## Signs of District Football Revival --- Ding-Dong Game at Raglan.

### FOOTBALL.

#### RIPON COMPETITION.

#### EXCITING MATCH BETWEEN RAGLAN AND ELMHURST.

WHAT was generally voted to be the most keenly-contested game of football in the district for years, was witnessed on the Raglan Reserve on Saturday, when that team defeated Elmhurst by 11 points, after a strenuous struggle. A few more matches of the kind would definitely establish the popularity of the recently re-formed Ripon Football Association, and bring about the long hoped for revival of public interest in the winter game. The attendance of about 150 on Saturday was promising, and the gate receipts were £5/9/6. About 30 motor cars lined the arena, and Elmhurst had a good following of supporters. Half-way through the closing quarter, the teams were on even terms, and the result was in doubt until four minutes before the final bell. T. Williams had charge of the game, but was rather lenient in regard to rough play. The other officials were:—Boundary umpires, Messrs. V. Tiley and T. Rogers; goal umpires, Messrs. J. Keith and K. Lewis; timekeepers, Messrs. Baker and L. Tucker; gatekeeper, Mr. E. Tiley. Raglan was captained by W. Cleary, and Elmhurst by H. Hyde. During the early part of the game, a dog caused amusement and irritation by following the players about the field.

Honours were even in the first quarter; each team having a couple of scoring shots. Raglan opened their account with a single. Later, G. Grant snapped their first goal, and H. Hyde goalked for Elmhurst. Quarter-time scores:—Raglan, 1—1; Elmhurst, 1—1.

Elmhurst had the better of the encounter in the second term, with six scoring shots to two. A nice kick by A. Dawson gave Elmhurst their second goal, and after the ball had been forced out of bounds near the objective, R. Douglas got the visitors' third goal with a beautiful snapshot. Then Raglan came into the picture. A. Spicer sent the ball spinning straight for the opening, but Baker saved brilliantly for Elmhurst right in the goal mouth. Cleary again drove the ball forward, and G. Grant marked in slashing style, and registered Raglan's second goal. Out of a scramble in the forward area, Nugent secured the home side's third goal with a snapshot. Throughout the term Elmhurst was playing an open game, but Raglan was inclined to adopt crowding tactics. Elmhurst's kicking was astray, as they registered four behinds. Pike (the veteran of many seasons), Laitlaw, Hyde, and Douglas were the stars of the side. At half-time the visitors were four points in the lead. Scores:—Elmhurst, 3—5; Raglan, 3—1.

Both teams were now getting fairly into their stride, and they made the pace a cracker in the third quarter. Raglan scored three times, and Elmhurst twice. Arthur Spicer had a shot for Raglan, but the ball unfortunately hit the goal-post, and only one flag went up. G. Grant (who was the best man on his side, and was playing a cool, effective game) drove the ball into position; R. Crocker taking a mark and securing Raglan's fourth major point. Raglan now led by three points. Their next attack was thwarted dangerously close to goal by Reg. Sandlant. Baker, a trusty full back, made another timely save for Elmhurst. Elmhurst now took a hand, and Hyde fluked a goal for them with a quick snap along the ground. This put the visitors in the lead again. W. Cleary, who had been doing great work for Raglan, was assisted off the ground with a sprained ankle. Elmhurst's fifth goal was obtained by Hyde, with a splendid shot at a distance

of from 40 to 50 yds. The quarter was notable for the promise shown by several Raglan cuts. Tallies at three-quarter-time were:—Elmhurst, 5—5; Raglan, 4—3.

At the last change, Elmhurst led by eight points, and the players and spectators were keyed up for a ding-dong final quarter. They were not disappointed. Raglan's 19th man, Alex. Spicer, who had taken Cleary's place, marked nicely from Grant, but the ball was forced out of bounds. Soon after a single had been scored, F. Crocker snapped Raglan's fifth goal, and reduced the visitors' lead to one point. Another snapshot from R. Crocker's boot gave Raglan a single and levelled the scores. Then the fun started; each side striving their hardest to put the flags in motion. Hyde drove the ball close to Elmhurst's objective, but G. Grant saved brilliantly a few feet from the sticks. After an exciting tussle in front of Raglan's goal, the ball was forced out of play close to the behind post. Coming again, Raglan forced the ball through the opening, and the resultant behind gave them a lead of one point. With only four minutes to go, G. Drew snapped a goal for Raglan, and gave them an advantage of seven points. Then A.

