SPARE PARTS RELIEF.

The R.A.C.V. has received information from the Controller of Spare Parts that some relief has been given in regard to a limited number of parts for motor cars. In two cases the priorities have been extended from 6 to 8 and in a large number the extension is from 8 to 10. Armature shafts and commutators and speedometer head parts can now be obtained by persons in priorities up to 8, while the parts available to priority 10 and under include the following:-Battery cables and earth straps, hydraulic brake hoses, brake parts where rubber forms a constituent part, all types of brass and phosphor bronze bushes, distributor caps and rotors, contacts, arms and screws, engine mountings (rubber), exhaust mufflers, petrol and oil flexible lines, exhaust pipes, shackles or parts (where rubber forms a constituent part), shock absorber parts, spark plugs, dimmer and Police, or otherwise leading to the starter switches, and wire and cable for Conviction of Person or Persons steal- automotive lighting and starting.
