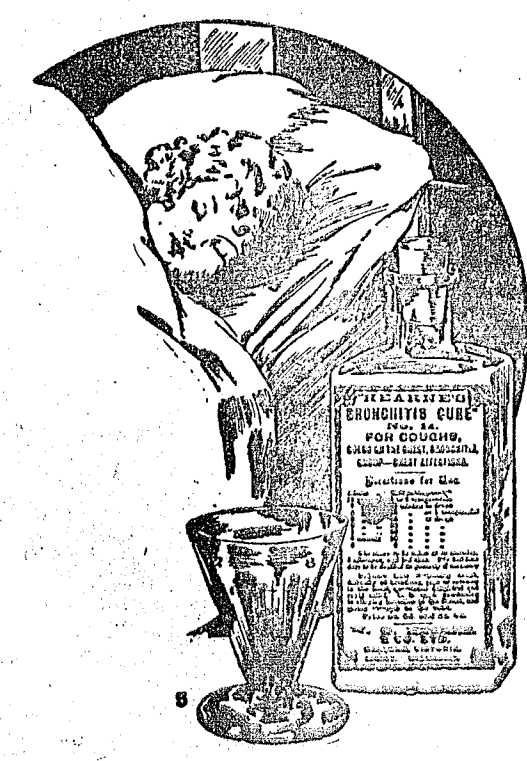

## Beaufort Jockey Club.

### ANNUAL MIXED SPORTS MEETING.

There being no other district fixtures, other than tennis, on Foundation Day, the Beaufort Jockey Club applied for and was granted that date for its annual mixed sports meeting. The weather was unfavourable; the afternoon being hot and the atmosphere laden with Malice dust - in fact, it was a regular brickbat. 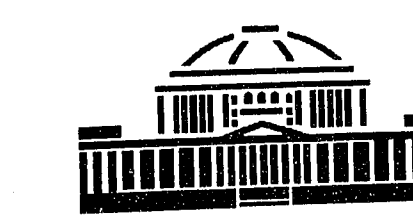