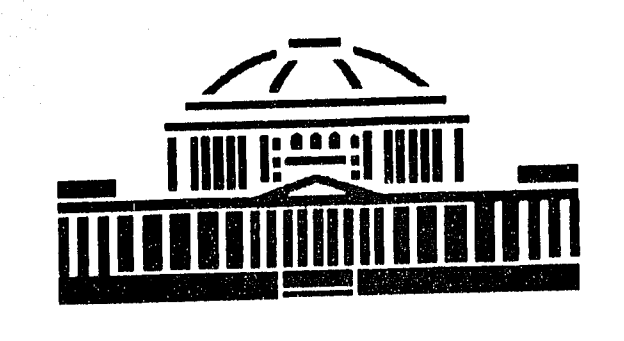

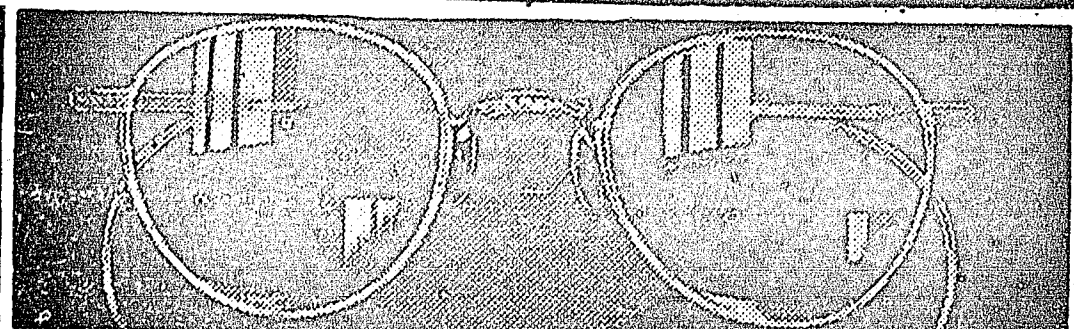

# ST. JOHN'S V. BREWSTER.

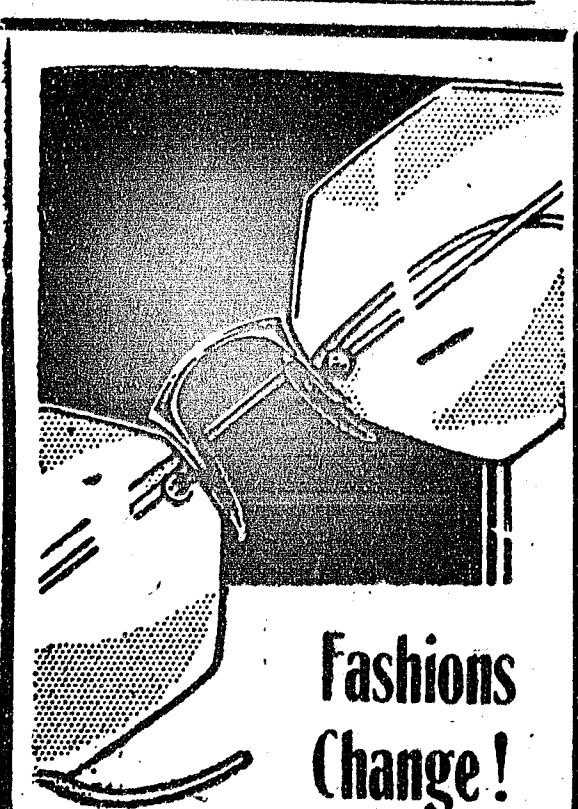
The Beaufort St. John's team visited Brewster. The home side had an easy win, scoring 30 goals to the visitors' three.

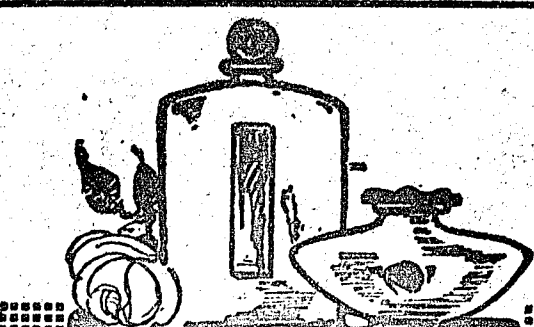

# OBITUARY.

# MR. FRANK STEVENS.

WE regret to record the death in the Camperdown District Hospital, on Sunday, June 5, of Mr Frank Stevens, a former resident of Waterloo, at the age of 53 years, after three weeks' illness. The deceased entered the Lismore Bush Nursing Hospital, suffering from an attack of appendicitis. Peritonitis supervened, and he was taken to the Camperdown Hospital, where an operation was performed. Cardiac failure followed, and was the cause of death. The deceased had, for the past few years, been residing at Lismore, and had gained the respect of all who knew him, by his quiet, unassuming manner. He leaves two brothers (Messrs. Will Stevens Beaufort, and Tom Stevens, Corryong, and two sisters (Miss Jessie Stevens, Somerville, and Mrs E. Hinton, Glenhantly). Another brother (Mr Ern. Stevens) was killed in the Great War. The funeral of the late Mr. Frank Stevens took place, on Tuesday, his remains being interred in the Beaufort Cemetery. The services at the home of his brother (Mr Will Stevens) and at the graveside were conducted by the Rev. J. P. MacDougall, M.A. of the Presbyterian Church. The coffin was carried by the following relatives and friends—Messrs. E. Hinton, A. Morcomb, W. McCombe, and Geo. Skene; the pallbearers being Messrs. A. Walker J. McEwale, R. Perry, E. Stevens C. Droling, N. S. McLeod, J. F. Wotherspoon, and C. M. Flynn. The funeral arrangements were carried out by Messrs. Collie & Brennan, undertakers, Camperdown.

# MR. ANDREW FRASER.

ANOTHER old and well-respected resident of the Beaufort district Mr Andrew Fraser, has joined the great majority. The sad event took place at his home, "The Grange," Lake Goldsmith, on Wednesday night, after an illness of nine months' duration. The deceased who was 83 years of age, was a native of Pifeshire, Scotland, and came to Victoria with his pioneer parents when nine years of age. He had thus lived in this State for 74 years. The family, when they arrived in the district, lived on Stoneleigh station, and Mr Fraser, subsequently acquired a farm at Lake Goldsmith. When a young man, Mr Andrew Fraser bought the Lake Goldsmith farm, known as "The Grange," and had resided there ever since. He was noted for his industrious habits, honest and independent ways. In business matters his word was his bond. He was a man whose chief interest was his land, and he was a successful farmer. He became a member of the Beaufort Agricultural Society when it was formed in 1870, and had continued his membership for 67 years. About 38 years ago he married a daughter of the late Mr and Mrs James Paterson of Nerring, and his widow, a son, daughter and five grandchildren survive him. The son is Mr James Fraser, of Lake Goldsmith, and the daughter, Mrs. Stan Holdsworth, of Beulah. He had two sisters and three brothers (deceased). The remains of the late Mr Andrew Fraser were interred in the Beaufort Cemetery on Friday afternoon; the funeral being attended by a large number of representative residents of the town and district.

