, and although Beaufort won by 13 points, Waubra had a lead of eight points at the commencement of the closing term. The play deteriorated into a rough scramble at times, owing to the central umpire (J. Duggan) being rather too lenient. The goal umpires were Messrs. J. T. Glover and P. Thomas, the timekeepers Messrs. C. Rose and F. Chute, and the boundary umpires S. McCracken and F. Dunn.

Pringle and McErvale passed to Lardner, who got a single for Beaufort. Waubra moved forward, but did not score. Beaufort attacked, and Pringle got a free, and raised one flag for Beaufort. Waubra drove the leather out of play near the up-rights. Waubra kept attacking, without result, but eventually A. Fisher snapped a "sixer" for them. Beaufort then drove the ball over the boundary near goal. D. Fisher passed to Walsh, who added a single to the Waubra score. Lardner again secured a single for the home side. A. Pearce placed L. Lowe in possession, and the latter kicked Beaufort's first goal. Give and take play took place till quarter-time, when the scores were:—Beaufort, 1—5; Waubra, 1—1.

Waubra would have scored at the outset of the second term, but for Cleary. Culnan's shot went over the boundary. Ere long, H. Harrison snapped Waubra's second major point. Beaufort attacked, and drove the ball out of play near goal. Trezise passed to O'Callaghan, and a single for Beaufort was the outcome. Beaufort kept attacking, but could not score. There was a lot of scrambling play. Walsh forwarded the leather, and G. Hope got a behind for Waubra. Soon after, Walsh snapped a goal for Waubra. McErvale passed to Lardner, who obtained Beaufort's second goal. Walsh gave Cul-

**FOOTBALL CLUB.**

An important meeting of the Raglan Football Club was held in the Hall on Monday, 27th May. Mr H. Dunn (president) was in the chair, and there was an attendance of 12 members. Apologies were received for the absence of four players. Mr Dunn summarised the position of the club very clearly. **COMMERCIAL.**

**BALLARAT LIVE STOCK MARKET**

Tuesday.

There was a reduced yarding of cattle at the Ballarat sales; only 142 head being forward. Quality was disappointing, and very few bullocks or steers were penned. Cows were principally of secondary descriptions. Bidding was brisk throughout, and values were 20/ to 30/ dearer for best quality. Other grades were 20/ above late rates. Quotations:—Good lightweight bullocks, £7/10/ to £8/5/; prime cows, £7 to £8; good, £5 to £6; useful, £3 to £4. A lighter supply of calves was forward. Prime were scarce; the bulk consisting of choppers and secondary descriptions. Best made £6 18/6. Sheep supplied numbered 1570; being the lightest offering for a considerable time. Wethers were in the majority; being chiefly combed and merino types, and ranging from useful trade descriptions to good and prime. Ewes were useful to good. The demand was particularly keen; best quality being 2/ a head higher. Other grades also firm. Quotations:—Prime crossbred wethers, 23/ to 25/; extra, 26/ to 28/1; good, 20/ to 22/; prime crossbred ewes, 19/ to 21/4; good, 16/ to 18/; prime merino wethers, 21/ to 23/; extra, to 25/1; good, 17/ to 19/.

Lambs were also lightly supplied; the total being 1163. Chiefly useful and trade descriptions were forward; good and prime being scarce. A keen demand existed, and values were 1/ a head dearer. Prime made 19/ to 21/; extra, to 22/7; good, 15/ to 17/; and useful, 12/ to 14/.

**EMPIRE DAY CELEBRATIONS.**

Empire Day celebrations were held at the Beaufort H.E. School on Monday afternoon, and there was a very good attendance of parents and friends. Owing to the inclement weather, the ceremony was held in one of the schoolrooms, but due to the limited space, only the H. E. School students and the children of some of the grades of the lower school could be present. The children had taken particular care to show their loyalty to the Crown, by decorating the rooms with red, white, and blue streamers, flags, and flowers, and the result was most effective. Under the leadership of their head teacher, Mr E. G. Scott, the children rendered, with gusto, several appropriate patriotic and school songs, which the audience greatly appreciated.

Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair, on behalf of the local A.N.A., then addressed the children, in his usual breezy style; impressing upon them the meaning of Empire Day, and also raising many a laugh. He conveyed to them the best wishes of the A.N.A., and said how proud he was to be one of the lucky recipients of the King's jubilee medal.

Miss Lewis spoke on behalf of the Country Women's Association, and in a neat speech, wished the young people every success throughout the year.

Cr. C. H. McKay (president of the Ripon Shire Council and the Ripon sub-branch, R.S.L.) then spoke on behalf of those bodies. He said that the Ripon Shire Council had been presented with a jubilee medal. This was an award for the loyalty shown by the people of the shire. He was also representing the Returned Soldiers' League, of which he was the local president. Very definitely, he hoped that the children would never see another war, but he impressed upon them the need for self-sacrifice if the call ever came. Nine million men of the British Empire had fought in the Great War for the Empire's freedom. One million were killed in action; preserving the Empire for the children of to-day, so that it was their duty to back up this sacrifice and never let the Empire down. He then delivered a short address, entirely for the children, upon the foundation of the Empire

and Empire Day. He drew attention to the magnitude and greatness of the Empire, and called upon each one to remember the religion of God, for that was the only way to keep the flag flying.

Mr R. G. Scott (head teacher) then thanked all who were present, the speakers, the chairman, and the representatives from the School Committee, Mothers' Guild, A.N.A., Shire Council, and Thistle Club. He apologised for the absence of the clergy, who were unable to be present.

Cr. Sinclair moved a vote of thanks to the head master and teachers for the excellent manner in which they were conducting the Beaufort School, and the youngsters gave three cheers for the teachers.

Mr Scott responded.

The children then solemnly made "The Declaration," and the National Anthem was sung.

