RAGLAN TEAM STILL BELOW USUAL STRENGTH

Beaufort Racecourse.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

Eleven residents of Beaufort and district attended a public meeting held at the Shire Hall, on Monday night, for the purpose of appointing a committee of management of the local racecourse. The convenor was the shire president (Cr. A. C. Roddis), and Cr. R. A. D. Sinclair presided as his deputy. After explaining the object of the meeting, the chairman said he did not want to see any of the present committeemen displaced but if any of them was thinking of retiring, he would like to see a representative of the Council appointed. In his opinion, the racecourse was the most suitable place for a landing ground for aeroplanes, and the day might come when it would be necessary to land passengers and mails for Beaufort there.

On the motion of Messrs. C. R. Vowles and W. Smith, the retiring committeemen, Messrs. A. J. Lewell, W. A. Skene, and A. M. Parker, were nominated the mover stating that they had looked after the Jockey Club and shire interests.

The three nominees named were unanimously elected as a committee of management.

Mr Vowles—They would like the term to be five years, instead of three.

It was agreed to add to the motion that a suggestion to that effect be made to the Lands Department.

Mr W. A. Skene (secretary of the committee of management) said he could assure the Shire Council that any time the committee could help to make the racecourse into a landing ground for aeroplanes, working in conjunction with the Shire Council they would be only too pleased to do so. If an aeroplane landing ground were made, the Council would have to make a good road to it. He would be highly delighted if they did, as his paddock was down that way. (Laughter). He considered his paddock a far better landing ground for aeroplanes than the racecourse, and he thought it to use it, as it was nearer the town.

Cr. Sinclair said it could be inspected.

Mr Skene produced a letter the committee of management had received some months ago from the Lands Department, "to the effect that if the site was approved by the Civil Aviation Department, on receipt of a fee of £2, a certificate of permissive occupancy would be issued."

At the request of Cr. Sinclair, Mr Skene handed him the letter to bring under the notice of the shire secretary.

CAR CRASHES INTO TRUCK.

YOUNG MAN'S THIGH BROKEN.

About a mile and a half on the Ararat side of Buangor, just after dusk on Sunday evening, a motor car crashed into the back of a truck standing at the side of the road, and was badly damaged.

The car, which was owned by Mr. George Wilson, of Beaufort, contained three young men residing in this town, and was being driven by Vivian Wilson, who had with him as passengers Andrew Baker and Lindsay Hill. Wilson and Baker were thrown clear by the impact, and escaped with facial cuts and abrasions, but Hill, who was seated between the others, was pinned. When released, it was found that he was severely injured. He was later admitted to the Ararat Hospital, suffering from a broken thigh and nasty cuts about the neck and chin. The driver of the wrecked car (which was returning from Ararat to Beaufort) is stated to have gone right underneath the rear of the truck.

FOOTBALL.

RIPON COMPETITION.

BEAUFORT V. RAGLAN.

Beaufort and Raglan met for the first time this season on the latter's ground on Saturday. Raglan was unable to field a strong combination; still being without the services of L. Grant, L. Welsh, and L. Lytle, who have not yet donned the colours this season. Despite their inaccurate goal-shooting, Beaufort won by the liberal margin of 36 points. S. Wilkins had charge of the game, and the other officials were:—Boundary umpires, E. E. Cheeseman and I. Cuthbertson; goal umpires, Messrs. W. M. Fitzpatrick and F. Bly; timekeepers, Messrs. L. Tucker and Bert Smith. W. Cleary captained the home team, and R. Hancock the visitors.

Raglan had the wind advantage in the first quarter, and Beaufort not only maintained a stout defence, but made two successful attacks. They had two scoring shots, and the axis powers were:—Beaufort, 1 goal 1 behind; Raglan, 1 goal.

In the second term the wind dropped considerably, but Raglan was unable to score. Beaufort, on the other hand, had seven shots, but their kicking was none too accurate, and they registered 2 goals 5 behinds. Half-time tallies were:—Beaufort, 3 goals 6 behinds; Raglan, 1 goal.