# WANDERINGS OF MR. LEO YOUNG.

# NOW IN SOUTH AMERICA.

FURTHER wanderings of Mr Leo Young (son of Mr and Mrs S. Young of Beaufort) have taken him to South America. After another three months in Paris, his route was via Trieste, an Austrian port before the War, but now an Italian port at the top of the Adriatic Sea. It was full of soldiers, and very troublesome regulations as to customs, passports, politics, vaccination, and general health, had to be overcome before one was safely aboard the steamer. Rather awkward when the officials do not speak English, and the voyager does not understand Italian. The passengers mostly comprised Polish, Austrian and Jewish refugees, with some Italians and Jugo-Slavs. After passing through the Straits of Messina with myriads of lights from towns on either side, and a volcano in sight, to Naples, it was a novelty to call at Algiers, on northern coast of

Africa. It is a French city, with a mixed population of Arabs, Negroes, Greeks, and groups of people from the countries bordering on the Mediterranean, and a big number of French colonial, coloured troops. A city, contrasts, with its modern cafes, casinos, hotels, theatres, well laid out, with well-lit promenades in close proximity to native bazars and quarters, where one does not venture alone. Then a short call at Gibraltar, which appeared placid, though in a sheltered bay, almost out of sight, the main portion of the British Mediterranean fleet was in readiness. The first port of call in South America was Pernambuco, a dull place on a flat shore, then Bahia, hilly and picturesque, with people of lighter colour than expected and Portuguese the prevailing tongue. Rio de Janeiro thrilled our wanderer, and to quote verbatim from his letter, "Boast on, proud and complacent Sydney—you who think yourself without a rival. Rio is your superior in every way, with its lovely civic buildings, shady tree-lined streets, every vacant inch of ground with charming gardens, up-to-date transport system, with a more expansive harbour whiter sands, and mountains rising from its shores, along which run splendid roads to their heights. Its skyline of buildings of 21 stories and more, are much more impressive than your squat blocks of flats." Against New York's mammoths however, Rio's would look like cottages. Leaving by night, high up on the mountain side, the figure of Christ, 80 feet high, with arms stretched in a scene floodlit, and appears to be poised in the air. Its erection is considered as one of the greatest engineering feats in that part of the world. Calls were made at Santos and Rio Grande, places of export for coffee and cocoa, both tropical looking, built on estuaries at the mouths of large rivers. The well-known sea chantie, "I'm from the Rio Grande," must have received its title because the versifier could not rhyme Janeiro. Brazilian coinage deserves a passing word, as a tram ride costs 600 reis, but a reis is only a fortieth of a penny. With a 20,000 reis paper note, one feels wealthy, but it does not go far. Passing from the Brazilian coast, Monte Video, capital of Uruguay, was the next point of interest before the last lap of 422 miles up the estuary of the De Plata river, to the first city of South America, Buenos Aires, which has a population of 2,500,000, and is the capital of Argentine Republic. Spanish is spoken here, a pesos equal to a shilling is the coinage daily papers half-penny, and super films, three to a programme, may be seen for a pesos. As Mr Leo Young will spend six months in this great city, his impressions of same will be looked forward to with interest.

To all other places... 1d per 2 oz. For delivery within the Commonwealth... 1d per 4 oz.

EDITORIAL.

PROFITING BY MISTAKES.

EVERY man of business, tiller of the soil, tradesman, doctor, lawyer, statesman, and soldier has made serious mistakes in his time, but those who eventually attain success are those not too proud to turn their errors to good account. "Any man may commit a mistake, but none but a fool will continue in it," said Cicero. Stubbornness when carried to this extreme is suicidal, but it is astonishing how many otherwise estimable people are too pig-headed, when in the wrong, to ever make the admission to themselves let alone to well-meaning friends who try to give them good advice. There is a Chinese saying that "the glory is not in never falling, but in rising every time you fall." The tradition of the British Army that it never knows when it is beaten was given added lustre by our own Australian troops in the Great War who learned to profit by their errors. The individual in civil life who never knows when he is beaten but is willing to learn, more often lives to wield a powerful influence in the community in which he works than the man who carries his mistakes on, but refuses to admit his mistakes and use them as "stepping stones to higher things." Young, put it tersely when he wrote, "It is falling in love with our own mistaken ideas that makes fools and beggars of half mankind." Man may be "born to trouble as the sparks fly upward," but if he can school himself to take the hard knocks of life, score off them, and "fight the good fight," he will have little to regret when the eventide of his days comes.

LOCAL NOTES.

PROPOSED NEW MAIN ROAD.

AT the June meeting of the Ripon Shire Council, it was decided to endorse the recommendation of the engineer (Mr E. S. Crouch) that the Country Roads Board be asked to declare the Beaufort — Lexton road a main one. Other municipalities will no doubt take the matter up, with a view to having a good connecting link between the Western Highway and the main road from Maryborough to Castlemaine; the Ballarat — Hamilton main road being already connected to the Western Highway by the Skipton — Beaufort main road. As no other main road, between Ballarat on one side and Ararat on the other, serves motorists who desire to have a direct route from the Western District to Castlemaine and beyond the Country Roads Board may give the proposal serious consideration.

OBITUARY.

MR. FRED. SEADON.

WE regret to record the death of Ararat on Wednesday, of Mr Frederick Seadon, aged about 75 years. The deceased, who was a native of the Malayan States, had resided at Main Lead, Beaufort, for many years, and followed the occupation of a miner and gardener. Some years ago he was caretaker of the Beaufort golf links. He was an honest, industrious man, and was respected by all who knew him. He removed to Ararat some time ago. It was decided, on the motion of Mr Jenkin, that Messrs. Hodggets and Martin go into the matter of a pennant competition (billiards) between the Ararat Mechanics' Institute and Railways Institute teams and the Beaufort Mechanics' Institute team.

BALLARAT DISTRICT COUNCIL OF R.S.L.

ANNUAL MEETING.

MR. STAN. WALKER presided at the annual meeting of the Ballarat District Council of the Returned Soldiers' League, held on Tuesday night at the Soldiers' Institute, Ballarat. The Ripon sub-branch was represented by Messrs. S. Wells and S. R. Pascoe. The district State councillor (Mr C. H. McKay) was also present.

In the course of his annual report, the secretary (Mr Costello) stated that the board's scholarship had been won by Irene McKenzie, of Waterloo S.S., and the sum of £2 was duly paid to the Ripon sub-branch. The president moved the adoption of the report, paid a tribute to the splendid work of the secretary, and welcomed Clunes and Talbot into the fold.

Mr C. H. McKay, the district councillor, in seconding the motion, also stressed the admirable work done by Mr Costello, who was an untiring worker for the district council. There had been no State council meetings since the last meeting, and he had nothing fresh to report from headquarters. The motion was carried.