The parents then visited the classrooms of the very young children, who were addressed by Crs. McKay and Sinclair.

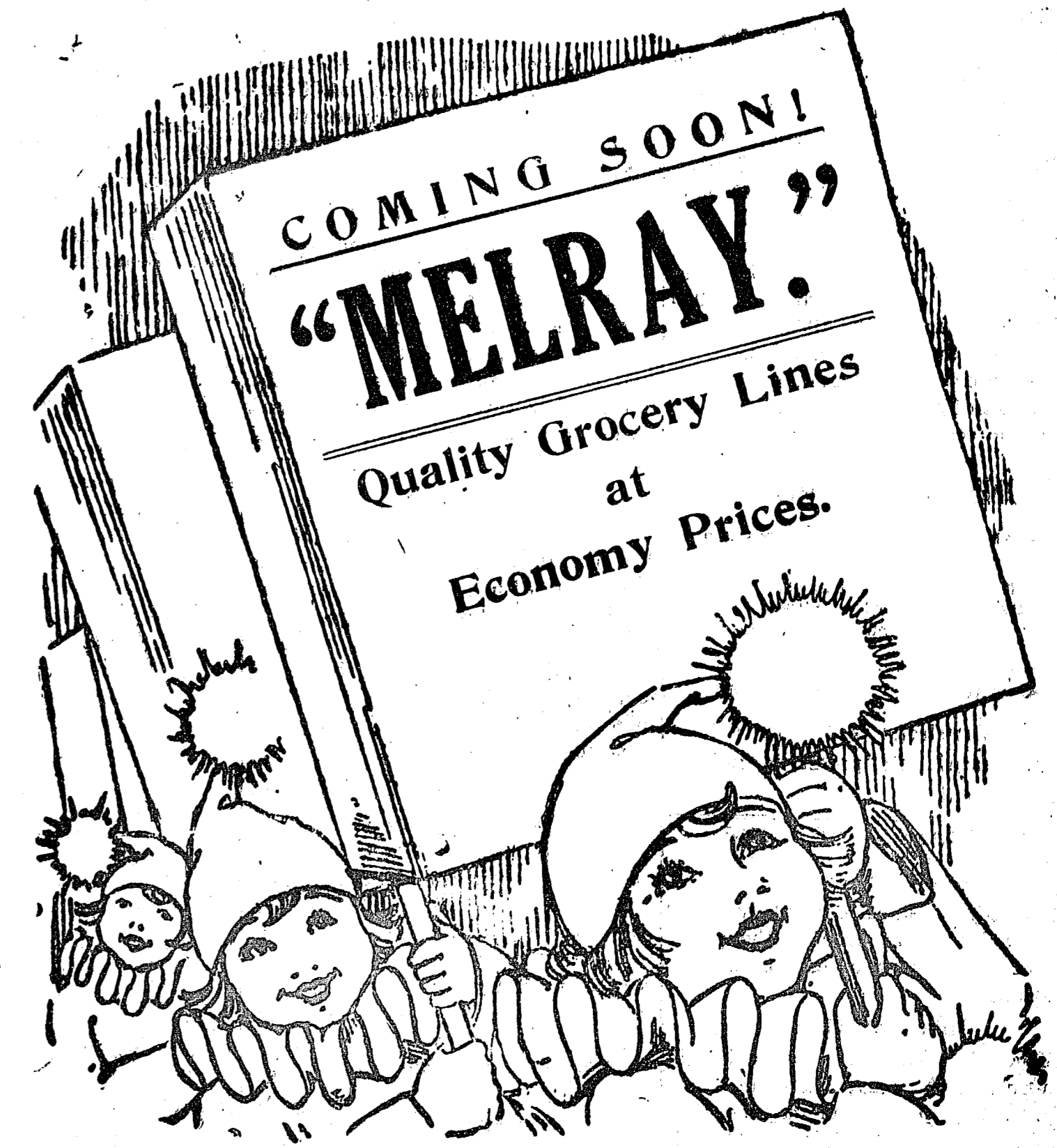
The decorated rooms were also inspected.

