## GOOD YIELD OF WHEAT AND OATS EXPECTED

### THE H.E. SCHOOL AGRICULTURAL AND PASTORAL.

#### Meeting of Committee.

Several business items of interest were dealt with on Monday night at the monthly meeting of the Beaufort School Agricultural and Pastoral Committee, held at the H. E. School. Four members and the head teacher (Mr L. R. S. Dalrymple) were present, and Mr J. Scriven (chairman) presided.

The correspondent (Mr H. J. Buchanan) said he had closed with Mr A. E. Crick's offer to remove three pine trees at the school, near the Church of England Parish Hall. The working bee at the school plantation was not held on account of the rain.

Mr J. Duke said he put in an afternoon on the plantation on the following Saturday, and trimmed about 35 trees. Six men would do the rest in half-a-day.

The matter was deferred for the present.

Apologies were received for the absence of Messrs. Willie and Davey.

Mr Duke was accorded a vote of thanks for repairing the clocks, on the motion of Messrs. Scriven and Buchanan.

A notice was received from the inspector of noxious weeds to destroy blackberry, furze, sweet briar, and Cape broom on the school playground. To be attended to by the head teacher.

The head teacher reported that the attendance was 104 in the primary school, and 69 in the secondary school. They had lost a few pupils lately, and secured a few new ones. The roof had been repaired, and they had not seen any sign of rain since. They greatly appreciated Mr Duke's work in connection with the clocks. They had collected 88 dog eggs for the Ballarat Hospital. The merit certificate examination would be held on 24th November, and there were 20 candidates. They had 11 candidates for the proficiency examination in the last week in November, and there would be two candidates for the intermediate examination. The rain had washed some graves out in the school-ground. The seepage had been bad this year from under the school wall. Miss Walsh had been nominated for promotion, subject to appeal. A teacher had been appointed here from the University High School to take the position if Miss Walsh went.

### COMMERCIAL.

#### Ballarat Live Stock Market.

#### QUALITY CATTLE FIRM IN CORPORATION YARDS.

Tuesday.

Cattle — 123 were yarded, including 63 bullocks, more than half of which comprised prime medium weights, others good and useful trade sorts. The demand for best quality Victorian bullocks was good, and values for such, while long-distance cattle were decidedly easier. Quotations:—Prime medium weight bullocks, £17 to £18; heavy, to £19/5/; good, £15/10/ to £16/10/; good quality S.A. bullocks, £14 to £16/12/; prime cows, £13 to £14/7/6; good, £11 to £12; useful, £9/10/ to £9/10/.

Calves — 52 penned. The quality showed some improvement, but values were unaltered. Best made £13 11/.

Sheep — 3581 penned—a slight reduction on last week's numbers. Really prime wethers were limited, but a big proportion consisted of good trade quality sheep, including a larger percentage of ewes, many of which were heavy weights. Sales again lacked animation, and values were generally on a lower level; heavy ewes being much cheaper. Quotations:—Prime crossbred wethers, 16/6 to 17/; good, 15/ to 16/; prime crossbred ewes, 10/6 to 11/6; heavy, to 12/4; good, 9/6 to 9/6; prime merino wethers, 14/ to 15/; heavy, to 17/4; good, 12/ to 13/.

Lambs — 2236 penned—about 800 less than last week. The quality was generally good; many pens being prime, others well suited to trade and export requirements. Bidding was keen throughout, and values were quite equal to last week's improved closing rates. Quotations:—Prime, 18/ to 19/6; heavy, 20/ to 23/1; good, 16/ to 17/6; good light weights, 14/6 to 15/.

Store Sheep — About 850 penned, comprising principally young crossbred wethers and ewes. The demand was strong, and very satisfactory prices were realised for all descriptions.

The following district sales are reported:—45 lambs, Mr Jas. McEwale, Burrambeet, 14/9 to 17/1, averaging 16/; 21 bullocks, Wing-Commander C. O. Fairclough, Burrambeet, 14/9 to 15/17/6, averaging £17/12/6, top price and highest average of the market; 31 lambs, Mr Hubert J. Smith, Orana, Stockyard Hill, 19/7 to 16/1, averaging 17/9.