SOLDIERS AT POLLING BOOTHS

The district councillor reported having waited on the divisional returning officer at Maryborough or a question under dispute as to the employment of soldiers at polling booths. The D.R.O. had admitted making errors in the appointments, but they were quite understandable ones, for the reason that he did not know that the R.S.S.I.L.A. was acting in those areas. After a lengthy and quite friendly discussion, it was

R.S.S.I.L.A. had to be honest in its recommendations of men. The whole interview with the D.R.O. was very satisfactory.

The president said that they had found that there had been no victimisation in regard to Mr Costello, so far as the D.R.O. was concerned. However, they had now the privilege, all things being equal, of filling all positions with returned men.

One delegate pointed out that while the electoral office was willing to give preference to returned soldiers as poll clerks, it refused preference to them as D.R.O. or A.R.O. This delegate claimed that this distinction broke down the principle of preference utterly, a sentiment that the meeting supported.

Mr Costello, moving that the report be adopted, expressed thanks to the delegates for the fight they had put up for him in Avoca, and in seconding this, Mr D. Broken-shire urged that on every occasion when such question of preference arose, this district council should not hesitate to rise in their defence. The motion was carried.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

For the election of officers, Mr C. H. McKay was elected chairman.

On the motion of Mr Doherty (Daylesford) Mr Stan Walker was re-elected to the position of president, and in installing that gentleman, the chairman paid a warm tribute to Mr Walker's loyalty to the Soldiers' League.

Mr C. H. McKay was unanimously re-elected district councillor, and installed amidst applause; the president stating that Mr McKay stood very high in the opinion not only of this council but of headquarters also.

Mr McKay said that while he realised his limitations, he did sincerely try to help his old comrades through their difficulties, and was only too happy to be doing so.

Mr H. J. Costello (Avoca) was re-elected secretary amidst applause, and was assured that his work was keenly appreciated by every delegate.

An honorarium was granted to the secretary on the motion of Mr Thompson (Skipton), who mentioned that Mr Costello had recently adopted matrimonial responsibilities, and it was decided that this time it take the form of a wedding present. This was seconded by Mr Doherty (Daylesford), and carried amidst applause, and gracefully accepted by the secretary.

THE SCHOLARSHIP.

It was mentioned that all monies for the current scholarship of the district were due, and it was reported that the winner of the 1937-38 scholarship, Miss McKenzie, of Waterloo, was making excellent progress. She was doing very well attending school very regularly, and had justified her selection. At the end of the scholastic year, it would be found that she had done well.

Mr Norman asked if there was any way of increasing the age limit. It was felt that it was too low for children in the country.

Mr Wells (Ripon) claimed that the curriculum of the department would interfere with such a proposal from an educational viewpoint. It would be more beneficial to the children to keep the age and grade as they were.

The president said that the matter would not have to be completed until the next meeting.

This was fixed for the second Tuesday in September.

Subsequently delegates were the guests of the Ballarat sub-branch and occasion was taken to congratulate the president, secretary, and district councillor upon their reelection, while Mr Costello was also

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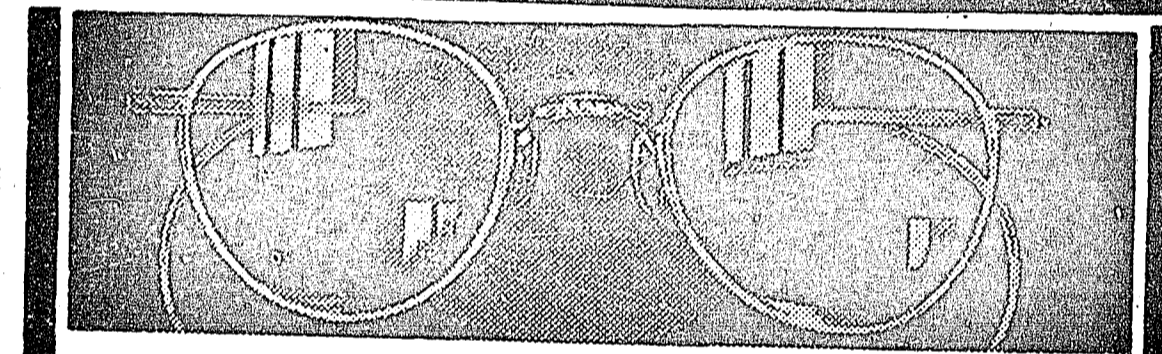

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OBITUARY.

FUNERAL OF MR ANDREW FRASER.

MR Andrew Fraser, the well-known Lake Goldsmith farmer, whose death was recorded in our last issue, was a staunch supporter of Stockyard Hill Presbyterian Church, and came to the district 68 years ago. He resided for 57 years at his farm, "The Grange," Lake Goldsmith, was a subscriber to the local paper since its first edition in 1874, and a member of the Beaufort Agricultural Society ever since it was formed in 1870. He was married in 1900 at Nerring to a daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Jas. Paterson; the Rev. J. Andrew Barber, who is well known throughout Australia as an inland missionary and administrator of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria, performing the ceremony when he was a young clergyman at Beaufort. The late Mr Andrew Fraser was a native of Fifeshire, Scotland, and came to Victoria with his parents when nine years of age. He was thus an Australian colonist of 74 years' standing; being 83 years old at the time of his death. The burial of the late Mr Andrew Fraser took place at the Beaufort Cemetery on Friday, 10th inst., the large and representative attendance of town and district residents showing the respect in which he was held. The funeral was met outside the cemetery gates by Engineer-commander H. P. McKenzie (chief of the Ballarat Caledonian Society), and Pipers Zilles and Urch of Ballarat, who preceded the cortege to the grave; the pipers playing "Lord Lovat's Lament." The coffin was carried to the grave by Messrs A. and J. Fraser, Birchip (nephews), W. Anderson (brother-in-law), R. Ward, J. Millar and D. R. Hannah. The chief mourners at the cemetery were Mr and Mrs J. P. Fraser (son and daughter-in-law), Mr Stan Holdsworth (son-in-law), Mr and Mrs W. Anderson (brother-in-law and sister-in-law), Miss R. W. Paterson (sister-in-law), Messrs A. and J. Fraser, of Birchip (nephews). After the burial service, which was impressively delivered by Rev. F. Thomas (Presbyterian), of Skipton, the pipers played "The Skye Boat Song." Among the large number of floral tributes were special wreaths from the Stockyard Hill Presbyterian Church, the Lake Goldsmith branch, U.A.C.P., and the Beaufort Agricultural Society. Messrs F. W. Barnes & Son carried out the funeral arrangements.