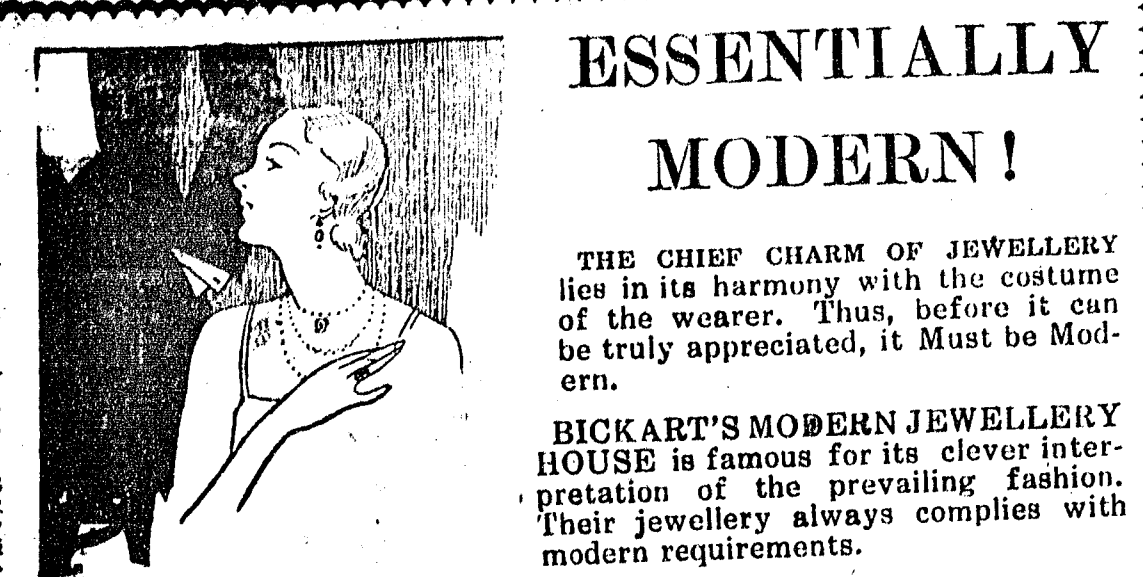

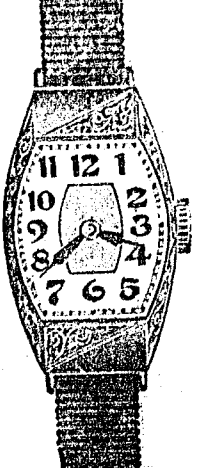
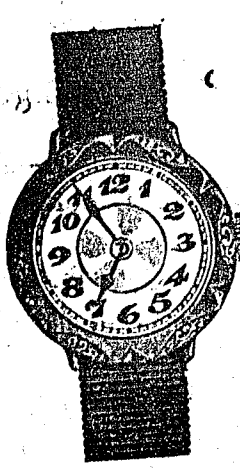

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ETHERTON - GEORGE.

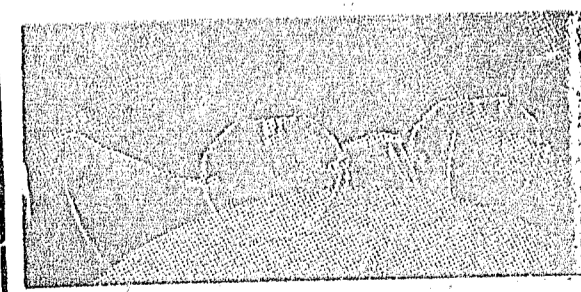

Correspondence was received from the Country Fire Board, accepting the resignation of Fireman J. Pope, and from Mr J. Nothnagel, submitting a tender for laying an outside track for the brigade. Accounts amounting to 27/ were passed for payment, on the motion of Firemen W. Bridges and T. Trezise. USE OF SCORIA. TWO BIG LANDHOLDERS PREFER IT. "Scoria, and Lots of It," is Mr E. W. Austin's Motto.

At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, a letter was read from Ernest W. Austin, "Yallabee," Beaufort, stating that he thought the road from Skipton-Banongil road to Mt. William road must be the worst in the shire in certain places, particularly below Black's Creek and "Yallabee." He suggested that it be ploughed up and scoria put on it; gravel (which was put on it a while back) being useless, as it all goes to mud. The road in places mentioned had no watershed on it at all, with the result that it was like a river when it rained, and the water stopped on the road for days. At present, it was a disgrace. His motto was, "Scoria and lots of it."—Cr. Roddis moved that the matter be referred to the West riding members, with power to act. Seconded by Cr. McDonald, and carried. The president said that Mr Austin asked him out to his place on the wettest possible day. There was a grievance there the West riding should look into. From D. J. S. Mackinnon, Mooramong, Beaufort, asking for repairs to Mount Emu-Streatham road, between the Beaufort-Skipton road and his gate, and suggesting that the rough section be re-formed and covered with scoria, as on the main road near Lake Goldsmith, as it seemed much better than gravel, as the gravel very quickly goes to mud. Referred to the West riding members, with power to act, on the motion of Crs. Roddis and Russell.

ENGINEER'S REPORT.

The following report by the engineer (Mr E. S. Crouch, C.E., L.S.) was dealt with at the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday:— 1. C.R.B. Works, 1935/36.—On Monday next will be submitted for approval a schedule of works proposed for the financial year, 1935-36. The information should reach the board by the 30th inst. Clause 1.—The engineer estimated an expenditure of £400 for the Ballarat-Ararat road, £2200 for the Ballarat-Hamilton road, and £3100 for the Beaufort-Skipton road; total, £5700. Trawalla West developmental road, £300. Cr. Kirkpatrick said and scoria put on it; gravel (which was put on it a while back) being useless, as it all goes to mud. The road in places mentioned had no watershed on it at all, with the result that it was like a river when it rained, and the water stopped on the road for days. At present, it was a disgrace. His motto was, "Scoria and lots of it."—Cr. Roddis moved that the matter be referred to the West riding members, with power to act. Seconded by Cr. McDonald, and carried. The president said that Mr Austin asked him out to his place on the wettest possible day. There was a grievance there the West riding should look into. From D. J. S. Mackinnon, Mooramong, Beaufort, asking for repairs to Mount Emu-Streatham road, between the Beaufort-Skipton road and his gate, and suggesting that the rough section be re-formed and covered with scoria, as on the main road near Lake Goldsmith, as it seemed much better than gravel, as the gravel very quickly goes to mud. Referred to the West riding members, with power to act, on the motion of Crs. Roddis and Russell.

welcome by the Mayor of Stawell, and opening remarks by the chairman, Mr McCormack, discussions (morning and afternoon) took place on many municipal subjects related to Country Roads Board activities. Amongst those matters discussed numbered the following:—Roadside plantations and the destruction of trees; maintenance methods; bitumen and dragged gravel surfaces; five-year planning for works programmes; works schedule submission dates and execution; standards use, in specifications and methods; enforcement of traffic and loading regulations; selection of clerks of works; road plant, particularly regarding power graders; costs, distribution of C.R.B. expenses internally by municipalities. At the luncheon adjournment, when all present were the guests of the chairman, special reference was made to the retirement of the district engineer, Mr Muniz, and many expressions were made, paying tribute to his excellent service and helpfulness to those under his supervision, and a token of esteem was presented. A welcome was expressed to his successor in office, Mr Gray, and discussions were then resumed at the Town Hall. This conference, which was the first of its particular kind, was considered a distinct success, and should prove the forerunner of others, and be of benefit both to those attending and to the authorities to which they are attached. Clause 2.—Received. The engineer said that councils would be well advised to keep their hands off power graders for the present, till more was done with them. The engineer (Mr E. S. CONTROL OF PETROL PUMPS.

