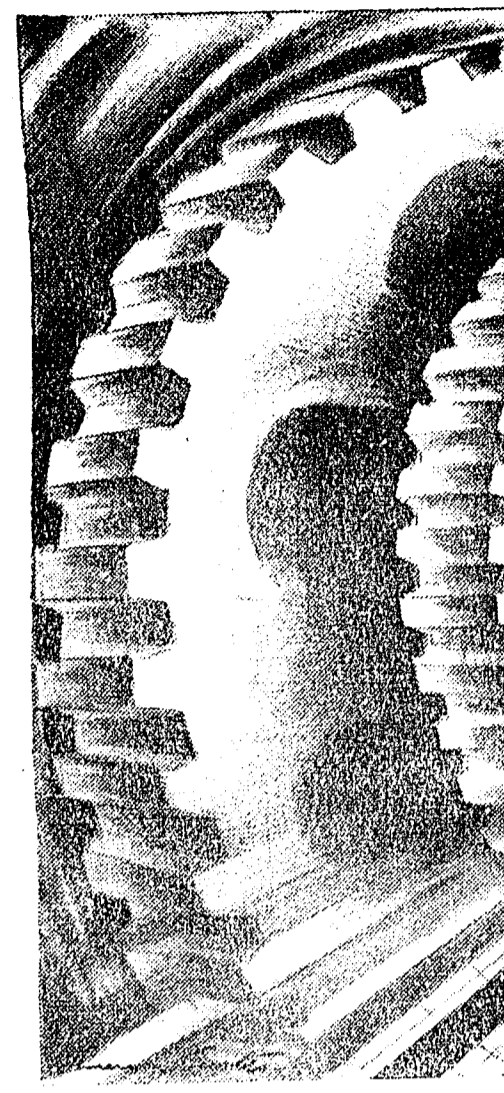

**Red Cross Society.**

**WORK IN AUSTRALIA COSTS £970 A DAY.**  
To those, and there are probably many who still entertain very vague notions about what exactly the Australian Red Cross Society does, a few facts should make rather interesting reading.

Actually the Australian Red Cross Society was the first Red Cross organisation in the Middle East, having arrived there before the British, French, and Indian Red Cross units. The Australian Red Cross representatives went overseas with the first Echelon of Australian troops, and the Red Cross Unit in the Middle East now has a staff of 36 men under Col. Harold Cohen, the Red Cross Commissioner. It costs the Society £400 a week to maintain its unit in the Middle East; since its establishment, the unit has cost a total of £12,000.

Do you realise that it costs £970 per day to keep the Australian Red Cross Society going in order to meet the hundreds of demands made upon its resources? If this figure surprises you, just consider for a moment the expense incurred by the following Red Cross activities:

Already the Australian Red Cross has shipped overseas 30,000 cases of goods, to the value of £200,000. The Hospital ship "Mandana" was supplied with goods to the value of £4,000. On the establishment of convalescent homes in Australia alone, the Australian Red Cross Society has spent £53,000. Matrons and cooks are the only paid personnel of these 14 homes maintained by the Society.

Perhaps there are people unaware of the fact that victims of the Great War are still receiving assistance — this service cost the Society £35,000 for the last financial year.

It does not require a great deal of imagination to realise that the establishment of army medical equipment in this war is on a much larger scale than during 1914-18. Already the Society has received donations for 164 ambulances, valued at £27,150.

Yet another ramifications of Australian Red Cross activities is the relief for civilian air raid victims in England. Clothing to the value of £50,000 has already been sent. Quite apart from this, the Australian Red Cross Society has donated £57,000 in cash to the British and Allied Red Cross Societies.

Another example of the magnificent work the Australian Red Cross is doing in the service of prisoners of war. Every fortnight, each prisoner of war receives three food parcels valued at £1, and every three months the Society has forwarded, on behalf of the next of kin, an 11 lb. parcel of personal articles, excluding foodstuffs.

This is a very brief survey of the Red Cross work, but it should be enough to indicate the tremendous financial responsibilities of the Australian Red Cross Society and supply a more than adequate reason for the appeals it must constantly be making for your cooperation.

The sum of £970 a day is a considerable one—approximately £40 10s per hour. That is so much for it to-day and to-morrow, but it is necessary, too, that no one should lose sight of the fact that when this war ends, Red Cross work will have to continue on a vast scale. It is the Society's hope that by then it may have at least £1,000,000 in the bank to meet these exigencies.

As the Red Cross is to continue with its great humanitarian work, you must continue to help the Red Cross.

**At Work in Desert.**  
In January, 1940, the Victorian Division of the Australian Red Cross Society donated a workshop to the 2nd Australian General Hospital in the Middle East. To the lay mind, this fact probably does not appear of singular interest, but when one stops for a moment to realise the value of such a gift to a hospital in the middle of a desert, its significance is somewhat here.

In this workshop, which was paid for by the Victorian Red Cross workers' efforts, delicate surgical instruments and appliances are manufactured by capable craftsmen. Tools are manufactured for making the social such as a delimiting effects of the climate and desert sand promptly combat.

Apart from the actual manufacture of apparatus, the workshop acts as a general repair and maintenance station for a wide range of appliances, varying from sterilizers from the operating theatre to the primary stores from the wards.

The tremendous value of this workshop cannot be overemphasized. A striking instance of the essential nature of the work being done there, is evinced in the case of repairing the control valves of anaesthetic apparatus. Were

it not possible to re-machine these valves as often as they become defective owing to the effects of desert conditions, and to make the tools required for this re-machining in the workshop, most of the gas anaesthetic apparatus possessed by the hospital would have been already supplied.

