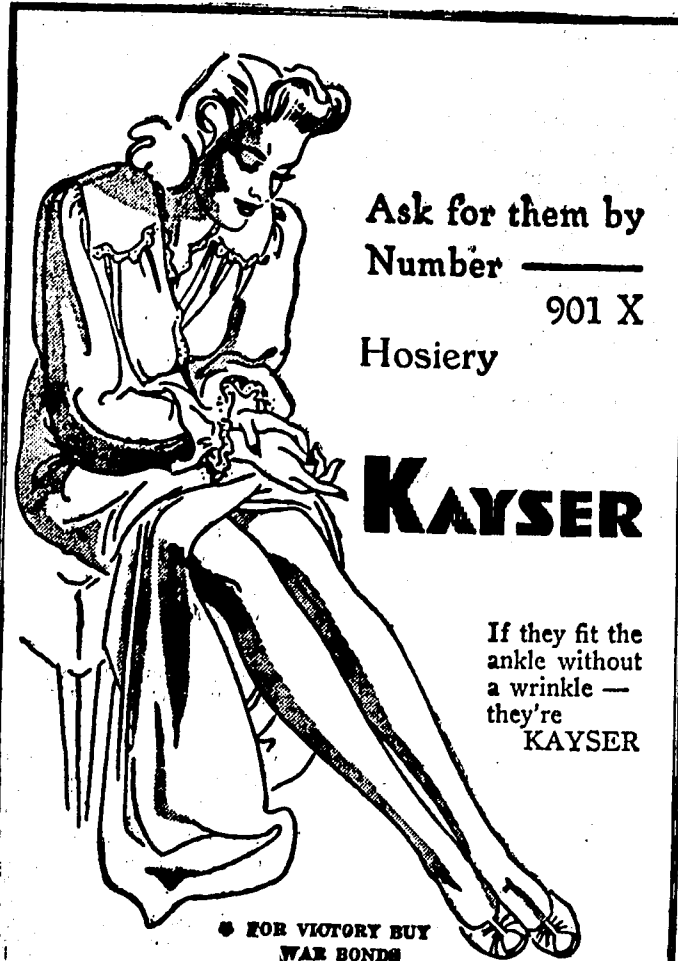

MEETING OF COMMITTEE.

As he is leaving the district Mr W. W. Ashley forwarded his resignation as a member of the Beaufort Mechanics' Institute Committee, at the monthly meeting of that body on Friday night, 24th August. Six members and the secretary-librarian (Mrs C. Gillingham) were present. An apology was received for the absence of Mr H. J. Buchanan. The secretary-librarian's financial statement, which was adopted, showed that receipts for the month was £29/14/10 and expenditure £35/5/10; the present credit balance being £112/9/2. Accounts amounting to £35/5/10 were passed for payment (including an account for a men's lavatory, which was the subject of some discussion). Arrangements were made to hold a send-off to Mr and Mrs W. W. Ashley on Tuesday night, 28th August, in conjunction with the Tennis Club, and it was resolved to make a gift to Mr Ashley. On the motion of Messrs. Q. W. Gregory and W. L. Williams the resignation of Mr Ashley was received with regret, and a minute in appreciation of his services is to be placed on the books, and a letter sent to him thanking him for his past work for the Institute. The secretary librarian was granted three weeks' leave of absence. It was resolved to write to Mr V. C. Jenkin in regard to children's books. On the motion of Messrs. J. Duke and F. J. Martin, it was decided that the time limits for billiards be reduced from 40 to 30 minutes for 100 up, and from 20 to 15 minutes for 50 up; the new limits to start on August 27. A return billiards match between the Mechanics' and Fire Brigade teams is to be arranged. The question of purchasing another billiard table is to be an order of business for discussion at next meeting.

DEPARTING P.M. — Mr G. S. Catlow, who has for several years occupied the position of police magistrate for Ballarat and district, will shortly be leaving Ballarat on transfer. He will be succeeded by Mr Irvine Williams, of Wangaratta, and formerly of Ballarat. During his stay in Ballarat, Mr Catlow has worthily upheld the high traditions of the magistracy and his transfer will be regretted not only by his fellow-citizens, but by all who have had business at the local court. Mr Catlow's decisions have always been based on sound law, and when circumstances justified that course, he has tempered justice with mercy.

PROSPECTS AT BURRUMBEET. — At Burrumbeet the weather continues showery, without any heavy downpours. Fortunately it has not turned very cold, and conditions are favourable to the growth of crops. There has not been enough soaking rain to fully benefit the soil. The hay crops are making good growth, and under reasonably good normal conditions, should yield quite well. The grass is also showing some headway, but not as much as crops. The advent of spring generally stops the grubs from working so destructively, but they are still in evidence.

MUNICIPAL NOTES.

ARARAT COUNCIL.

At the Ararat Shire Council meeting on Friday, 17th August, a letter was read from the secretary of Streatham Progress Association, asking that a tie-up rail and post for horses be erected in front of the post office, existing ones to be moved away from bowlers; that a light be placed on pole at junction of Ararat-Hamilton roads; that holes be filled in township and concrete gutters formed where needed; that shelter be erected for bus passengers. — The president moved that the works be carried out when labour and material are available. Seconded by Cr. King and carried.