At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, the secretary (Mr N. B. Acton) read a draft of the new bill for the control of petrol pumps on State highways by the C.R.B., received from Mr T. Parkin, M.L.A. The president (Cr. McKay) said the bill was being debated freely in Parliament, and they would be wise not to object or give their consent at present, as the bill would whittle away the powers of shire councils. Cr. Sinclair moved that the council oppose any privileges in regard to the control of petrol pumps being taken away from councils, and that district Parliamentary representatives be asked to object also. Seconded by the president, and carried. Cr. Kirkpatrick said they should go further. The president: The important thing was the defining of footpaths.

CONFERENCE OF ENGINEERS AT STAWELL.

2. Conference of Engineers at Stawell.—As directed, the above conference was attended on 29th May. Convened by the Country Roads Board, and attended by its chairman, chief engineer, retiring and incoming district engineers, and several board officers, together with the engineers of about 35 municipalities in the district, the conference was held in the Stawell Town Hall. **RIPONSHIRE COUNCIL.**

MONDAY, JUNE 10, 1935.

Present: Crs. C. H. McKay (president), R. A. D. Sinclair, D. F. Troy, P. Russell, D. McDonald, A. R. Roddis, D. Stewart, J. Kirkpatrick, and T. Wills.

The minutes of the previous meeting, as typewritten and circulated, were taken as read and confirmed.

**Correspondence.**  
From secretary Victorian Railways, notifying that Commissioner would inspect North-western line of Beaufort and Trawalla on 31st May.

The shire secretary notified the Beaufort S.M. that Cr. McKay, and perhaps Crs. Sinclair and Troy, would meet the Commissioners and request that a light be installed at the trucking yards for the convenience of butchers and dealers unloading stock on Tuesday evenings. The president reported that Cr. Sinclair, Mr. Acton, and he met the Commissioners, and Mr. Klapp had promised to give consideration to a small request they made on behalf of the butchering trade.

From secretary Education Department, intimating that the vacancy for a head teacher, fourth class, at the Brewster school was advertised in the Education "Gazette," and that the teacher appointed would be required to continue the work in connection with the Young Farmers' Club at the school.—The president: Very satisfactory. It was decided to thank the Department, on the motion of Crs. Sinclair and Roddis.

From Secretary, Country Roads Board, stating that the Board considered that instead of painting the word "slow" on the pavement of the Ballarat-Ararat road, at the intersection of Neill and Lawrence streets, Beaufort, the word "danger" should be painted, and that the distance should be at least 100 ft. from the building line. Approval had also been given for the supply of the necessary paint, and this would be forwarded at an early date.—Cr. Sinclair: That was satisfactory. Cr. McDonald: It would be a bad job if the horses started shying at the word "danger."

From A. G. Cowell, secretary Beaufort Town Band, asking council to grant the same concession as last year, viz., not to charge the usual 10 per cent on gate receipts, amounting to the band was only struggling along, and was at all times willing to help charitable and other deserving causes.—Cr. Troy moved that the request be granted. The band was quite a good institution, and always ready to help. Seconded by Cr. Sinclair, and carried.

From S. McKenzie, vermin inspector, Linton, stating that he noticed a number of rabbits on road deviation between allot. 69A1, parish of Trawalla, and 2, parish of Eurambien; also on deviation on road between allot. 4B, sec. 1, parish of Yangarhwal, and 4B, sec. IV, parish Mahkwallok, and asking to have matter attended to as soon as possible.—The secretary said the first place was at Bell's Hill, and the other at Sheoak Hill. Cr. Roddis moved that the matter be referred to the West and North riding members for immediate attention, and that the inspector be notified. Seconded by Cr. Kirkpatrick, and carried.

From Dalgety & Co. Ltd., Geelong, applying for registration of cattle yards in parish of Eurambien.—Granted, on motion of Cr. Sinclair.

From Geo. W. Cornell, public analyst, School of Mines, Ballarat, reporting that samples of ground rice, arrowroot, and cheese, received from health inspector, Shire of Ripon, complied with regulations.—Received.

From J. T. Glover, Ballarat, tendering his resignation as herdsman for the North riding, owing to his leaving Beaufort.—Cr. Troy moved that the resignation be received with regret, Mr Glover thanked for his services, and the matter of filling the position referred to the North riding members. Seconded by Cr. Sinclair (who referred to Mr Glover's careful attention to his duties), and carried. Cr. Sinclair said he was told that people were turning their cattle out, and a man should be appointed temporarily.

From Dr. J. B. Donaldson, Skipton, reporting an infectious disease case at Lake Goldsmith.—Received.

From Dr. C. C. Reed, H.O., West riding, reporting for May that influenza, bronchitis, and allied complaints were very prevalent.—Received.

From Dr. J. B. Donaldson, H.O., East riding, reporting for May that there were a few cases of whooping cough and influenza; the usual cases due to senility; and colds were very prevalent.—Received.

Dr. S. E. Humphreys, M.O.H., North riding, reported for May that influenza colds were prevalent, with a tendency towards pneumonia; three pneumonia (lobar) in adults; three broncho-pneumonia in children. Inspections satisfactory; no complaints received. Fifty-six attendances at baby health centre at E.N. Hospital.—Received.

**General Business.**  
The secretary informed Cr. Stewart that the council had applied for 25000 for relief work. They had got no reply yet.

Cr. Troy said he had received a letter from Mr H. Shergar, of Wilkinson's road, who stated that there was a dangerous hole near a pipe crossing, close to his property. He moved that the engineer send the patrol there. Seconded by Cr. Sinclair, and carried.