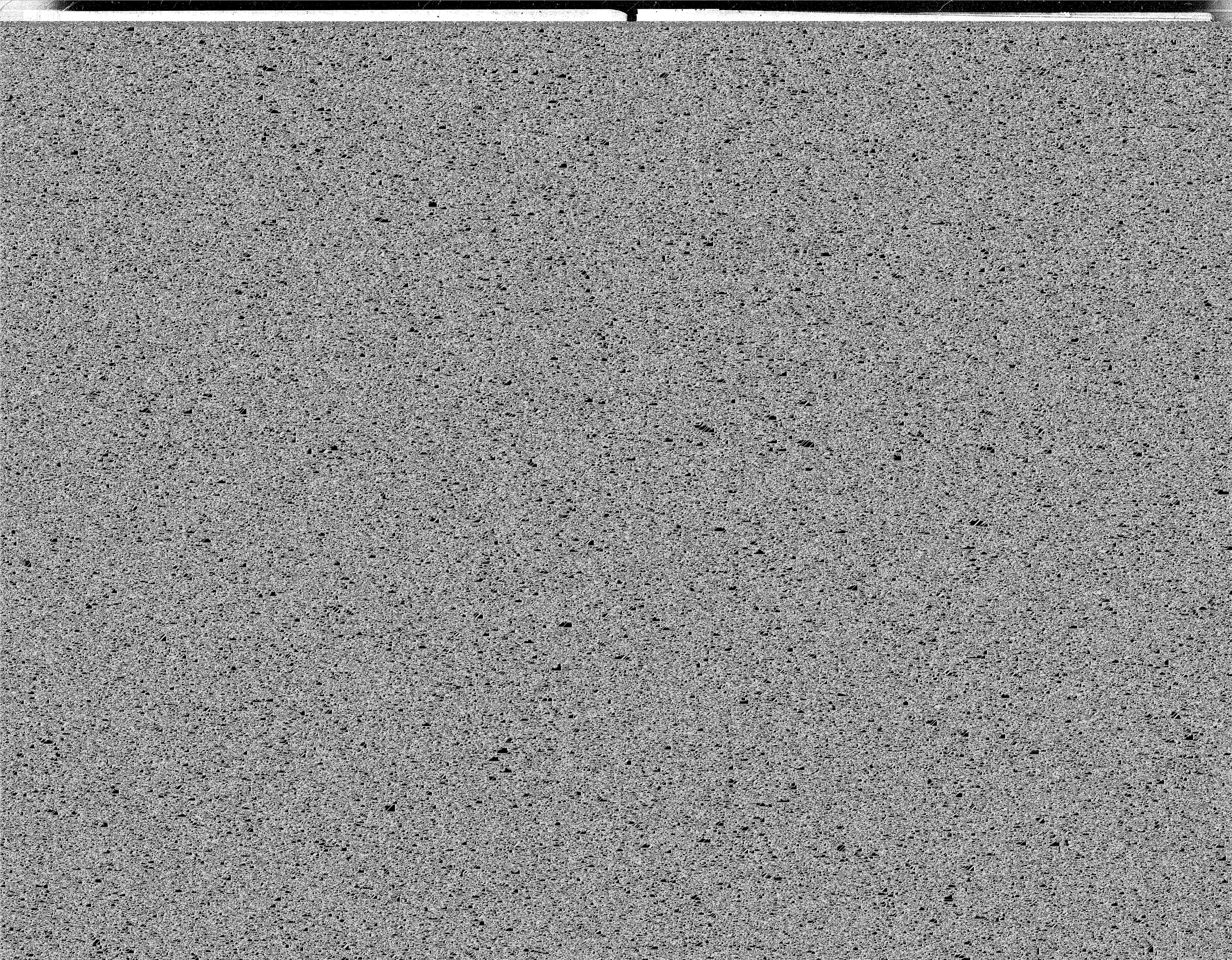

COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP.

RIPON ASSOCIATION ELIMINATED.

THE team representing the newly-formed Ripon Association was easily defeated by the Burrumbeet Association's team at the Beaufort Park on Wednesday, in the first eliminating match of the country championship competition, conducted by the Ballarat District of the Country Football League, for the Beaupre Shield, which is at present held by the Minnera Association. The final scores were:—Burrumbeet, 15—11; Ripon, 7—14; Burrumbeet only having five more scoring shots than Ripon.

Burrumbeet's even eighteen showed better team work (particularly on the forward line), superiority in the air, and took more advantage of opportunities than did their opponents, who lacked cohesion, but nevertheless came to light with some brilliant individual flashes of football. The only time Burrumbeet's commanding lead was seriously challenged was half-way through the second quarter, when Ripon, by showing some excellent form throughout that term, got within nine points of their opponents, and for a while looked like making a close game of it. There was a fair attendance for a mid-week match, and Umpire Ingles handled the game, which was played in good, friendly spirit, in excellent style. Gate takings amounted to 57.