From secretary, Streatham Progress Association, advising that the association decided on sugar gums as the most suitable tree for plantation. They wished to set up plantations and also plant single trees to replace others in township. What was the position re trees and guards on east side of Streatham bridge planted by the local C.W.A.? — Cr. King moved that the secretary apply for trees and make inquiries about the guards. Seconded by Cr. Hucker, and carried.

From M. Gregory, Ballarat, thanking Council for framed certificate for her late son. — Received.

From E. A. Fay, Middle Creek, asking that 10 chains of road from the Boundary Road, running north and south, adjacent to his property, at present leased to the executors C. B. White be opened for traffic. If his request is granted, he asked permission to plant sugar gums there. — Referred to estimate inspection.

The engineer reported:—Rubbish Tip, Buangor: The provision of a rubbish tip at Buangor is necessary and I have inspected various sites in the vicinity. There is no Crown land available except on the Billy Billy Creek frontage, which is not a desirable site, and the Council will require to purchase land for a tip. Two sites are suggested — (a) 1½ acres adjoining the road on C.A. 76 and A; and (b) or the timber in C.A.G. adjoining Warrak road. On the first site it is suggested that the gravel be removed and tip be covered over from time to time. — Cr. Brebner moved that the matter be left till annual inspection. Seconded by Cr. Vanstan, and carried.

The engineer also reported that the grader on the Warrak-Buangor road, and Mount Cole road.

Cr. Brebner said the invert between Macraes and Challicum needed repairs.

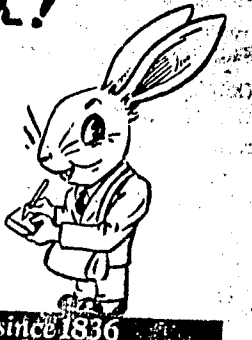

LAND SETTLEMENT

BLOCKS FOR SERVICEMEN.

GOVERNMENTS' COMPLETE AGREEMENTS. The terms of the agreements between the Commonwealth and the six States, and of the war service men and women of the war now ending will be settled on the land were adopted at the Premiers' Conference this week.

The Premiers undertook to introduce in their Parliaments at an early date legislation to carry out the agreements, and on behalf of the Commonwealth Government, the Minister for Post-War Reconstruction (Mr. Deakin) stated that he would introduce legislation to carry out the agreements.

The Governments have unanimously agreed to the War Service Land Settlement Scheme which is governed by five basic principles, and that the number of ex-service people to be settled will be determined by the extent of opportunities for successful settlement rather than by the number of applicants.

The principles in accordance with which settlement is to be carried out are:— 1. The settlement must be personally suitable for life on the land and possessed of sufficient knowledge and experience of the form of production in which he wishes to engage to make successful results.

2. The land must be proved suitable for the purpose for which it is proposed to be used, and the area must be adequate to maintain the settler and his wife and family at a proper standard of living and to meet all operating and overhead charges.

3. There must be available a market capable of absorbing the settler's production at prices which will enable the second requirements to be satisfied.

4. While lack of capital should not exclude from settlement a man or woman who is otherwise suitable, settlers will be expected to invest any resources of their own which they may have available in reduction of their liabilities under the scheme.

5. Adequate guidance and technical advice should be available to settlers through agricultural extension services.

STARS OF THE AIR

BRUCE MILLER — A.B.C. FEATURE TALKS OFFICER

"AFTER long experience in different types of broadcasting, I consider interviewing the most difficult of all," says Bruce Miller, who has been with the A.B.C. for

many feature broadcasts, actualities, and "Over to Youth" sessions. His special documentary broadcasts have included the deaths of President Roosevelt and John Curtin, and the end of the war in Europe and in the Pacific, and D-day in Europe.

Among the interesting personalities he has interviewed on the air are Sahu, Bob Hope, Eugene and Mrs. Ormanly, William Kapell, Gene Tunney, Malcolm Sargent, Admiral Vian, and what he describes as the victorious entry into Sydney of H.M.S. Formidable.

He had gone aboard at Sydney Heads from the pilot-ship Captain Cook, up a rope ladder, carrying a portable recorder, which he declares was "an unpleasant experience at the time, but pleasant to talk about afterwards."

He also took a mobile recording unit into drought area, last summer to describe the conditions.

Bruce Miller's interest in broadcasting lies mainly in news talks, commentaries, eye-witness accounts, observer commentaries, and so forth. He says: "I think that there are great possibilities in these broadcasts, and that their use should be developed to supplement ordinary news sessions. I believe too, that broadcasting can tackle the task of adult education better than it does, by marrying educational subjects to radio technique, in the way that Wilfrid Thomas does."

After week. His sessions are educational, but how many persons listening to them realize that they are being educated and stimulated to think for themselves? But they are. And that's how it should be.

Since 1943, Bruce Miller has been attached to the Federal Talks Department as Feature Talks Officer. During his early service with the A.B.C., he attended University lectures at night, and he is now Bachelor of Economics and prizeman in Public Administration.

At present he is a tutor in Economics and Australian Government at the Henry Lawson Labour College. During his University period he was a member of the Students' Representative Council, and also editor of the University newspaper, *Honi Soit*—the only evening student to hold this post. He now wants to graduate as Master of Economics.