Neither team scored for the first five minutes of the third quarter. Honours were even at this stage of the game; Raglan adding 2 goals to their account, and Beaufort goal 2 behinds. At three-quarter-time the scores were:—Beaufort, 4 goals 8 behinds; Raglan, 3 goals.

In the closing term the Beaufort team showed they were much the stronger combination; having eight scoring shots to one. The visitors, who have a greater number of tall men than usual this season, registered 4 goals 4 behinds to Raglan's 1 goal. The home side, however, is likely to be considerably strengthened in future matches, and the services of G. Grant, L. Welsh, W. Finch and L. Lytle (who was present on Saturday, but was unable to play) will make them a side to be reckoned with. The final scores were:—Beaufort, 8 goals 12 behinds (60 points); Raglan, 4 goals (24 points).

The goal-kickers were:—Beaufort—J. Barnes and B. O'Loughlin (2 each), W. Anderson, M. Johnston, E. Kirkpatrick, and J. Jess. Raglan—E. Drew (2), J. Laney, and W. Parker.

For Beaufort good form was shown by J. Barnes, R. Hancock, W. Barnes, E. Kirkpatrick, J. Harris, T. Dickman, E. O'Brien, and J. Jess. These were well supported by W. Anderson, B. and K. O'Loughlin.

Raglan's best players were J. Laney, A. Spicer, A. Finch, W. Cleary, Haintz, and G. Glenister.

The fixtures for to-day (Saturday) are:—Beaufort v. Elmhurst at Beaufort; Amphitheatre v. Raglan, at Amphitheatre; Lexton, a bye.

Early Ararat.

Truck Damaged.

An international motor truck, belonging to Mr. Ferguson, of Bayndeen, was badly damaged on Saturday night, when travelling on the Western Highway, about a mile past Great Western (writes the "Ararat Advertiser"). The left side of the truck hit a tree growing very close to the bitumen, breaking the front axle spring and damaging the running gear. The driver of the truck escaped serious injury.

EX-NAVAL MAN'S OPINION.

Editor "Riponshire Advocate."

Sir—What I have to say here is fact. I am in a position to know, as I got my experience through facts. I have travelled and lived in most of the countries at war to-day, so who could be in a better position to talk on the position? I say, without fear of contradiction, that Germany and Italy will do anything in their power to defeat England. That is their sole aim, not France. Germany has always had an intense hatred of England. I know it. I always knew it. When the Press was putting it about that Germany and England would never fight each other again, it made me laugh to think that the majority of our statesmen swallowed such a lot of soft soap. They even went so far as to arm Germany. They did not even know who their friends were. If the axis powers can split France and England, and conclude a peace with France, we will know where we are. That is why it is so urgently necessary for every Britisher to put his weight into this conflict. There is not a man alive who hates war more than I do. I am the oldest war-horse in this town. I was in the Boxer Rebellion in 1901, and eight months ago I volunteered for this war. I have done this for one reason, and one reason only, and that reason is this—I want to help to make this world a better place for the future generations. I want to make it a better place for my children and yours to live in. That is my stark and plain duty. I would not go across the road to fight for Capitalism or any other "ism." I was always for social reform. I would sooner go into a concentration camp to-morrow than I would sink that principle. Justice and freedom are what I always wanted, and to see everybody with plenty of God's gifts. I hate corruption, greed, hypocrisy, and violence. That is why I am ready to fight in any part they wish to put me. I am not too old, because I have been through the mill. There is not one man within 100 miles of this town who has had the training I have had. That is not boasting. I am not too old, and it will not be my fault if I am not playing my part somewhere before long. I don't want any gold medals from anyone. I have never got anything from anyone, but I have had a lot of kicks back from men who would bury themselves in a hole rather than fight for this cause I talk about. I am British and a Christian and proud of it. I have been used to hard knocks—one gets them in the school I was brought up in, the British Navy. So take my tip, hop in while the going is good. We will want every man, woman, and child before this is over.—Yours etc., J. F. O'BRIEN, ex-British Navy.

There were large attendances at the Beaufort Churches on Sunday, which was observed throughout the Empire as a day of national prayer, at the request of the King.

