

## AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY MAKES PROGRESS

### The Beaufort Show.

#### IMPROVEMENT IN GATE RECEIPTS AND MEMBERSHIP.

#### INCREASED ENTRIES IN SEVERAL CLASSES.

Ideal spring weather favoured the Beaufort Agricultural Society's 69th annual show, held in picturesque surroundings at the local Park on Saturday afternoon. There was a large attendance of residents of the town and district and people from neighbouring towns, and over 100 motor cars lined the arena; the gate receipts amounting to £47, compared with £41 last year. There was also an increase in membership, and in the entries in several classes.

As in former years, horses were the principal feature of the show, and the ring events were very interesting, including the hunting sections. There was a much larger number of exhibits than usual in the cookery class, and a very fine display was made on a double-decker table, covered by wire-netting. Entries in the class for flowers were also more numerous, and there was an attractive array, particularly of decorated vases and baskets. The educational class was an excellent one, and gave parents a good insight into the work being done by the pupils in the district schools. More sheep were shown than last year, and there were some particularly prime fat lambs on view. Although the class for grain, roots, and hay was not a big one, there was a better display than of recent years. Considerable interest was evinced in some samples of berries and wood taken from the workings of the Travalla Alluvials mine by Mr T. E. Sands, and also in some nice samples of chip-wood, test trays exhibited by Mr. Wyllie. In the fleece competition Mr W. McErvalle, of Chute, was the winner for the third year in succession, and became permanent possessor of the handsome cup presented by Mr Huntley Grant (to Gully Young Farmers' Club, which is holding a field day on Decr. 14, made a display that was a credit both to the school children and their head teacher (Mr M. Campbell), and which was greatly admired by the public. It included a model shearing shed and sheep yards (complete with miniature notes of wool, wool press, and wool table). The children also displayed the following products of the club:—Three fleeces, four boxes of grasses (cockfoot, phalaris, Kentucky blue, dryland, and browntop), nine named varieties of last season's oats, seed cupboards, potted pine, gum, and lucerne trees, peas, beans, flowers, and a collection of grass seeds. The record books of the club were also shown for inspection. This feature should enable the public to realise what a progressive body the Gully Young Farmers' Club is, and the benefit the children of the school should derive from it.

 Sir Alan Currie, M.L.C., and Mr P. L. Denigan, M.L.A., were among the visitors. The crowd was a very orderly one, and First-constables J. Duke and W. Hales had no unpleasant tasks to perform. The results of the various events were announced and competitors summoned into the ring by the Universal Meyer Sound System of broadcasters from Melbourne, and Messrs. J. J. Dunn and R. Pringle acted as ground stewards. A very impressive grand parade was held shortly after 4 p.m. in which over 50 animals that had won prizes were ridden, led, or driven. Several small sideshows helped to amuse the public, and a motor

boat, owned by Mr A. Dunstan, made trips on the lake. Under the leadership of Bandmaster R. Saddler, the Beaufort Town Band played an enjoyable programme of music.

The publican's booth was conducted by Mr R. Taylor, of Ballarat, and Mr A. Lowell had charge of the fruit stall. At the luncheon booth, Mr and Mrs R. T. MacDonald provided a very tasty dinner, and afterwards tea for the officials and public—a fact which was greatly appreciated.

All the judges and stewards carried out their duties satisfactorily. Mr W. Lynch was at the head of affairs as president, and did all in his power to ensure success. The secretary (Mr Geo. Fring) bore the brunt of the preparatory and executive work, and careful planning on his part, combined with long experience and tactful and courteous treatment of all who had business with him, enabled the show to pass off without a hitch.

