
PRESENTATION OF TROPHIES.

ANNUAL MEETING.

BEAUFORT DISTRICT CLUB FORMED.

Football is to be re-organised in the Beaufort district this season, and there are prospects of much better support from sporting business men. Mr W. J. Gray, president of the club which functioned two years ago, presided at a meeting of 21 intending members, held at Mr A. Lewell's Cafe on Wednesday night.

Mr Gray said the meeting had been called to ascertain if they intended to follow up the old game. There were two teams two years ago, and one team would have to raise less money. The old club had a debt of $\pounds 20/17/$, and he appealed to them to see what they could do to liquidate the debt. The C.Y.M.S. Club also finished up in debt last vear. They would have to put heart and soul into it to carry on the club. There was a credit balance of 15/ at the bank.

Mr C. Lang said that newcomers to the town were prepared to support a football team, but not to carry the old debts.

Mr Gray said Mr Lang did not know the difficulties they had had to carry on under.

Mr Lang moved that a football club be formed, to be known as the Beaufort and District Football Club. Seconded by Mr J. B. Hewitt, and carried.

Mr F. Sheehan said the support would not be wholehearted, unless an obligation were given to honor that debt, but it must not be a binding one.

The matter was discussed, and it was understood that the old debt would be honored, if the club finished the year in a good financial position. A good deal of business was transacted on Tuesday night, when Mr H. Hooke officiated as chairman at the fortnightly meeting at the Mechanics' Institute of the Beaufort Literary and Debating Society. Twelve members and several visitors were present. Apologies were received for several absentces. A letter was read from the University Extension Board, stating that it would be possible to have two lectures at Beaufort-one on May 25th, and the other during the August vacation .---The secretary (Mr W. V. C. Jenkin) said he had asked for three lectures. The Waubra Debating Society wrote, asking that a debate be arranged for two months hence, to take place at Beaufort. Mr A. R. Beggs, Niauwanda, wrote, forwarding his resignation as a member, owing to his inability to attend the meetings. It was decided to write, informing the University Extension Board that two or more lectures in the August-September vacation were desired; the choice of lecturers and subjects to be left to the committee. The general opinion was that a change should be made in both the University Extension lecturers who visited Beaufort and the type of subjects. The matter of the Waubra v Beaufort debate was left in the hands of the syllabus committee. Mr A. R. Beggs' 'resignation was received with regret, and he is to be thanked for his past services; the hope being expressed that he would re-join later. Two new members were elected. Mr H. J. Buchanan (president) extended a welcome to Messrs. F. Webster and B. Hooke, two new members. Several visitors who attended were welcomed by the chairman. MONTHLY MEETING.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Various matters came up for attention at the monthly meeting of the Beaufort School Committee at the Shire Hall on Monday night, which was presided over by Mr A. J. Hughes (chairman). Six members were present. The correspondent (Mr Buchanan) said that another water-pipe burst had occurred at the school, and had been repaired-the fourth in three months. Mr H. Drake reported that he had as yet been unable to obtain a load of stable manure for the school garden. The Ararat School Committee wrote, asking for co-operation in securing a visit from the Departmental dental van in this part of the State. A circular was received, offering framed portraits of the King for sale for 25/.--The fact was mentioned that there was no portrait of the King in the school, and the matter was held over for the present. Mr Drake moved that this committee co-operate with the Ararat committee in an effort to get a visit from the Education Department's dental van. Seconded by Mr Wells, and carried. Mr Dalrymple (head teacher) reported that the average attendance was keeping up well in the lower portion of the school, although they had lost two boys from the H.E. School. He reminded the committee about a bag of lime required for the school. He also reported on the bursting of a water pipe at the school. The sloyd teacher had full classes, both morning and afternoon. He had ordered 680 young trees for the plantation, which needed clearing of gum suckers. The trees / already planted were doing well, and many young trees were coming up. Mr Johnson had told him he thought there was a little money left in the Plantation Fund, and he was going to inspect the plantation with him on the following Thursday morning. Mr Buchanan urged that more wattles be planted on the flat to fill it up. Įt was resolved to ask the local forester, Mr T. D. Bailes, to prepare the wattle seed for planting. The head teacher reported that the combined schools' sports had gone off satisfactorily. Although Beaufort school had not won the shield, their team had done remarkably well off scratch. He was not quite satisfied with the attendance of local people, but some of the business people considered that the sports should be held on a Saturday afternoon. After some discussion, Mr R. Mackay moved that this meeting favored the combined schools' sports being held on a Saturday afternoon. Seconded by Mr J. Cole, and carried. The head teacher said that the presentation of the Thistle Club shield would be made at a combined schools' concert, to be held on the 29th inst, and that the proceeds of the entertainment were to be given to the local B.N. Hospital and the Ballarat Hospital. The presentation of Coronation medals was to take place on 7th May, and a programme had been laid down by the Education Department. Cr. D. F. Troy (shire president) is to be asked by the chairman to actend and present the medals, and also to deliver an address. The head teacher further reported that the Empire Day function would be held later in May. He suggested that the committee make an effort to raise funds by means of a picture night or concert party. It was decided to approach the picture show proprietor in regard to a picture night, and to make enquiries about a concert party.
