> COLONEL STREET URGES ESTABLISHMENT OF SMALL STANDING ARMY.

'WOULD HAVE MORAL EFFECT.'

WHEN the defence vote was being considered in the House of representatives recently, the member for Corangamite, Colonel G. A. Street, urged consideration of the advisability of the establishment of a small standing army that would be the neuclus of a trained force which could be expanded in an emergency, he pointed out, but it would obviate the inevitable delay that occurred on mobilisation, and at the same time have a moral effect upon the volunteer forces. Australia should make greater provision for the training of staff forces. Colonel Street urged upon the Government the necessity of having a greater number of trained officers at the disposal of the nation in the event of an emergency, and requested that the Government look into the conditions governing the entry of potential officers into training colleges, with a view to making the conditions more attractive. The defence vote. £5.992.000. was agreed to on the voices: The amount is exclusive of the expenditure from trust funds and loan funds.