Cr. Russell said that, in regard to Mt. Egu reserve, they asked the Lands Department to soil the mound, and the shire disclaimed any responsibility, about two years ago. Nothing had been done, and the conditions were worse than they were three years ago. He moved that the council make another attempt to get the mound sold or some work done here to stop the erosion. It was alive with rabbits. One man got 900 rabbits there in two weeks, and one could not notice that they had gone. It was important that the Department should do something.

Cr. Stewart seconded the motion, which was carried.

Cr. Kirkpatrick drew attention to a culvert in Flannery's lane, which was too small to let the water away. The Stockyard Hill road was getting a bit "wavy" from McIntosh's in.

Cr. Troy: Commander Mackenzie would like the potholes on the Church road, Trawalla, attended to. Cr. Stewart drew attention to a road in the West riding that needed attention.

The president: Mr Barber had drawn his attention to rabbits in culverts on roads near Stoneleigh. He suggested that the engineer have an inspection made.

The engineer said that rabbit-proof pipes were to be put in by the West riding.

Cr. Russell drew attention to the soft state of the tables on the Trawalla developmental road, near Pascoe's.

The engineer said the shoulders would not scour to the same extent as before.

Complaint was also made of the horses being put within the Church grounds.—The engineer said he knew the position, and had made enquiries. He came to the conclusion that the letter was far in excess of the damage done. He had arranged for the place to be tidied up. The foreman gave no authority to anyone to go in, and did not know anyone had been there. Cr. Wills said the school ground was used for camping, and also the shelter shed, which should not be done. Cr. Roddis moved that a letter be sent, expressing regret, and stating that arrangements had been made to clean the place up. Seconded by Cr. Kirkpatrick, and carried.

**A Generous Gift.**  
Mrs E. A. Oddie has generously donated to the Skipton Hospital, an electric light plant and fittings; the cost of which is £250.

The Ripon Shire Council on Monday at the June meeting received a letter from the Shire of Wodonga, forwarding copies of motions submitted to North-Eastern and Goulburn District Councils' Association, re the re-introduction of the municipal endowment, and a direct allocation to the municipalities of 50 per cent. of this State's share of the Federal Aid Roads Grant, and suggesting that Parliamentary representatives be requested to give their early consideration and support.—Cr. Sinclair: It was an excellent idea. The president (Cr. McKay): He supported the circular. Something had to be done to relieve the councils of their indebtedness, for which motor traffic was responsible. It was impossible for municipalities to go on as they were doing. They should apply for money from relief taxation for road work, but he would bring that up later. Cr. Sinclair moved that the support of the council be granted, and Parliamentary representatives asked for their co-operation. Seconded by Cr. Wills, and carried.

He leaves a family of three sons and three daughters to mourn their loss. The sons are Messrs. William, James, and Frederick Armstrong; the daughters being Mrs. J. B. Osborne and the Misses Emily and Esther Armstrong. The funeral took place on Thursday; the remains of the late Mr. Armstrong being interred in the Waterloo Cemetery.

Cr. Kirkpatrick moved that the annual shire elections be held on the Saturday after the fourth Thursday in August. Seconded by Cr. Wills.  
Cr. Troy: The Thursday was alright, and the week-end should not be broken into.  
Cr. Troy moved, as an amendment, that the elections be on the fourth Thursday in August. Seconded by Cr. Raddis.  
The amendment was carried.  
Cr. Sinclair said that the Country Fire Board was equipping the Beaufort brigade with a fire pump. Payment would be extended over 15 years, and the municipality would pay one-third. It would make very little difference to their present annual payment (£23). He was pleased they were getting a pump, which could also be used from dams or tanks. It would cost between £500 and £600.

Cr. Sinclair: Were they going to make any further application for a relief work grant? They should get in touch with their Parliamentary representative, and see that something was spent in the shire. He moved that their Parliamentary representatives be asked to further approach the Government in the matter. Seconded by Cr. Kirkpatrick, and carried.  
Cr. Troy reported in regard to the improvement of the Beaufort baths that an appeal had been inaugurated and a meeting would be held at the end of the month. It would be put before him before again coming before the council.

It was resolved to invite Mr E. J. Muntz, retiring C.R.B. engineer, to lunch with the council at next meeting, when reference will be made to his services to the council. Mr Gray, his successor, is also to be invited.  
The president said he had been going to urge, through the municipal conference, a bolder road construction policy, but in view of the Shire of Wodonga having taken the matter up, he thought it unnecessary to go further.  
Cr. Troy: Under C.R.B. regulations, hoardings were not allowed on main roads. People were erecting them within the town boundary. They were trying to beautify the towns, and did not want this kind of thing. He suggested that the secretary examine the C.R.B. by-laws in regard to hoardings, and ascertain if the council could amend its building by-laws to control the erection of hoardings in Beaufort.

This was agreed to.  
The engineer: In the matter of trees, he understood that the C.R.B. could not plant trees or restore damage to trees on their roads with their own funds.  
Cr. McDonald said that travelling stock should be considered.  
Cr. Kirkpatrick: They did not object to separate trees in avenues, but to plantations.  
Cr. Troy: The delegate should support it, as it was an important-matter in regard to sand drift up country.

Cr. Sinclair moved, in accordance with notice, confirmation of the by-law for prohibiting the parking of motor cars in certain Beaufort streets. Seconded by Cr. Troy, and carried.  
The matter of policing the parking areas was held over for the present.  
Cr. Stewart congratulated the president on getting through the business before lunch.

Engineer try out unsupervised work by sustenance men. Patch with tailings road side J. W. Harris and Cougle's. After inspection.—Remove dead and dying pines, at Beaufort Park. Remove two stunted trees, Park road. Police to be asked to stop football playing on Fire Brigade reserve. Agree to using £11 (balance Park Improvement Fund) on sanitary work at Park. Remove damaged sheeting on retaining wall at Goldfields reservoir.—Adopted.

