



MR. WILLIAM AHERN.

THE death occurred, after a long THE death occurred, after a long illness, on Friday, 29th October, at the St. John of God Hospital, Bal-larat, of Mr William Ahern, a well-known and highly respected Euram-been farmer. Deceased, who was 73 years of age, was born at Stockyard Hill, and went to Eurambeen with his recents when two years old. With the exception of nine years spent in the Wimmera, he lived all his life at Eurambeen; being a resident of the district for 64 years. The late Mr Ahern was a man of pronounced views in regard to Shire Council matters, and always had the courage of his onivions He was several times apopinions. He was several times approached and asked to become a candidate for municipal honours, but declined. However, he always took a keen interest in shire elections, and municipal affairs generally. He was a leading member and treasurer of keen interest in shire elections, and the Middle Creek branch, A.N.A., for many years, a valued member of the Middle Creek Public Hall Committee, a member of the Beaufort Catholic congregation, and was al-ways ready to assist any movement for the benefit of his particular disa Justice of the Peace and regularly attended the sittings of the Beaufort Police Court, until prevented from Police Court, until prevented from doing so by ill health. He was an up-right, sincere, kindly man, and the district will be the poorer for his passing. He leaves a widow and two sons, Messrs. John Patrick and Cor-nelius Ahern, of Eurambeen. A bro-ther (Mr Cornelius Ahern) resides at Minyip, and a sister (Mrs Fleming) in Melbourne Three other sisters Minyip, and a sister (Mrs Fleming) in Melbourne. Three other sisters (Mesdames McGregor, Liston, and Brown) are deceased. Mrs S. Bald-win, of Beaufort, is a sister-in-law. The great esteem in which the late Mr Ahern was held was evident by the large and representative attend-

ance of residents of the town and district at his funeral on Sunday; there being about 120 motor cars in the cortege. His remains were interred in the Catholic portion of the Beaufort Cemetery. About 20 members of the Middle Creek and Beau fort branches of the A.N.A. preceded the hearse from the Cemetery rates, and also formed a guard of honour to the grave. Among the many beautiful floral tributes of sympathy was a special wreath from fellow members of the Middle Creek branch, A.N.A. The coffin was borne to the grave by Messrs. J. Ahern, W. Ahern, F. Liston, J. Liston, T. Liston, and J. Mulcahy (nephews of deceased). The pallbearers were Messrs. M. Mulcahy, Bearers were Messrs. M. Mulcany, Richard Bell, John Jess, L. Walsh, W. Riley, T. Hew-itt, J. Hillman, G. Star, W. Wald-ron, D. Humphrey, C. Waldron, L. Franc, and W. Jess. The chief mourners were Mrs Ahern (widow), Messrs. J. P. and C. Ahern (sons), Mr and Mrs C. Ahern (brother and sister-in-law), and Mrs S. Baldwin (sister-in-law), who were accompanied by many other relatives. Rev. Father Dunworth, of Ararat, conduct-ed the Roman Catholic burial service. The funeral arrangements were in the hands of Mr J. Dunn, of Ararat.


ENGINEER'S REPORT.

AN INCIDENT AT FIERY CREEK.

The following incident at Fiery Creek was described as follows in the "Ararat Advertiser" of 1862:— Another case of sticking up occur-red on Sunday morning on the Fiery Creek road, a little beyond Mr Beggs' station. A man named Keibsch, who resides near Geelong, was driving his bullock team from Ararat, after delivering some goods, when he was intercepted by two bushrangers with crepe on their faces and mounted on two horses. They took from the man £1/15/, 5/ of which they returned af-ter they had taken him a short way into the bush and searched him they ter they had taken mm a short way into the bush and searched him thor-oughly. Constable Newton was im-mediately despatched in pursuit. On Monday two of the police arrested a man on suspicion, who gave his name as David Barker. He was apprehended on the road to Mt. Cole and could not at first be prevailed upon. to pull up his horse. After half an hour's hard riding in pursuit, they gained on the fugitive, and succeeded in seizing hold him by the collar. He then resisted and was subjected to very rough treatment before he could be prevailed upon to accompany the officers to Ararat. So determined was he, say the constables, not to be arrested, that when near a tent he jumped from his horse and rushed inside, where he seized hold of a kind, of cross-beam and clung to it with such tenacity as to necessitate its being sawn through before he could be dragged away. About £28 in notes and sovereigns were found on his person, together with some gold dust and a revolver. David Barker has since been recognised as a respect-able man, a dairy farmer living near Glen Dhu. He is well known to several of our townsmen, who offered to go bail to any amount for his imma-

diate release.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

VISIT OF CENTENARY PREACHER.

