SCHOOL DAYS ARE SANDWICH DAYS.
(By Elizabeth Cooke).

With the beginning of the school year, mothers are busy again with the A.C.C. of school lunch preparation. And fortunate indeed is the thoughtful mother who keeps her lunch pail filled with interesting, nutritious sandwiches for hungry boys and girls.

There are many simple ways to add zest and interest to the sandwiches made with everyday ingredients. Add a dash of mayonnaise to cold meat sandwiches, and they become twice as tasty. A light flavouring of mayonnaise does something very refreshing to ordinary tomato, cucumber sandwiches, or those made with grated raw salad vegetables, cold cooked cabbage, or green peas.

Chopped walnuts and figs, almonds and raisins, mashed dates and sliced apple are further interesting and nutritious combinations to give variety to the lunch basket.

Because of its delicious flavour and creamy freshness, processed cheddar cheese can also be used to great advantage for sandwich fillings. Appealing in itself, and a good mixer with any number of delicacies, cheddar cheese is also highly nutritious and readily digestible. Therefore, it has a valuable place in meals prepared for school age youngsters.

The sandwich recipe listed below will serve as a helpful guide to school lunch problems. . . . and they offer happy suggestions for afternoon tea and party service too, as attractive to grown-ups as they are to the children.
