Successful Climax to Waterloo King Carnival.

WATERLOO TENNIS CLUB.

THREE KINGS RAISE £64/14/8 FOR NEW COURT AT CARNIVAL.

To raise funds to lay down a modern court for the Waterloo Tennis Club, a King Carnival has been in progress for a month. The effort reached a highly successful and gratifying climax on Saturday night, December 24, when a concert, the crowning ceremony, and a dance were held in the local Mechanics' Hall. The building was packed, and Mr. C. M. Flynn (president of the Tennis Club) acted as chairman. A very entertaining concert programme, of which the audience plainly showed their appreciation, was contributed as follows:—Selection, Blay's Orchestra; selection, four members of Maryborough Pipe Band (encored and responded); song, "Sweet Mystery of Life," Mr. Noel Wotherspoon (encored); encore number, "Will You Remember?"; saxophone solo, Jack Blay (encored and responded); mouth-organ solo, Mr. Vauxhall (encored); song, "Fall Me To-night," Mr. Noel Wotherspoon (encored and responded); piano-accompanied solo, Mr. Alan Karlskate (encored and responded); selection, Blay's Orchestra. The accompaniments were played by Miss Eva Thomas and Miss H. Lewis. The performers were accorded a hearty vote of thanks, on the motion of Messrs C. Lewis and C. Herbert.

The coronation ceremony, which was both a pretty and impressive one, was ably conducted by Cr. C. H. McKay, who acted as Lord High Chancellor. The Three Kings and the members of their retinue were nicely dressed, and conducted themselves with

becoming dignity. The royal personages and their attendants were:—King of the Workers, Mr. A. Lyttle; pages, Len Pratt and Ron Herbert; attendants, Misses Nance Popp and Rene Finch (attired in pink). King of Industry, Mr. H. Lewis; pages, Ivan and Robert Broadbent; attendants, Misses Grace Russell and Win Lewis (dressed in mauve). King of Sport, Mr. C. Lamb; attendants, Misses Alice Lamb and Joyce Laney (who wore blue).

The financial result was as follows:—King of Industry (Mr. H. Lewis), £20/0; King of Workers (Mr. A. Lyttle), £23/15; King of Sport (Mr. C. Lamb), £14/13/8; total, £64/14/8.

The orchestra played the music incidental to the coronation, and Mr. F. Blay acted as trumpeter. First the Lord High Chancellor (Mr. C. H. McKay) and the Crown bearer (Alan Tiley) proceeded up the aisle and ascended the platform, which was arranged as a throne room.

After the Lord High Chancellor had read the proclamation, the King of Industry (Mr. H. Lewis) and his retinue made their entry, followed by the King of the Workers (Mr. A. Lyttle) and

the King of Sport (Mr. C. Lamb) and his retinue. Following an enthusiastic round of applause, pretty bouquets were brought forward and placed before the Kings, who were now seated on the platform with their attendants, and made an imposing group.

Amidst further applause, the Lord High Chancellor then announced the gratifying financial results of each King's efforts, and proclaimed the King of Industry (Mr. H. Lewis) King of the Waterloo carnival. The King of Industry (Mr. H. Lewis) received a great ovation as he ascended the throne, and was crowned by Mr. C. M. Flynn, President of the Tennis Club, amid cries of "Long live the King."

Mr. Flynn said he was sure they were all delighted with the magnificent result. ENGINEER'S REPORT.

JANUARY, 1939

The President and Councilors, Shire of Rippon.

1. Lands Department, £20,540. Closing of road and survey of new road, section 37, 38, 39. A further inspection, I have re-measured the same. Possible future requirements render the closing of any portion of each street inadvisable.


(b) The proposed new road should avoid inclusion of the creek bed, for which a reserve provision by a reserve not less than 80 links wide is desirable from South street, opposite all. 25/1 north-easterly, and in lieu of deflection in proposed new road, section 13 should be included in the reserve.

2. Lands Department, £5,711. Sale of grave reserves, 100 of Erambeen, near Wattleby. It is recommended that the same be made available for sale.

3. Beaufort Water Supply. Pumping replaced spring supplies, and the indications are that for some weeks at least there are expected to have valuable, although limited, help from this source. With a favorable holding out of this source, and not too much extreme weather, and the strict co-operation of users, it may be possible to retain the present hours of daily use of houses.



Bush Fire Precautions.

In view of the disastrous fires which have occurred in other parts of the State, resulting in the loss of valuable lives and property, we in the Beaufort district can consider ourselves fortunate in the fact that no fires originated during the excessive heat period. Landowners, as a rule, are careful regarding the lighting of fires, but there are some who still do not take the necessary precautions.

