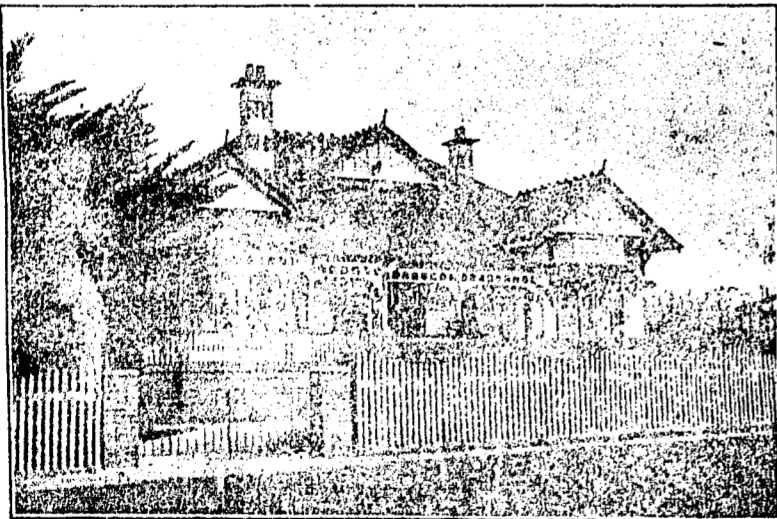

## BEAUFORT GROWS STEADILY BUT SOUNDLY

The following article appeared in the "Ballarat Courier" on Monday from that journal's Beaufort correspondent:—

With its roots deep in the past, Beaufort has more than a century of history behind it as a pastoral and mining centre.

After Major Mitchell passed through the district in 1836 the early squatters began to settle on the country to the east, west and south of where the town now stands. The population remained sparse for the next 20 years until the discovery of gold at Yam Holes Hill and Fieri Creek between 1852 and 1855, when the diggers arrived in their thousands. Many passed on to other gold-fields but others became permanent-settlers.

### GROWTH OF TOWNSHIP.

About 1860 the town began to form on its present site, deep alluvial mines were being opened up, and small farms settled at Waterloo, Chute, Trawalla, Eurambeen, Stockyard Hill, Raglan, Middle Creek, and Lake Goldsmith, and Beaufort grew into a considerable business and residential centre.

Like all mining towns it passed through hard times, but as the farming and woolgrowing industry developed, the town earned a reputation as a "solid" one—a distinction that it enjoys to this day.

The local Agricultural Society was founded in 1870, and the 73rd show held last month was one of the most successful in its history. Deep mining practically petered out about 1914-18 and when some 40,000 acres of Trawalla Station were subdivided for soldier settlement after World War No. 1 and the majority of the settlers became successful sheepbreeders and mixed farmers, this tided the town and district over what would otherwise have been a critical period.

As in all country towns, World War No. 2 has closed a number of small shops in Beaufort, but residents are looking forward with renewed hope to the future.

### COMING INDUSTRIES

A block of land has been purchased by Graham Burgin Pty. Ltd., a Brunswick manufacturing concern, in Lawrence and Leichardt Streets, and the plans are out for a shirt and pyjama factory, which will employ from 20 to 30 local girls. This is expected to start work early in the New Year.

An advertisement has appeared in the "Government Gazette" to the effect that the State Government is taking steps to negotiate for the compulsory acquisition of 20,000 acres of the Lang-Kal Estate, Trawalla, through which the Western Highway and the main Adelaide railway line run. It is the intention to settle discharged servicemen on this land, and that should give an impetus to the already well-established industry in the district in which the small woolgrower and mixed farmer are engaged.

### POST-WAR BUILDING.

Flax growing has been successfully carried on in various parts of Ripon Shire during the past three years, and promises to become a good sideline for the farmer. A post-war work to which the Ripon Shire Council, the Ripon sub-branch, R.S.L., the Ripon Dads' Association, and the public generally are committed is the erection of a new building, to cost approximately, £12,000, which will be used as Council Chambers, shire offices, and a Soldiers' Memorial Hall. All things considered, there are sound reasons for the people of Beaufort and district to face the future with confidence.

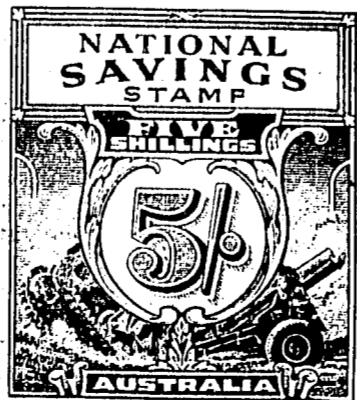
### FIREWOOD AND TIMBER.

Beaufort is prettily situated in an amphitheatre of tree-covered hills, and during the present war there has been a great revival of the firewood and timber industry here, under the control of Mr C. V. Wyllie, local forest officer. The Forests Department has about 50 men employed cutting and sawing 5ft. and 1ft. firewood, posts and poles. Many truck owners and drivers are also engaged in the carting.

### CONCUSSION.

## THE PEOPLE'S MONEY

(Contributed).

The Government has "a golden opportunity," so Mr Ward says, "to carry out its financial policy." What is the Government's financial policy? In the eyes of a democratic people it can only be the policy submitted to and approved by them at the elections a year ago. What policy was that? It certainly promised nothing drastic in the way of banking legislation.

We know the Labour Party's policy as it is written into the general party platform. It is a policy of socialisation. But Mr Curtin did not raise that issue at the general elections. On the contrary, when his opponents mentioned it, he accused them of raising bogeys.

Are Mr Curtin and Mr Chifley going to betray the people's confidence to please Mr Ward and Mr Lazzarini? Let us not be fobbed off. Interference with banking is interference with the people's money. It means not only interference with their deposits and the avenues available to them for borrowing, it means interference with the mechanism which largely decides what the purchasing power of the people's money shall be, and what shall happen to the value of their savings, whether those savings are in the form of money, government bonds or savings certificates, or insurance policies. Banking is one matter—one above almost any other—about which it is incumbent upon any Government to obtain a clear and unmistakable mandate before acting.

We have to-day a banking system, which, notwithstanding any faults that may be found with it, has stood us in good stead in good times and bad. At its head stands the State-owned Commonwealth Bank, under the direct supervision of the Bank Board, its personnel chosen for their capacity, knowledge and integrity. One of the "reforms" apparently in contemplation is the abolition, or at least the drastic curtailment of the authority of this Board.

No Government has fought an election on that definite issue. In 1934 Mr Scullin proposed something resembling it, but was soundly defeated. It is extremely doubtful whether Mr Curtin would care to fight an election on it. At any rate, he has not done so. And there can be no such thing as a "golden opportunity" to do anything affecting the Australian banking system until what is intended has been submitted to, and approved by, the Australian people.