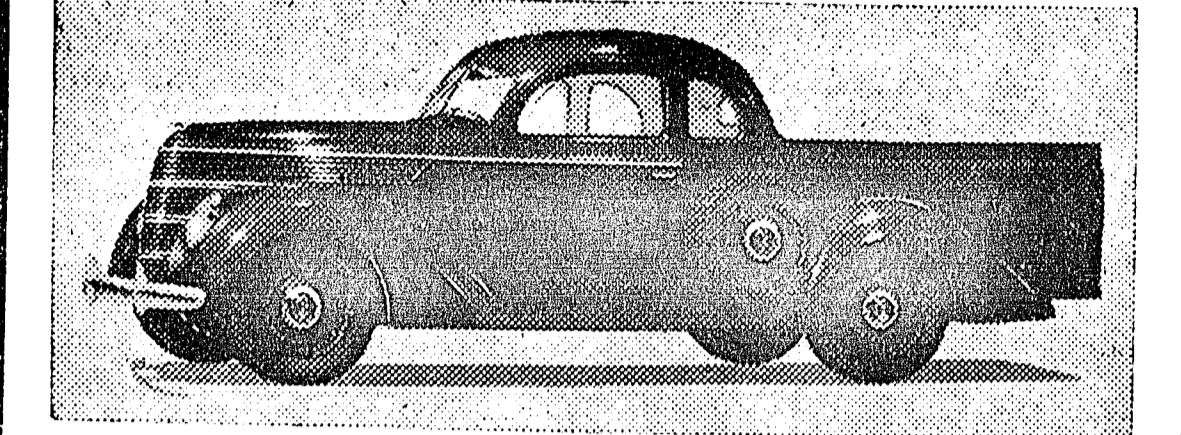

At the start the half-back lines of both teams were tested in turn, and then Ripon broke through. E. O'Brien got possession, and opened the scoring with a goal. Burrumbeet soon had Ripon's back men or the alert, and W. McIntyre quickly scored two behinds for them. T. Harrison then sent the ball to W. McIntyre, who marked, and Burrumbeet's first goal resulted. Burrumbeet again forwarded, and W. Walton marked nicely, and goaled with a splendid kick. A behind was added to their tally, and then W. McIntyre and H. Harrison quickly added goals with snapshots. Casey (ruck) was playing well for Burrumbeet, and their forwards were making good openings, and missing very few chances. Allender and Blaikie were doing good back-line work for Ripon. The ball was sent into Ripon's forward area, but A. Grundy relieved with a nice mark right in the teeth of the goal. O'Brien, with a long kick, scored a single. Burrumbeet then took the ball away, but it was soon returned and R. Howell, with a long kick hit the goal post, and only a behind resulted for Ripon. Quarter-time scores:—Burrumbeet, 4—3; Ripon 1—2.

Play was fairly even in the second term; Burrumbeet having eight scoring shots to Ripon's seven. Laidlaw knocked out nicely at the bounce, Dale forwarded, and O'Brien snapped a single for Ripon. The ball was then taken to the other end, and W. McIntyre snapped a goal. Ripon again forged forward and after two behinds were added to their tally, Yawkins marked nicely, and with a good kick, goaled for Ripon. Another behind was added, and then Laidlaw passed to O'Brien, who pulled down a nice mark in a pack, and kicked Ripon's third goal, and only nine points now separated the teams. The final term needs little description, as Burrumbeet practically monopolised the play and scored 7 goals 3 behinds (goals kicked by Duncan, 2, H. Harrison, W. McIntyre, and Walton) to Ripon's 1 goal (kicked by B. O'Loughlan) 2 behinds. Commencing with a commanding lead of 26 points, Burrumbeet quickly had Ripon on the defensive, and their superior team work soon put the issue beyond doubt. To pick out the best players in the winning side is rather a difficult task as the team was a very even combination and every man acquitted himself well. EDITORIAL.

COMPLACENCY OF TEMPER.

WE often hear people sing the praises of men and women who possess what is called a good personality — persons who are able to make the machinery of social intercourse run smoothly whenever they grace any gathering with their presence. Analysis will generally show that such "good mixers" are blessed with an equable temper. "Complacency of temper," wrote Steele, "outlives all the charms of a fine face and makes the decays of it invisible." There is a lot of truth behind that statement, for good-tempered men and women always wear better in outward appearance than those who grizzle, fret, and fume at every minor mishap that befalls them in daily life. According to W. G. Wills, "Good temper is like a sunny day; it sheds its brightness upon everything." Surely that is worth cultivating, and the only method of doing so is both an easy and hard one — the exercise of self-control. Said Franklin, "A cheerful face is nearly as good for an invalid as healthy weather." We all know why medical men assume what is called a professional manner. The average medico always seems to have a happy outlook on life, and goodness knows he sees enough of the seamy side of it. But it would never do for a doctor to go among his patients with a face like the proverbial undertaker (although an undertaker off duty is usually a cheerful soul). Mrs Barbauld put our argument in a nut shell when she wrote, "He goes through it with a light heart." The man whose humour is always under the check of reason, and who uses it not to annoy sensitive people, but to cheer both himself and his fellows up and help them "breathe the blows of circumstance" when they have that down and out feeling, renders signal service to those of his day and generation. Long may his kind persist in this old world, which is so overburdened with sorrow and pain.

LOCAL NOTES

LACK OF FORETHOUGHT.

SHIRE Councillors are often harshly criticised for imposing restrictions on heavy traffic on roads in the winter months, but if ever there was an instance of the need of such control it is to be seen on the road from the Waterloo Swamp to Chute. A few weeks ago this road was newly-graded and repaired by the Ripon Shire Council, and converted into a very fine, trafficable road. Since then, someone with singular lack of forethought has been over it with very heavy loads, and turned portions of it into something approaching a quagmire, with greasy ruts over six inches deep.

Why a new road was so damaged before it had time to consolidate is hard to understand, when the carters responsible could have gone round the Chute to Main Lead road on a hard surface, and travelled very little further.

OPPORTUNITY TO SHOW PUBLIC SPIRIT.

ABOUT ten years ago a school endowment plantation was commenced at Beaufort, and seven of the eight acres under pines are ready for the man with the pruning axe. To carry out that necessary task, voluntary workers are needed to-day (Saturday), and as there is no football fixture in the town, residents have a golden opportunity to show they are endowed with public spirit. As the plantation not only beautifies the surroundings of the town, but will be a great financial asset to the school in years to come, we hope that pruners with sharp axes will respond in force. In the plantation there are also four acres of wattles, and the day is not very far distant when they will all be fit to strip and convert into cash.

Land Sale. — Mr Hugh Briody, senr., of Lexton, has purchased Mr S. B. Karlake's property of 430 acres, through the agency of Messrs. S. G. Valentine & Co., in conjunction with Messrs. Dennis Lascelles Ltd.

A.I.F. Cemetery Proposed. — A proposal that a special cemetery for returned soldiers should be created in Melbourne will be recommended to the annual conference of the R.S.L. next month by a special sub-committee which has investigated the matter. It was suggested by the committee that the central feature of the A.I.F. cemetery should be a cross of sacrifice, and that no denominational sections should be recognised. Religious requirements could be met by each plot being consecrated at the time of burial.