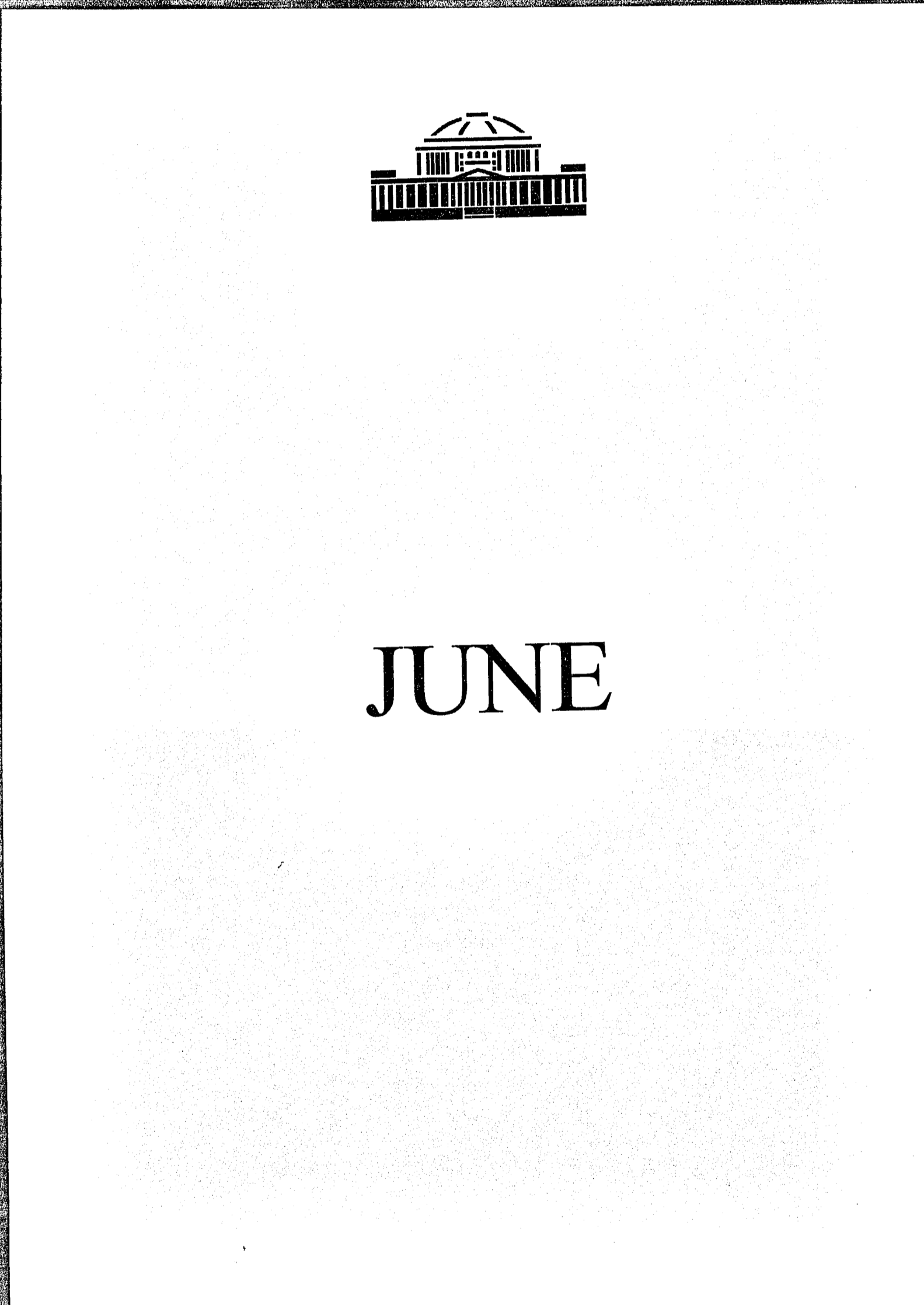

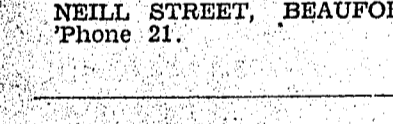
