

SHEARING OF SHEEP

Commenting on National Security (Shearing of Sheep) Regulations, the Deputy Director-General of Man Power (Victoria), Mr D. Cameron, stated on June 25 that the zone boundaries and prohibited shearing periods for the shearing zones administered by the Victorian Man Power Directorate remain unaltered for the 1945 season, and are as follow:-In New South Wales: Zone 8

(prohibited shearing period August 1 to October 14, inclusive). Zone 9 (September 1 to October 31). Zone 10 (September 16 to November .7). In Victoria: Zone 9 (September 1 to October 31). Zone 11 (October 16 to November 30). Zone 12 (December 1 to December 31). Zone 12 (July 1 to November 7), and Zone 14 (August 16 to October 14). Mr Cameron issued a reminder that the Shearing Regulations embraced all flock sheep and lambs. The only sheep which could be shorn during a prohibited period, without a permit, were rams, ewes from which rams are bred for sale or station use, and the progeny of such ewes which have not been

culled into the general flock. Although the general labour position in rural areas had improved during the past 12 months as a result of releases from the Services and munitions bloc, there was still a considerable scarcity of skilled shearing

Despite the reduced sheer population which had resulted rom the prolonged drought, the utmost co-operation of all concerned in shearing operations would be necessary to prevent an acute labour position and consequent dislocation during the peak of the shearing season, especially in view of the discontinuance of seasonal leave for Army personnel, of whom an average of approximately 500 had been made available for engagements in Victorian zones during the last three shearing


seasons Shearing in Queensland and northern and north-western New South Wales was behind schedule, and this would retard the usual flow of labour from those States to the southern

Mr Cameron said that he is ocnfident that the Man Power Directorate will continue to receive the wholehearted co-operation which had been displayed in previous seasons by the great majority of sheepowners and shearing contractors, whose ready compliance with the principles of the zoning scheme had been reflected in the fact that the wool clip had been taken off with commendable efficiency and minimum delay, in spite not only of serious labour shortages, but also major difficulties



He indicated that 1945 shearing return forms, which must be completed and furnished by shearing contractors or sheep owners, with regard to the shearing of individual flocks, had been widely distributed. They could be obtained from the shearing register section of the directorate, country national services offices, or local war agricultural committees, who also had supplies of application forms for permission to shear during a prohibited period.

It is gratifying to be able to report that the Public immediately responded, and the money came in from all quarters. A perusal of the final financial statement shows how splendidly the various organisations and public in general assisted the cause. The total money received for the three years and 10 months was £4744/1/8. of which £4742/0/11 was sent to headquarters, or

The work of the ladies in practically all these efforts is most marked, and to those who originated and organised the P.O.W. Shop, we give pride of place.