School Plantation. — Arbour Day was observed at the Beaufort school on Friday, 17th inst., when the senior boys planted another acre of young pines in the Beaufort State School endowment plantation. The work was carried out under the supervision of Messrs. L. R. S. Dalrymple (head teacher), J. Woodruff, H. J. Buchanan, and W. B. Johnson. This brings the area under pines up to eight acres, together with another four acres under wattles. Earlier planted pines have developed very well, and are now ready for pruning, and a working bee has been arranged for this afternoon (Saturday) to carry out the work. The wattles, although badly attacked by fiery blight some time ago, have come on exceptionally well, and many are now large enough for stripping, but the trustees think it advisable to wait until a larger number of trees is ready before carrying out this work. Before any more planting can be done, it will be necessary to cut a lot of scrub in the plantation area.

Skeleton Found. — Finding a skull, arm bones and legs of a human being near the Emu Creek, between Lake Goldsmith and Nerring, Mr Mulcahy, of Lake Goldsmith, brought them to the Beaufort police station. The remains were examined by Dr. S. E. Humphreys, whose opinion was that they were those of an aboriginal who had died about 80 years ago. First-constables L. Roche and J. Duke proceeded to the spot where the bones were found, and discovered several other remains of human beings; the place having been a blackfellows' camping ground or burial ground in the early days. On the skull brought to the police station was a large depression where it had been fractured years before death, and the bone had grown and partly filled the cavity. The doctor's opinion was that it was an injury no white man would ever have recovered from.

The need for avoiding "sweating" conditions in garages is conceded, but it is maintained that other means could be devised by the trade itself which would not inconvenience the public. Such drastic curtailment of rail facilities would not be tolerated, and motor transport is now a more important public convenience than the railways.





### OUR FEDERAL MEMBER.

NATIONAL INSURANCE BILL:

SPEAKING on the National Insurance Bill in the House of Representatives, Brigadier G. A. Street, member for Corangamite, said: "Compulsory insurance is of comparatively recent origin. It was instituted, I think, by Bismarck in Germany only just a little over 50 years ago, but its growth has been rapid. We find that the International Labor office in Geneva in 1927 agreed upon the principle of compulsory insurance. Further than that, we find that to-day compulsory insurance is in operation in more than 30 countries in the world. I was interested in the viewpoint expressed by the honorable member for Richmond (Mr. Anthony) with regard to differential payments. It is somewhat similar to the scheme in the United States of America. That scheme, which has been in operation for only about three years at the moment, covers only old age and unemployment, but it has differential payments and differential benefits. The old age insurance tax for instance, is collected by means of a personal levy on salaries. The first 3000 dollars of salary is, I think, taxable. When a person becomes eligible on account of age pension is calculated in accordance with payments made. The employer also makes contributions, and finally pension is paid on the level of the particular standard of living of the person who has made the contributions.

The history of invalid and old age pensions in Australia is interesting as showing the development of the system. It is less than 30 years ago since they were first introduced, and at the time the maximum rate was 10/ a week, the number of pensioners 65,000, and the total cost to the Treasury £1,500,000. To-day the maximum rate is 20/, the number of pensioners 200,000, and the cost about £14,000,800. This year it is estimated that the number of pensioners will increase to 311,000, and the total payments to nearly £14,000,000. It is estimated by actuaries that in 40 years time, payments will exceed £32,000,000, and they give as their reason a study of the vital statistics of Australia, which show a very important change in the age composition groups. The Treasurer has said that whereas to-day there are 26 persons of pension age for every 100 wage earners, the number in 40 years' time will be 54 to every 100 wage earners.

This bill will not affect in any way the existing Invalid and Old-age Pensions Act, but when the future liabilities under the Act are considered, it is obvious that some kind of contributory scheme is essential. However, for a great number of years, the cost of the national insurance scheme, plus the costs of the existing invalid and old-age pensions scheme, will be considerably higher than the increased cost of old age and invalid pensions. It is estimated that in 25 years' time the cost of the two schemes will be approximately what the cost would be if there was no national insurance scheme.

### DAYS THAT ARE GONE.

THE following interesting items appeared in the "Ararat Advertiser" of 1862:

Travelling facilities are improving in Beaufort. We are enabled through a coach being put on, to get from Raglan to Ballarat and back in one day.

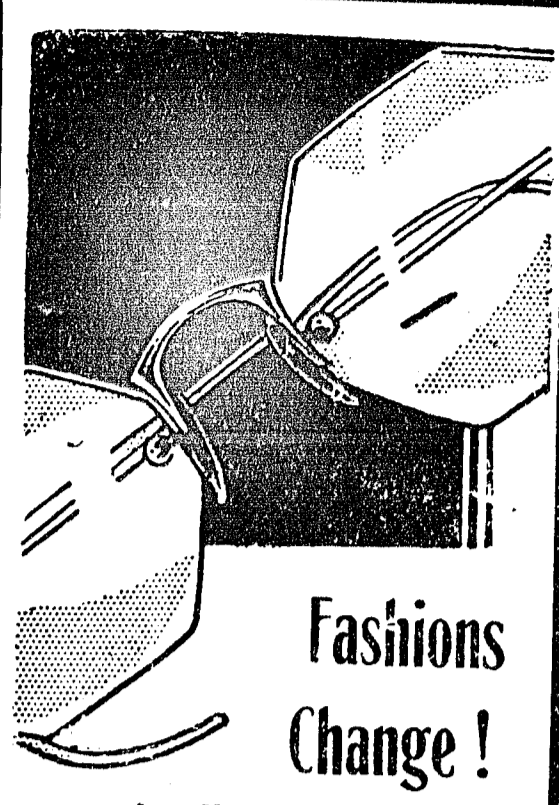
Many have heard of the Mt. Cole sawmills, but few perhaps are aware that at the base of this noble mountain a population is congregated equal to that of many of the small parishes of England. A baptismal service was held at the school house by the Rev. Mr. Horman when 16 infants were baptised; and after this ceremony was concluded a delightful sight presented itself amongst Mt. Cole's magnificent scenery, in a well provided feast in honour of the occasion, got up by some of the most active of the ladies. Some 40 children and as many adults sat down to all kinds of good things, under an awning of nature's handiwork, most tastefully interspersed with willflowers, from the midst of which peeped out those beautiful and appropriate words "Suffice the little children to come unto Me." The only drawback of the day was the generally felt disappointment at the unavoidable absence of Mr. Campbell, of Buangor, who, as the first pioneer of the gospel in this little known locality, holds divine service every alternate Sunday. A movement, however, is now being made for the inhabitants to provide themselves with the ministrations of the Church of England on the other Sundays also.