#### SOLDIER'S LETTER.

#### SIGNALER LOOKS OVER A NATIVE VILLAGE.

Following is a letter to a friend in Beaufort, from Signaller C. J. Johnston, written at sea:—Recently some of my pals and I went ashore to have a look at a native village. Believe me, it was a great bit of shore leave. We thought it was going to be very dull, but it just turned out the opposite. As soon as we made our way towards the village, a couple of little kids attached themselves to us as guides. They knew a little English, which was taught to them by the missionaries. They showed us and sold us everything of interest relating to the village. Every darned tree we came to my little guide wanted to get in a coconut. I gave him a packet of biscuits, and he thought he was a king. He wanted to follow me everywhere, and after I let him wear my cap, he wouldn't leave until I returned to my ship. The villagers were quite unconcerned about our visit, and tried to sell us everything they had. At night they had a dance, which, believe me, puts it over any modern dance known. The huts are built on stumps over the water, and in them you find everything from the mother-in-law to the pig-pigs. Quite a family, and that includes uncles, aunts, sisters, brothers, cousins, and in-laws. What struck me as being rather queer was a funeral party. The person who was to be buried wasn't even dead. They were making his coffin outside of his door, while the women were singing and praying for him. Thank heaven we don't have these rules or religions amongst the whites! While we were anchored some of the boys tried their hand at fishing. Four or five fish, including a 300 lb. croaker, were caught. The croaker was quite a nice topic for a while. As we sailed, I still had all these happenings in my mind, and always will.

#### FARM LABOR SHORTAGE.

#### NEED FOR PROMPT ACTION.

"As crops are reaching the advanced stage, it is essential that no time be lost by farmers if additional labor is to be provided for the coming harvest," said the Premier, Mr. Dunstan, in a statement.

The number of applications received to date had been surprising, and he was convinced, however, that a shortage of laborers would follow unless farmers acted promptly.

The Government had gone to considerable trouble to ascertain the needs of farmers, and unless the man on the land supplied the information regarding his requirements, the Government would be powerless to help.

Time for Action.

The Premier added that he hoped all those who considered they would be short of labor would immediately get in touch with the district lands inspectors or duty supervisors or post their applications direct to them.

The Government desires to give every assistance possible in this matter," said the Premier, "but it cannot do so unless applications for labor for the harvest are forthcoming immediately.

What To Do.

Applicants should confine their requests to the minimum, and request only the necessary labor to prevent loss of crops.

The area to be harvested for ensilage, hay, grain or flax, should be stated; also the nature of labor required (skilled or unskilled) and the probable date of the commencement of harvest.

Where farmers can give the names of men now in camp, who would be willing to take up harvesting, if temporarily released from military duty, they should do so, and also state unit and occupation if possible.

If in any doubt of details to be supplied, farmers should at once get in touch with Mr Malcolm, superintendent Closer Settlement, Land Office, Melbourne.

#### GAS UNITS FOR CARS.

#### KEEP GAS LINES OUTSIDE BODY.

While there are regulations governing the construction and installation of private gas units which are offered for sale to the general public, no such restrictions govern the construction of home-made units intended by the maker for use only on his own car. In this respect he has a free hand to do what he likes, and this has prompted a note or engineer to write to the "Radiation," the official organ of the R.A.C.V., directing attention to the carelessness he has seen in the fitting of gas producers to some vehicles where the induction pipe from the gas generator to the engine has been carried through the body or boot of the car. Should any puncture or leak develop in this pipe it would be a source of carbon monoxide gas which would be fraught with danger of asphyxiation or partial unconsciousness to the driver and passengers. In view of the number of gas units now being fitted, many of these of home construction, it would be advisable, he says, to consider some means of issuing a certificate by a competent authority with the necessary technical knowledge before any gas producer was allowed on the road. The R.A.C.V. has knowledge of three firms which have occurred in cars fitted with gas producers, and in each case the gas pipe had been brought through the boot and had been ignited by the heat of the gas pipe. While the Government specifications for approved units do not expressly prohibit the pipe being taken through the boot, in actual fact this is never done, as it is easier to take the pipe underneath or outside the car than to cut holes through wood and metal. Further, the gas is more easily cooled by the pipe being exposed to the flow of air.

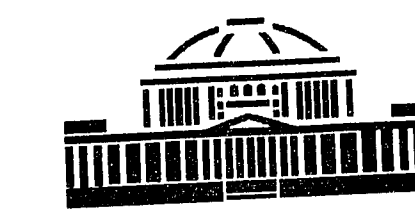

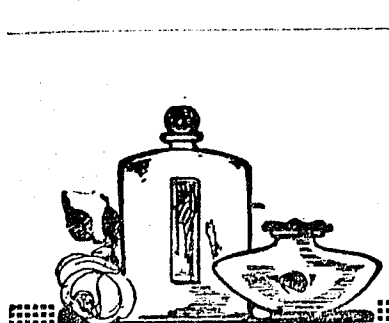
