## ENGINEER'S REPORT.

OCTOBER, 1935.

The following report by the engin-eer (Mr E. S. Grouch, C.E., L.S.) will be dealt with at the meeting of the Ripon Shire Council on Monday:-

1. Willows.-Whilst in Melbourne, I took the opportunity of making personal enquiries at the office of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission, regarding willows. From enquiries made, I would recommend:-(1.) That willows be removed from the embankment of the Goldfields Reservoir, and that should the necessity for protection, on which account they were originally placed there, again arise, it be met later by stone beaching and gravelling. (2.) That permission for the planting of willows on the banks of the Emu Creek at Skipton, as left in my hands,

Standing in this awkward position, my finger already trembled on the trigger. Standing bravely to the gun, a thousand thoughts flashed through my mind. Should I fail to hit him, what then? If I should only wound him, it would be worse. I had only one charge to depend on. It must be sure and certain. Can I do it? This would be my first shot from the gun I had loaded myself. Would it go off? Had I placed the charge right? I was not sure. Where must I shoot to kill him instantly? His head? No, too small a target. His heart? Where was that, I knew that if I failed, I would at once be torn to pieces and eaten. Although I could not see him for the rock, I knew his glaring eyeballs and blood-red fangs would soon annear. Eech second seemed a minute. Would he never come? These awful moments of waiting in this cramped position soon began to take toll of me. Large drops of sweat poured down my face and threatened to blind me ere they dripped from my nose to the gun.
