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Annual Report, Ripon Sub-branch, R.S. & S.J. L.A. - - 1038. - -

I would like to commence this report with a quotation, which, in a few words summarises the reason and need for our existence as a League.

"In the actual day of battle, every man who fought by our side was our comrade and our friend. And whether he who fought by our side has fared better or worse than ourselves, or whatever his luck may be, he is no less our comrade and our friend to-day."

" In reviewing the year's work of the SuL-branch, probably one of the greatest achievements of our organisation is apt to be overlooked, perhaps because it is so obvious as to escape notice. I refer to the fact that an organisation composed of practically every ex-service man in the district has been kept in being. If no other work had been accomplished, this alone justifies a feeling of satisfaction, for the public knowledge that ex-se:vicemen are banded together to safeguard their rights and privileges, almost automatically ensures that these rights and privileges will be maintained generally, and where, in individual cases, injustice exists, we are able, in almost every case, to obtain satisfaction.

Membership for the year was 87, removals and deaths accounting for a decrease of six members. The financial situation is satisfactory, the sub-branch having maintained itself on its income from membership.

Nine committee meetings were held during the year, the average attendance of a committee of 14 being 11. The committee has been o very great assistance to the executive officers, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking them for their work during the year.

The usual half-yearly meeting was held to discuss conference matters and was well attended; the attitude of the branch on agenda items being conveyed to the delegates.

During the year the revaluation of Soldier Settlement holdings has been finalised by the passing of the Closer Settlement Act, 1938. This has in broad principle proved to be advantageous to settlers in our district.

We have again to express our thanks to the C.W.A. and Mr. J. F Wotherspoon for having made it possible for us to join with the district school children in the Legacy Club's Anzac Service to children.

On Anzac and Armistice Days the usual commemoration ceremon ies were held. Mr. S. Reeves, of the Brunswick sub-branch, being the speaker on Anzac Day. Mr. Reeves' visit to us involved his participating in several morning observances in his own district, followed by a return journey of over 200 miles to Beaufort. We deeply appreciate the willing spirit of service evinced by Mr. Reeves and by other speakers, who each year, at considerable personal inconvenience, help us in our commemoration. On the Sunday following Armistice Day, the clergy of the rown co-operated at a service, held in the Picture Theatre. We would like to express our thanks to these gentlemen for their willingness at all times to assist the sub-branch.

The simple ceremony of the laying of a wreath on Armistice morning was well attended, various public bodies paying their tribute with our representatives. On these occasions we have received valued assistance from the Band and the sub-branch bugler,