During the proclaimed period, which is from 23rd November, 1938, to 31st March, 1939, fires can only be lighted in the open under certain conditions, and all persons should make themselves conversant with these conditions before the burning of stubble, grass, bracken, scrub, timber, etc. Copies of these conditions can be seen at any police station, post office, or forest office, and a full three months of summer weather to face, it behooves each and every one of us to see that no fire is kindled.

In the event of an outbreak, the public are asked to ring the Forest Office as early as possible.

When the wheels of a mangle or other machine require lubricating, sprinkle a little powdered grease on the wheels; this will make them run smoothly, while oil catches the dust, and in time clogs the wheels.

FOR THE FARMER.

THE VALUE OF A COW.

The wise words of a business man who has gone in for Holsteins: "I bought every cow in my herd at public sale."

"I have yet to buy one that did not measure up to my expectations and more."

"When I decided to establish a herd of purebred Holsteins, I began with the study of type. I was familiar with types of horses, dogs, hogs, and other animals. Type to me, has always been the most important of all."

"Having satisfied myself, however, that I saw a good Friesian when I saw her, I still did not have sufficient confidence to invest an average of, say, £100 a head in a herd without supporting my own judgment with that of other experts—men whose own experience as breeders and whose success has proved the soundness of their judgment. In my own way I could get the value of their opinion as in the public sale ring."

No man can establish absolutely the value of any animal, and having taken into consideration all points, the intelligent buyer should consult first, the man who owns the animal, and his character, for I have never known a crooked man to sell a straight cow; the quality of the herd from which she comes, the condition of her surroundings, and, finally, very important, the pedigree and the individual herself will convey to the practical eye—still her value is more than other experts are willing to pay, as shown by their competitive bids in the sale ring.

"I may conclude from what I can see of the pedigree and the individual cow from which she came, that she is a good one, but whereas I might set my limit at £100 for that animal on the basis of my meagre knowledge, I would feel that I was making a good buy at £125, when my bid topped a meeting-point at a mile a minute, and just enough to have her knocked down to me. On the other hand, I am afraid to buy in the milking yard."

"The average farmer-breeder is a conservative salesman—in his own mind."

"When he states a price on his animal he is selling as much sentiment as quality. If you don't watch your step you will be paying for his sentimental feeling toward the animal."

"Besides, an animal of very early quality will look like a cresset to a yard full of acres, while the same animal in the sale ring among a lot of superlatives, would bring half what the farmer asked for her—and which he honestly believes he ought to get. You know it is easy to fall in love with any Friesian when you have known her awhile."

"I go to many sales where I do not buy a single animal. I go to have animals passed in review before me simply to study each and compare types and individuality."

"There are times when it is worth anything and who is establishing a herd, to motor through the country in the vain hope of 'picking up' Friesian gems in some farmer's yard at a bargain. Let such a man put his greatest 'hinds' in a public sale, and see what they'll bring. There are no witnesses to the yard transaction, while prices sold for animals sold in the ring are chronicled and additional value is obtained in the advertising."

"There are two kinds of sales: First, is the sale for the 'open cow,' who is looking for something for nothing. He pays nothing and gets his money's worth. Second, the sale for the connoisseur who is willing to pay the highest for the best, this is the only buyer who ever really obtains a bargain."

"As so with great Friesians and the sons and daughters of great Friesians. No man would dare place a value on the 50-pound cow. No man can know the true value of that animal. The only way to decide it is by the vote of the connoisseurs of the industry in the form of their bids in the sale ring."

Registration Taxes.

MANY COUNTRIES MODIFYING SYSTEM.

Many countries are abandoning the system of taxing cars a fixed registration fee, or modifying it in favor of a fuel tax. Some years ago, Great Britain reduced the registration fees on cars by 25 per cent. Since then, France, Germany and Italy have either abolished registration fees or have reduced them drastically. In every case the result has been an increase, quickly apparent, in the total revenue from motor vehicles, due to a greatly increased petrol consumption.

In Victoria, registration fees are quite heavy enough to prevent many people from owning a car, because of the comparatively high initial payment demanded in a lump sum. Most of the lowest cost used cars are large, and fees are heavy. Though the law does not permit the payment of registration fees half-yearly, the first fee is considerably above that charged normally, so that the facility is of little value.

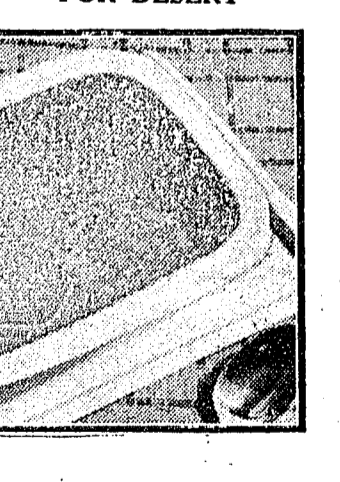