Death of Mr John Tait. — The death occurred on Monday morning, June 13, at the Ballarat Base Hospital of Mr John Tait, aged 80 years. He was born in Skipton, and was a well-known resident of the district all his life. He was a leading local athlete in his young days, and his ability as a footballer was outstanding. "Standard."

When they are attractive to those who will come under the scheme. In the first place there are sickness benefits of 20/ for men and 15/ for women. If the sickness persists beyond a specified time, a disablement benefit of 15/ and 12/6 a week will be paid. There are special rates for unmarried minors, and women may by a voluntary contribution of 6d a week, also receive a full pension of 20/ a week at 60 years of age. There are to be widows' pensions of 12/6 a week until 1944, when they will be increased to 15/ a week. There will be pensions of 7/6 a week for orphans under 15 years and allowances of 3/6 a week in respect of dependent children. Surely those benefits are worth having. They compare favorably with those provided under the national insurance schemes of most other countries. The honorable member for Deakin (Mr Hutchinson) produced a table comparing the benefits under the British scheme, from which it was evident that this scheme is the more liberal of the two.

The administration of the bill is to be in the hands of a national insurance commission, and certain approved societies. It has been argued that the approved societies should be restricted more than they are in the bill. Under the English scheme as originally drawn, approved societies were allowed to spring up everywhere, and many went out of existence after a very brief life. It is hoped to prevent that sort of thing in Australia by fixing the minimum number of members of an approved society at 2000. It has been said that approved societies should be limited to friendly societies and trade unions, while against this it has been pointed out that although most of the 1,850,000 persons who will be covered by the scheme had the opportunity to belong to friendly societies, only one-quarter of them elected to do so. If the scheme is compulsory in form, those who have to pay should be afforded as wide a choice as possible regarding the societies they join.

In addition to the benefits I have already enumerated, further benefits are listed in the fourth schedule to the bill, and it is hoped to make them effective at the end of the first quinquennial period. Those honorable members who complain that the scheme as it stands is not sufficiently liberal should remember that most involve higher rates of contribution. I do not think that we would be justified in the present time in fixing the rates at more than the 3/ and 2/ now stipulated.

### OBITUARY.

#### FUNERAL OF MR. FRED. SEADON.

EARLY on Saturday afternoon the remains of the late Mr Fred. Seadon, a former resident of Main Street, whose sudden death at Ararat was referred to in our last issue, were interred in the Beaufort Cemetery. There was a number of relatives and old friends present, and many wreaths were placed on the casket, including one from the Pensioners' Welfare League. Rev. J. P. MacDougall, of the Presbyterian Church, Beaufort, conducted the burial service. The coffin-bearers were Messrs. L. Seadon, A. Seadon, M. George, and A. Beer. Mr J. Dunn undertaker, Ararat, conducted the funeral.

#### MISS MARGARET MULCAHY.

WE record with regret the passing of an old and highly respected resident of the district, in the person of Miss Margaret Mulcahy, of Lake Goldsmith. The sad event occurred at her home on Thursday, after an illness of only a week's duration. The deceased, who was 80 years of age, was a daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Daniel Mulcahy and a member of one of the best-known families of farmers in Ripon Shire. Mr Daniel Mulcahy landed in Ballarat in the early fifties where he married. He fought in the Eureka riot, and took up farming at Learmonth. The late Miss Margaret Mulcahy was born at Learmonth in 1858, and came to Middle Creek 71 years ago, when she was nine years of age, with her parents. After a residence there of 22 years she removed with her brothers (Mr Michael Mulcahy and the late Messrs. John and Thomas Mulcahy) to Lake Goldsmith in 1886, where she had resided for 52 years. The late Miss Mulcahy, who was greatly esteemed by a wide circle of friends, took a lively interest in all movements for the welfare of the district, and was an intensely loyal and active Church worker. Her chief sphere of activity was the home and she was one of those capable, tidy, and energetic housekeepers of the old school. She leaves a brother (Mr Michael Mulcahy), a sister (Miss Mulcahy), a sister-in-law (Mrs T. Mulcahy), and a number of nephews and nieces to mourn their loss. ### RATES OF POSTAGE ON NEWSPAPERS.

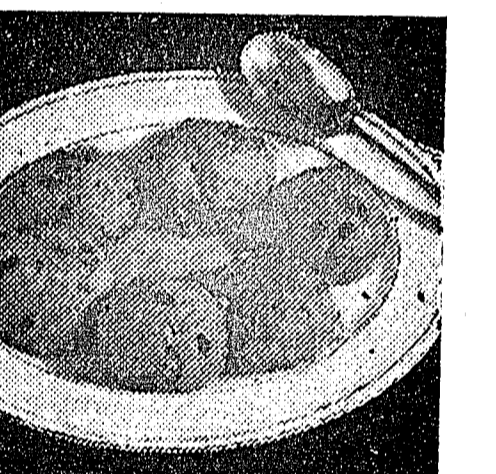
The Deputy Director of Posts and Telegraphs (Mr R. Lawson) desires to point out that newspapers printed outside the Commonwealth, or those not registered at a General Post Office for transmission through the post as newspapers, are, when posted in the Commonwealth, classified as printed matter, and consequently the conditions relating to printed matter apply. The rates of postage are as follow:—

To New Zealand, Fiji, or places within British Empire, 1d per 4 oz. To all other places . . . 1d per 2 oz. For delivery within the Commonwealth . . . . . 1d per 4 oz.

### Evening Fatigue Blamed for Accidents.
