INTRODUCTION

CI LITTLE over a century has elapsed since Major Sir Thomas Mitchell, explorer and adventurer, fired with the zest of discovery, passed through the Western District of Victoria and on to Raglan in August. 1836. A simple stone marks the spot where the party crossed what is now known as the Western Highway.

Thus Beaufort was discovered. Since then a chasm of time has passed; out of a township of canvas, rude shops were built. The gold rush swept through the district like a wild fire in the early "fifties," and to cater for the needs of the hundreds of men that worked in the surrounding district and gold mines, was established a business and shopping

centre in Beaufort. To-day the clean well-kept streets, large and modernly equipped commercial houses, modern sanitation and excellent lighting are a tribute to the citizens of this town, whose spirit