Emu road, Bignall's-Martin's section.—Adopted on motion of Crs. Stewart and McDonald. The engineer informed Cr. McDonald that there were no applications for the position of weighbridge keeper at Snake Valley, but he had made enquiries, the result of which he would mention in committee. The president (Cr. McKay) said that the matter in the North riding report about unsupervised sustenance workers was a mistake. Cr. Troy also spoke on the matter and said that one job on which four men fooled about for several days, he could do himself in a day. He suggested that the engineer enforce the getting of a reasonable day's job out of a man. The time had been reached when they must take a stand on it. Cr. Sinclair: There was a lot of truth in what Cr. Troy said, although there were a few good men on sustenance. The ratepayers were disgusted with some of the men. Cr. Troy: The relief work pending would cut out the men who did not want to work. Cr.

Roddis said the rabbit inspector at Snake Valley promised to send the men back if they did not work, and he wanted 75 per cent efficiency. Other Reports.

Troy moved that the recommendation be adopted. Seconded by Cr. Roddis, and carried. It was decided that the North riding councillors act as a sub-committee.

CAR-PARKING PROBLEM.

At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, a letter was read from First-constable J. Duke, drawing attention to the car-parking problem in front of the Picture Theatre, Beaufort. When a ball or other entertainment was in progress, and more than the usual number of cars was driven there, the parking space was very limited, owing to a deep drain on the north side of Neill street. When a ball was in progress on Wednesday night last, he endeavored to park all the cars on an angle, and in doing so had to encroach on the lead in to Wilson's and Skene's garages, which was not fair to either owner; and after filling up all the available space, had to place the remaining cars lengthways along the highway. He would like to suggest that the drain on the north side of Neill street be either covered or levelled to such an extent as to allow cars to be placed on the angle down to the corner east of Johnson's. The opposite side was occupied by private houses, and it was not fair to those who lived in them to have cars parked in front and disturbing their peace during the early hours of the morning. He trusted that the councillors would give this matter their earnest consideration.—Cr. Stewart moved that it be referred to the North riding members. Seconded by Cr. Troy, and carried. It was understood that the councillors would inspect that place, and the Front of Mr Lewell's shop that afternoon.

METHODIST CHURCH.

CENTENARY SERVICE.

The Beaufort Methodist Church, which was tastefully decorated with bowls of pink and white heath, contained a fairly large congregation on Sunday night, when the Rev. Robert Williams (convener of the Methodist Centenary celebrations) conducted a Centenary service. Miss M. Jackson presided at the organ, and several old, well-known hymns were sung. The choir excellently rendered two anthems. A solo part was taken by Mr Roy Dunn, and a duet by Messrs. K. Lewis and H. Brown.

Rev. A. W. Federick welcomed the Rev. Robt. Williams. He said that they gratefully remembered the interest Mr Williams took in their circuit during his chairmanship of the Geelong and Ballarat district. As convener of the Methodist Centenary celebrations, he was attempting to light the torch of thanksgiving. They trusted that he would inspire them to do more courageous things for the kingdom of God.

Rev. Robt. Williams briefly acknowledged the welcome given by the Rev. A. W. Federick. The spirit of thanksgiving, hope and rejoicing that had entered their people's hearts was wonderful in this Centenary year. He had attended more tea meetings this year than any man since the world began. The preacher had a special word of commendation for the local choir and organist.

The Rev. Robt. Williams chose as the text of an inspiring address, "And the Lord said to Moses, 'Put off thy shoes from thy feet, for the place on which thou standest is holy ground.'"—Exodus, 3, 5. The spirit of reverence was one of God's greatest gifts to Christian people. This day on which God appeared to Moses in the desert was the red letter day of Moses' life. When God had any great work, he always had his man for the hour. He touched on some of the reasons that made that patch of earth hallowed to Moses for the rest of his life. It was the spot where God spoke to him, and met him face to face. It changed the outlook of Moses' life, and changed the current of human history and the destiny of the race. Had it not been for what happened that day in the burning bush, Moses would never have been heard of. Moses was the greatest figure in human history, with the exception of Christ Himself. On 24th May, 1728, the conversion took place of John Wesley, in a little house in Aldersgate street, London, and that changed the destiny and character of the British nation, and prevented a revolution. For 54 years John Wesley went up and down England preaching the gospel, and he founded the Methodist Church. How sweet was the memory of the hour and place where they met the Lord—what the Methodist people called conversion. When it came to their great thanksgiving Centenary day, he did not want to preach in Wesley Church, or any of the suburban churches, but to return to the little Church of his home town in which he had become converted. God brought to Moses at the burning bush the sense of a great inheritance from the God of Isaac, Abraham, and Jacob. Deep, passionate, patriotism was implanted in Moses' breast, but he did not realise it till that day. A man was always standing on holy ground when he thankfully remembered the past. It took a great occasion like the Centenary celebrations to bring to a people a realization of their heritage. Young people did not realise the sacrifice of those who went before to make their inheritance possible. Throughout the Centenary celebrations they had emphasised

### SLEEPER ACROSS RAILWAY LINE.

As the Adelaide express was approaching Trawalla station on Sunday night, the engine crew felt a severe bump. The train was stopped, and an inspection of the line was made. It was discovered that a sleeper had been placed on the track. Fortunately, it had been pushed aside by the engine, and no damage was done. The train was half-an-hour late at Beaufort. Plain-clothes-constable Raper, of Ballarat, went to Trawalla on Monday, to inquire into the incident of the Adelaide express striking a sleeper on the line near Trawalla on Sunday night. The place where the incident occurred is remote from habitation, and no one was able to give any explanation of how the sleeper came to be there, but it is understood there is some doubt that it was placed in position. It is understood that the crew driving the express engine saw the sleeper in the glare of the locomotive headlight, and the train was immediately stopped. It is believed that the authorities have been advised that a car was seen in the locality shortly before the express train reached the scene.