The executive committee and officers of the society have every reason to be pleased with the result of the exhibition, which showed definite improvement on past events of the kind, and plainly demonstrated that those people who hold that agricultural shows are a thing of the past are not only considerably in the wrong, but that there are still possibilities ahead for making these annual functions even more popular and successful. 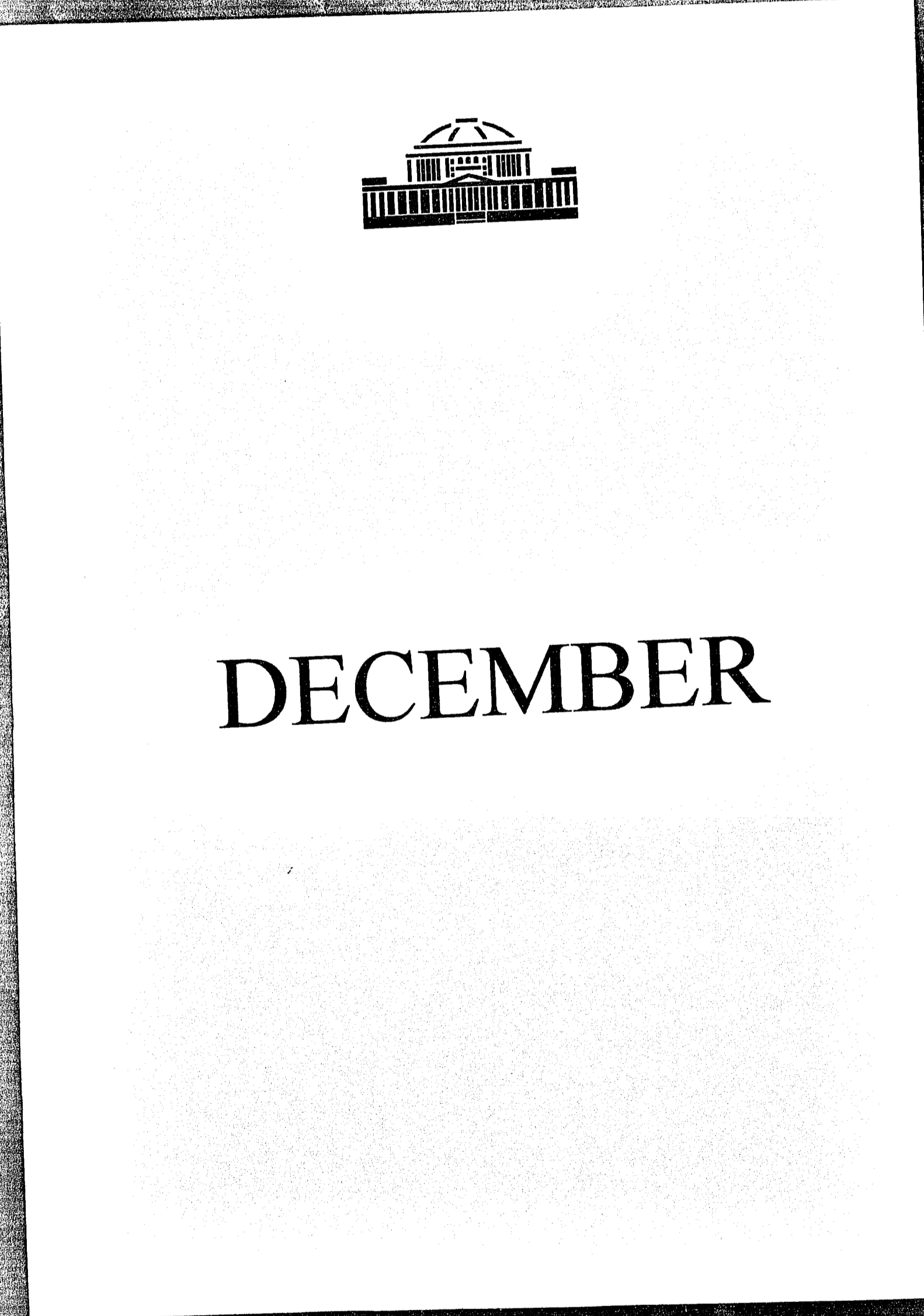
