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

BEAUFORT DISTRICT COMPETITION.





POWER BY FORCE


ASSERTIONS that the German na tion was overwhelmingly opposed to Nazism, that most people condemn ed the Jewish persecutions, and that the Hitler regime held power simply by brute force, were made by a passenger in the "Orford," which re cently reached Fremantle from Eng-

The passenger was a German who fought for his country in the Great War, and who later served in the German Flying Corps. He is now a political refugee, and he asked that his name should be withheld from publication to prevent action being taken by the Nazi party against the members of his family, who are still in Germany.

"I have come to Australia to make my home, because it is impossible to live longer in our country," he said "This is on account of the ruthless methods adopted by the Nazis. 

WE regret to record the death at the age of 78 years of a former and well-respected Beaufort resident in the person of Mr Robert Sturrock Paterson, retired schoolmaster. The deceased was the only son of the late Mr and Mrs James Paterson, of "Roseberry," Sailor's Gully, and was born at Carngham on 23rd January 1860. His death took place on 4th May, 1938, after an illness of two years. He leaves a widow, two sons and a daughter to mourn their loss and his death is deeply regretted by a wide circle of old friends. His eldest son, Bruce, was an Anzac captain of the 27th Battalion, and was at the evacuation of Gallipoli.
