



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

He had been a minister long enough to be aware of his mistakes, to have acquired a certain degree of humility and to be prepared to profit by his mistakes. He was no doubt glad f the opportunity to make a fresh start in a new charge. He also offered the minister a word of felicitation. Let the new beginning be a new dedication to God. The real success of his ministry depended on his relation. ship in the secret places of his own heart to God. He would rejoice because the new start gave him a certain ministeria momentum, and sooner or later he would come down to earth. Most of his ministerial pilgrimage he would be walking on solid earth, with very little ap plause, and a great deal of criticism. One great theological professor used to say to the students. "Gentlemen, remembe you joined the ministry to be shot at." He would gradually have to get things and people sorted out but he would find a few in the congregation-he hoped more than a few-for whose loval support he would be thankful. The man who saw a little further than large congre

gations and popularity would b able to take all the discouragement and difficulties. Every minister had another judgement to face. If he knew in his heat that he had done that solid work that would stand the tes judgement day, all would k

Addressing the congregation in the absence of Rev. Dr. Fin ey Fraser, Rev. Dr. Button said all things were as nothing to that sense of loyalty in th congregation to God. The ministry was a joint one of people and minister. They were called to serve the people of this district in the ministry of Christ and the things of Christ. Let them say "our congregation," and let the minister see they were fellow workers with him They could show an ancient al their modern amenities, and he would have had most of them in his time, but if they showed him a Christian congregation that would be unique. The Church was needed to-day more than ever. Leading men in secular callings outside the ministry had said they were in for a ter. rible time in this country unless there was a return to religion. They, as a congregation, had promised the minister respect. incouragement, and obedience in the law. They should give the inister that encouragement he needed. If he had helped them they should tell him so-it would help him in his work. So many people thought their little bit of help would not be missed, that the minister got no assistance at all, like the old story of the priest and the cask of wine his parishioners were supposed o have given him by each con. tributing his flagon, and most of which turned out to be water. He concluded with a story of hi own experience in the back country in N.S.W. 30 years ago, where an old minister who was well liked but did not get big congregations was given a wonderful fnneral.