This is just another aspect of Red Cross which demonstrates the thorough and worthwhile job of work in which each individual Red Cross worker is playing his or her part. — "Farm and Home Journal."

**COMMERCIAL.**

**BALLARAT LIVE STOCK MARKETS.**

Tuesday.  
The ruling prices of the previous fortnight for cattle were not maintained at the weekly sales held at the Corporation yards. Prime wethers were well supplied, and with the exception of heavy sections, the remainder of the sale was steady. An increased number of lambs was penned. The market for best quality was steady, but store descriptions eased.

Cattle. A slightly heavier yarding of cattle came forward, falling 100. There were only about 450 bullocks; one truck being prime. The demand was steady for handy store descriptions eased.

Calves — 126 penned. A small proportion consisted of good and prime steers and heifers, and there were a few good vealers. Competition was steady at late rates. Best two cows and bull. M. Sheep — 3183 penned. There was a splendid offering of good and prime wethers, many pens consisting of heavyweights, carrying a lot of good skins. Cows were only moderately represented, and the quality was chiefly plain. The demand was steady for handy weight wethers and ewes at last week's quotations, but heavy wethers were perhaps slightly easier.

Quotations:—Prime crossed wethers, 20/ to 18/; extra, 14/ to 12/; prime, 17/ to 16/; good, 11/ to 13/; prime, 12/ to 11/; useful, 10/ to 12/; extra, 22/7; good, 14/ to 18/.

Lambs 2294 penned. There was a smaller proportion of good and prime quality; the bulk consisting of useful grades, with a larger percentage of crossers. Competition was steady, and for best quality there was little alteration in values, but store lambs were cheaper. Quotations:—Prime, 17/ to 18/; extra, 14/ to 12/; good, 13/ to 15/; useful, 10/ to 12/.

**A NEGLECTED RELIC.**

Ararat's Link With Nelson's Navy.  
The older generation of Araratians (writes the "Advertiser") will remember the old cannon which for many years was a conspicuous feature of the Town Hall square, reminding all who passed of the glory of the Navy of Nelson's England. Removed to an out-of-the-way site in Alexandra Park, the mounting of the old gun has fallen into disrepair, and it has been left to a passing visitor—a former resident of the town—to draw attention to this relic of the British Navy and its association with the founding of the Australian Navy.

In a letter to the Town Council, Mr H. P. H. Brittain (remembered by his "old boys" here as a son of Sergeant-Major Brittain) tells the history of the relic.

As a one-time resident of Ararat, I recently revisited the town after an absence of 38 years. I am sure that I need not say that the changes that had occurred for the better in the town were at once obvious. I particularly admired the gardens and memorials surrounding the Town Hall, and the extensive improvements made about the lake. I was surprised, however, to notice that what we used to refer to as "the cannon," which once adorned what was then "the Market Square," had been relegated to an obscure corner of the gardens near the lake. There I came across the old veteran, the carriage broken down, and evidently uncared for. On my arrival in Ballarat, I found several similar pieces of ordnance occupying an honoured place in the public gardens. To them was affixed a small and inexpensive metal plate, bearing the inscription:—"32 prd. M.L. Guns, forming part of the armament of the 6-decker line of battleship, H.M.V.S. Nelson, 120 guns, senior naval officers' ship of the Victorian Navy. Keel laid, 1798; launched, 1814; arrived in Hobson's Bay, 1869; on commission, 1888." It was, of course, at the latter date that the cannon was presented to Ararat. It is certainly a relic of Nelson's day, and also of the infancy of the Australian Navy. As such, I feel sure that the people of Ararat might make a new truck and label

Singapore's Fire-Watchers.—Air Force fire-watchers have responded to the request of the Air Raids Precautions Department to co-operate in the next black-out exercise by arranging for internal fire-watch squads to be detailed for duty during the whole period.

Demand for Condensed Milk.  
The fullest co-operation of farmers will be needed if the increasing demand for condensed milk for the fighting forces overseas is to be met. The dangers of a carry-over for butter owing to lack of shipping space have been anticipated by arrangements to divert butter factories to the manufacture of condensed milk. When milk comes into full production in August the demands for condensed milk will be approximately 5,000 tons or 6,000,000 tins.

Response of Flax Growers.—Flax growers in Victoria are now responding magnificently to the appeal to grow more flax. The Minister for Supply and Development (Senator McBride) said. More than 20,000 acres have been booked and ample seed for all requirements will be available. Seed for a large proportion of the area has already been despatched, but as the sowing month is June, intending growers should not lose any time in applying to the Department of Agriculture, Melbourne, or the local flax mill manager. The excellent response in the experienced flax-growing districts of Hamilton and Colac has done much in allowing the area booked to approach Victoria's quota of 20,000 acres.

Empty Petrol Drums.—The return of 44-gallon empty petrol drums is now an urgent national necessity, stated the Minister for Supply and Development, Senator McBride. As a vital requirement for the defence of this country, 200,000 filled drums must be placed at safe strategic inland points immediately. All available steel is required for conversion into tanks and guns cannot be spared for making drums. Neither is it necessary. Empty drums are in existence; it is the national duty of holders to instantly answer this appeal. Drums should be returned to the nearest Oil Company's Depot preferably by the Company from which they were obtained.

Canada Builds Ships.—Canada's great war-time shipbuilding programme has now reached dimensions calling for a total expenditure of £15,000,000. In 1915 15 major shipyards 17,000 men are working at top pressure on the construction and adaptation of various types of craft for naval service and for co-operation with the Army and the Air Force. The vessels range from motor boats to corvettes, minesweepers and gunboats. Seventy corvettes and 50 minesweepers are among the items in the programme and many of these have already entered service.
