The following article appeared in the "Ballarat Courier" on Monday from that journal's Beaufort correspondent: --

With its roots deep in the past, Beaufort has more than a century of history behind it as a pastoral and mining

After Major Mitchell passed through the district in 1836 the early squatters began to settle on the country to the east, west and south of where the town now stands. The population remained sparse for the next 20 years until the discovery of gold at Yam Holes Hill and Fiery Creek between 1852 and 1855, when the diggers arrived in their thousands. Many passed on to other goldfields but others became permanent settlers.

Like all mining towns it passed through hard times, but as the farming and woolgrowing industry developed, the town earned a reputation as a "solid" one - a distinction that it enjoys to this day.