TO celebrate the Centenary year of

the Presbyterian Church of Victoria, a service was conducted by the toria, a service was conducted by the Rev. McLean Shugg (one of the Cen-tenary preachers) at St. Andrew's Church, Beaufort, on Sunday even-ing. There was a fair attendance. Rev. McLean Shugg chose as his text, "Thou shalt remember all the way which the Lord thy God led thee" In the course of an inspiring thee." In the course of an inspiring address, he said that in everything they should give thanks. To-day the people of God in the Presbyterian churches were thinking over the century that had passed in the life of the Church, and were meeting to-gether to give God thanks for it. A hundred years ago the Presbyterian Church in this country had consisted of a handful, meeting for worship be-cause their hearts belonged to God, and because they had a keen desire to link themselves with the God of their fathers, and set up a sanctuary here; making it God's own country. Their desire was to evangelise the new community. Since then, won-derful things had been done. All over Australia were churches and buildings erected in the early times, and speaking of God. These pioneers were our forebears, just like ourselves, with the same mental and physical capacity, the same possibilities. It was to their shame that they had not developed their religion like the pioneers had done. They had inherited a great tradition and a great enterprise. His experiences only covered the last quarter of a century, but in that time he had seen the Church almost double its enterprises for Christ. The people had sought to love God, and had in them a missionary spirit, coming from a long line of faithful ones for Christ. It had learnt the lesson of giving God thanks, even in misfortune. In 1914 Great War broke out, and all hearts were heavy and anxious. Then the greatest drought in the history of the land came. The whole country, was a desolate dustheap. In March, 1915, when the harvest thanksgiving 1915, when the harvest thanksgiving service came round, the question was raised if there could be one. After consultation, the churches decided to give thanks for other benefits—to count up the things owing to God in the midst of their misfortune. Only fools grew bitter and hard and comdid them good, and so did misfortune. a greater prosperity to come. After the 1914 drought, the land was liter-ally "flowing in milk and honey." Under nature, who was God, the land had a wonderful rest, and so next year there was superabundance, be-cause of misfortune. So, in the garden of their souls, they should learn the lesson. Let misfortune throw them more on God. It was His way of training them and making of them better stuff. Then they should thank God for life's compensations. When they disobeyed God's law they brought punishment upon themselves, but although disciplined, they were given compensations. In the time of the depression, many men knew unemployment. Numbers lost faith in themselves, and were depressed and embittered; but one of God's compen-sations was that these men found out their true and good friends in their misfortune. If there were not darkness, they would not know the stars, so in life they were conscious of the firmament of their souls shin-ing upon them. They had learned this time and again in their Church in this time and again in their Church in this last century. Christianity was a plant that should always blossom. Toasted Marshmallows.

Two cups (or niore) Kellogg's Corminates of Wheat Flakes COLL ON DECK Ibs. sugar pint water

- 2 ozs. powdered gelatin. egg whites
- teaspoon vanilla and 1 teaspoon lomo Few drops red colouring.

Soak the sugar in half a pint of

LAKE GOLDSMITH.

SHIRE OF RIPON. Infantile Paralysis Epidemic.

Owing to the possibility of cases occurring in the near future, the following matters are brought under the notice of Parents and Guardians.

The disease is spread by direct contact, and the incidence can be definitely prevented or the spread reduced by strictly isolating children who show any signs of illness. There is no reason for panic, but it is recommended that should any child become ill during the next few months:---

- 1. The child should be put to bed immediately and isolated from other children. 2. If there is any doubt as to the reason for the illness, consult a
- Doctor immediately. By doing this you will be protecting your neighbour's children. 3. Should the child have contracted the disease, by keeping the
- child in bed the serious after effects will be minimised. A. A child that is run down or tired is more likely to contract the
- disease than one that is healthy. 5. In many cases the attack is mild and difficult to diagnose : by
- keeping the child in bed there is less risk of serious damage being done. 6. Do not take or allow any child to go to any town or district
- where a case has occurred, to pictures or any entertainment, or any place where children are likely to congregate. It is expected that the epidemic will die out in the Autumn, so that by restraint for only a few months you will protect your children from the possibility of serious physical handicap.
- 7. Care, nutritious food, STRICT ISOLATION and EARLY MEDICAL ADVICE only can prevent infection and spread of the disease.

Early Symptoms are: Feverishness, headache, restlessness, sometimes pains in limbs. Symptoms of Paralysis do not develop for 5 to 7 days from onset.

Children visiting an infected area or coming in contact with infection must be isolated for three weeks.

Infantile Paralysis Precautions.

The following instructions must therefore be strictly observed by Parents, otherwise their premises will be quarantined. 1. Your children must be kept home. (This does not apply to

children whose school class has not been closed). 2. Your children must not be permitted to leave the house or to play with children from other houses.

2. You are advised to communicate with your Doctor if any suspicious illness occurs amongst your children. Children must be kept away from schools, playgrounds, kinder-,

gartens, picture theatres, swimming baths, etc., until further notice.

r. Visitors to your house should be restricted as far as possible, and you are requested not to visit other houses. On behalf of the Health Committee,
