LARCENY OF BICYCLE.

CHARGED with larceny of a bicycle valued at £4/10/, the property of Frederick Webster, junr., of Beaufort, James Dryden, aged 17 years, appeared before Messrs. R. A. D. Sinclair and D. F. Troy, J's.P., at the Beaufort Police Court on Monday, and was sentenced to one month's imprisonment; the sentence being suspended upon defendant undertaking to enter upon a bond to be of good behaviour for 12 months. First-constable L. Roche prsecut-

Frederick Webster, junr., stated on oath that he was a bank teller, residing with his parents at Lawrence p.m. on Novr. 23, he left his bicycle in the back yard of his place of residence, and when he went to get it at about 11 p.m., he found that it was missing. He gave nobody permission to take it, and he identified the bicycle produced in court as his property.

Herbert Frank Holyhead, sworn, stated that he was a constable of police, stationed at Stawell East. At 4.30 p.m. on Novr. 24, he interviewed Dryden at the Stawell East police station. When questioned as to where he got the bicycle from, defendant said that it was outside the fence of a house with a boxthorn hedge around it at the other end of Beaufort. He also stated that nobody gave him permission to take the machine. From further inquiries made, witness ascertained that the bicycle (produced) was similar to the one reported stolen from Beaufort, and defendant was then charged with larceny of a bicycle.

In answer to the Bench. Constable Holyhead said that when first questioned. defendant tried to cover up the offence for a while, but later he admitted everything.

Defendant said he had no questions to ask, and pleaded guilty.


When questioned by the Bench, Dryden said that he came down from Shepparton, and had got a lift in a motor truck from the other side of Ballarat to Beaufort. He was going through to Adelaide, and he took the bicycle because his mate had one, and he (defendant) did not want to walk any further than he could help. He made no effort to sell the machine.

First-constable Roche stated that defendant had no parents. was only 17 years of age, and the police had nothing against him ....

Mr Sinclair (chairman of the Bench) said that it was quite apparent defendant knew he was doing wrong when he took the bicycle, and the Bench had decided to sentence him to one month's imprisonment, but if he was prepared to treat this case as a lesson to him to keep out of trouble in the future, they would, upon defendant entering into a bond to be of good behaviour for 12 months, suspend the sentence.

Defendant said that he would do this. and promised to keep out of trouble in the future.



# ENGINEER'S REPORT.

The following report by the engin-eer (Mr E. S. Crouch. C.E., L.S.) will be dealt with at the meeting of the Ripon Shire Council on Monday:-1. Power Grader.—A progress report is in preparation, and should be submitted in detail at the meeting. Work tallied to date shows 5.26 miles scarified and reshaped, two realignments superclevated, and 29.40 miles of road maintenance bladed. One favorable costing showed 2.6 miles of work maintained at a cost of 12/6 Other costings are in per mile. progress.

2. Damage by Rains.—The heavy rains of Dec. 2nd and 3rd have caused gravel to be washed from the surface of roads in a number of places, due to insufficient culvert provision for the exceptional flows experienced. The amount of damage has not, however, been of great consequence. being given as reand attention is quired. Reports indicate only one structure damaged, that of a very old culvert at Po-Peep, where portion of the bluestone wall was undermined, and collapsed. Repairs are in progress. The intensity of rain in Beaufort showed the heaviest 24-hour fall for 35 years, and indicated places where drainage lines could, with advantage, be increased in capacity. The diversion drain at Jonathan's Reservoir was inadequate for this storm.