Further inquiries were made by the police on Tuesday into the incident on the Adelaide railway line, near Trawalla, on Sunday night, when the express engine struck a sleeper, which had been placed on the rails. From an examination of the cow-catcher and the guards attached to it, which reach to within four inches of the rails, and from an inspection of the railway track in the vicinity, it appeared as if the sleeper were dragged for a considerable distance before being thrown clear. The opinion was expressed that the train might very easily have been derailed.

### Police Court.

At the Beaufort Police Court on Monday, before Messrs. R. A. D. Sinclair and L. Smith, J's.P., H. McErvale & Sons proceeded against P. Harrison, claiming £20/7/- owing for goods sold and delivered. No notice of defence was filed, and the Bench gave an order against defendant for payment of the amount claimed, with £1/6/- costs. P. J. George, Percy Morvell, and John Robertson Wotherspoon each applied for a hawkers' and pedler's licence. There being no objection, and the applicants having previously held licences, all the applications were granted.

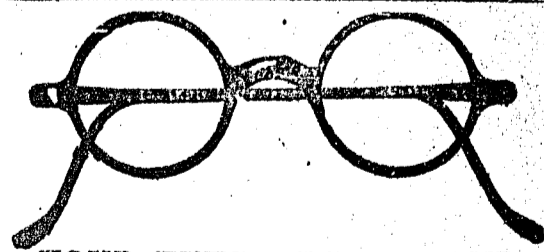

The rates of postage are as follow:—  
For delivery within the Commonwealth . . . . . 1d per 4 oz.  
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To all other places . . . 1d per 2 oz.  
If in doubt regarding the amount of postage to be affixed to such articles, it is desirable to enquire at a post office for advice.

### Women's Christian Temperance Union.

A goodly number of members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union and friends gathered at the home of Miss O. Patterson, Beaufort, on Tuesday afternoon, in order to meet Miss Hudson Bell, who spoke about the aims and objects of the union. Mr C. Waldron opened the meeting with prayer, and a hymn was sung. There were 6000 members in Victoria alone. Several members had received jubilee medals from the King this year. Their main work was in the kindergartens and prisons, and education. Miss Bell then spoke briefly upon the evils of cocktails and smoking for women, and said that it was the responsibility of everyone to guide and help their young Australians. A prayer was then offered up by Mr Waldron, after which he thanked Miss Bell and pronounced the benediction. Mr Waldron also extended the sympathy of the meeting to Miss Patterson in her recent bereavement by the loss of her niece, Miss Nellie Ellis. Soles were nicely rendered by Mrs R. Woodall, and Mrs Willaton obliged with one of her recitations. A tasty afternoon tea was then served.

**MR. JOHN O'KEEFFE.**

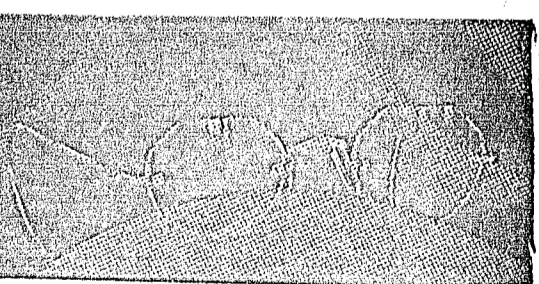

**BEAUFORT BRASS BAND**

**ANNUAL MEETING.**

The Beaufort Town Band held its annual meeting at the Shire Hall on Wednesday night; 19 bandsmen and supporters attending. Dr. S. E. Humphreys (retiring president) occupied the chair in the opening stages of the meeting.

A telegram was received from Mr J. D'Albora, bandmaster, tendering his resignation, and stating that Mr Jerram was willing to take the position.—Receive, and dealt with later.

Accounts amounting to £3 were passed for payment.

The balance-sheet for the past year showed receipts amounting to £89/14/1, and expenditure to £62 14/2, leaving a credit balance of £26 10/11. The year commenced with a credit balance of £39/15/4. Mr A. J. Saph certified to the correctness of accounts.

In moving the adoption of the balance-sheet, the retiring president said the amount of money coming forward for the band was surprising. He felt the people were prepared to support a band if it was warranted. It remained for the bandsmen to show that a band was warranted; the committee being ready and willing to do their part.

Mr Barrett seconded the motion, which was carried.

The secretary (Mr J. Duke) said he had not made out an annual report. Unfortunately, the practices had not been well attended. When Mr Richardson took over, and night practices were decided on, the attendance did not improve. Mr Richardson had been carrying on for the time being, during the absence of Mr D'Albora. He (Mr Duke) intended to retire, and understood that the president and two or three of the committee were retiring also.

Dr. Humphreys said he was sorry there was not a larger attendance.

An apology was received for the absence of Mr R. Mackay, and it was stated that Mr Mackay was willing to act as a drill instructor, if required.

Mr F. Webster said that it was unsatisfactory to a committee if the bandsmen did not attend practice.

OUT OF THE PAST.

A LOCAL BUSINESS THAT FAILED IN RECORD TIME.

