SUBTERRANEAN CLOVER PASTURES

The grazing animal has a great influence on the development and botanical composition of a pasture—and subterranean clover pastures are no exception to the rule.

For the successful maintenance of subterranean clover pastures, therefore, it is advisable not to overgraze them in the autumn.

A subterranean clover pasture requires regular top dressing with superphosphate, and in the early years after establishment, an annual top-dressing with 3-cwt. of super to the acre should give economical results.

THE CABBAGE MOTH AND THE CABBAGE BUTTERFLY

As plantings of cauliflowers and Brussels sprouts have commenced, growers are advised by biologists of the Victorian Department of Agriculture to take every precaution against these pests right from the commencement.

Treatment should be commenced as soon as the young plants are established after planting out, and continued at regular intervals, not exceeding 10 days.

Dusting is recommended. A satisfactory dust is one containing 50 per cent. of lead arsenate. This dust is purchasable in prepared form, or may be mixed by the grower using equal parts of lead arsenate and a filler such as kaolin, talc or hydrate of lime.