When the gold boom was finished and the mines closed down, many workers became stranded, and depression seemed to hit the town with the force of a cyclone. The dole, or the substance, as Joe called it, had not then been invented, and many were hard put to it to earn an honest shilling. Whilst business houses wilted, through undue opposition and keen competition, it was left for two bright youths to establish a business that would be entirely their own, and free from opposition. There would be no shop rent to pay, no goodwill to purchase, not cash required for stock—not even a signboard, or the usual necessary ad. in the local paper. The partnership was cemented on Saturday afternoon, and on Monday morning, the senior and junior partners stepped out with a long length of borrowed rope, with a sack-bag tied securely in the centre of it. This was the stock-in-trade and complete outfit of the professional chimney sweepers to the town and country. Did they shrewdly guess that he could not climb up a chimney, or was it fate that directed their footsteps to the private residence of the one-legged barber, and into his ever-receptive ear they poured the first proclamation of their business, and gallantly assured him that for the paltry sum of two bob, they would divert the smoke of the hearth from its usual course through the rooms and out of the back door, to its proper and intended channel up the flue. "Fair enough," said the barber, and in double-quick time, the senior partner was on top of the chimney, letting one end of the rope and the bag down the sooty tunnel; and as fast as he could drag the bag back to the top, the junior, on the inside, hauled it back again. Back and forth it went vigorously, like a well-oiled piston rod, so that in less than two minutes, they were on the rooftop, and holding out a hand for the cash. Such speed and simplicity in cleaning a chimney astounded the barber, and a mental calculation placed their income. GENERAL NEWS.

David McDonald Brown, who was found guilty of robbery in company, in connection with the hold-up and robbery of two clerks of £1725 in Collins street, Melbourne, was sentenced to imprisonment for seven years.

Two aeroplanes collided about 500 ft. above Mascot aerodrome, Sydney, but the skill of the pilots enabled a safe landing to be made. One of the wings of one machine was crumpled, and the undercarriage of another was slightly damaged.

The acting leader of the Opposition (Mr Kent Hughes), in an address to the Toorak branch of the Australian Women's National League, said that since the scrapping of the Treaty of Versailles the world was nearer permanent peace.

Observers fear that war between Italy and Abyssinia is now inevitable; Italy's demands being so far-reaching that the Emperor of Abyssinia cannot accept them.

It is believed that the United States proposes to claim sovereignty over three islands in the Pacific which have been regarded as British.

Britain has extended the cattle subsidy for a further three months.

President Roosevelt has created a new body, the National Youth Administration, to spend £10,000,000 in giving needy young people a start in life.

Germany's financial position is such as to cause growing anxiety. Her indebtedness is creating a fear of inflation.

Borotra, the French tennis player, has accepted a challenge by a tennis writer to a duel.

The bill to amend the Transport Regulation Act, which will probably be explained in the Legislative Assembly next week, will give the Transport Board power of recommendation only to the Governor-in-Council.

The Ministry, it is stated, proposes during the next long Parliament recess, to consider plans for the co-ordination of control of all forms of transport.

The State Ministry, through the State Labor Bureau, is applying a strict "work test" to men called up for relief works.

A report regarding the application of the "work test" in parts of Gippsland showed that of 960 men called up, 504 had refused to accept work. Those of the men concerned who were registered for sustenance have been struck off the list. They will not be reinstated unless their explanations are absolutely satisfactory.

Dr. Shields (U.A.P. Castlemaine and Kyneton) has suggested that the power to recover costs from persons treated for infectious diseases in the interests of the community should not be given.

The State Ministry has agreed to extend the hours of married men on relief work in the country from 44 to 48. The hours of married men in the city will not be increased beyond 44.

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
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BALLARAT LIVE STOCK MARKET.

BEAUFORT H.E. SCHOOL.

ARBOR DAY CEREMONY.

In order to celebrate Arbor Day, the Beaufort school children assembled at the school endowment plantation on Friday afternoon, 21st inst., to plant a memorial tree to their former patron, the late Sir Alexander Peacock. Crs. C. H. McKay (shire president), R. A. D. Sinclair (representing the A.N.A.), members of the School Committee and Mothers' Guild were present. The weather was very bleak, making it necessary for the ceremony to be as brief as possible. The ground has been prepared for a number of memorial trees to prominent Australians, and also for 500 pines.

Mr R. G. Scott the head teacher, welcomed the visitors, and explained that it had been their intention to plant six trees to-day, but owing to an oversight on the part of the nurseryman, they had not arrived. They were indebted to Miss Coates for this tree—a beautiful horse chestnut, which would be planted near the entrance gate.

Cr. McKay then addressed the children. He said that Arbor Day was very important in every country in the world. He explained some of the details necessary to tree-planting, and touched briefly upon the subject of afforestation. This tree was being planted in memory of Sir Alexander Peacock, who, during his lifetime, had always been very interested in the Beaufort school. He had been the means of procuring this land for a plantation. For 40 years he had made his constituency his chief interest, and had always thought of the children. The other great Australians to whom memorial trees were to be planted were the late Sir John Monash, Mr Bert Hinkler, Sir Edmond Barton, Mr Alfred Denoon, and Major Mitchell. He hoped that the boys and girls would take great care of this tree, and that each year when its new leaves appeared, they would be reminded of Sir Alexander.

Cr. Sinclair supported Cr. McKay's remarks; recalling several happy incidents of good times Sir Alexander and he had had together as young men.

Crs. McKay and Sinclair then planted the tree.

Mr Scott thanked the councillors, Mr H. J. Buchanan, and the Mothers' Guild for their co-operation; and also apologised for the absence of Mr W. J. Bruce Johnson (secretary of the plantation trust), owing to illness.

POLICE COURT.

Messrs. R. A. D. Sinclair and D. F. Troy, J's.P., were in attendance at the Beaufort Police Court on Monday. A debt case that had been settled out of court was withdrawn. Colin Campbell proceeded against W. Fleetwood Smith for the recovery of a debt of £1 19 6, owing for goods sold and delivered. The Bench gave an order for the amount, with 16/ costs. Percy James Kelly applied for a real estate sub-agent's licence. No objections having been received by the clerk of courts (Mr Reddie), the application was granted.

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
