LABOUR CANDIDATE VISITS THE NORTH.

We take the following from an article in the "Mortlake Dispatch" of August 7:-

During a week-end tour of the Beaufort, Lexton, Maryborough Mrs Muntz 2-24-26 and Avoca districts, Mr H. J. Stacpoole, endorsed Labour candidate for the Corangamite electorate, made full use of the op-Whiting 18-10-28 for gold mining. His father, the late J. G. Stacpoole, was a well known mine manager in the Woods Point and Walhalla districts, from which he retired in

1913 to take up land at Westmere. But the gold fever seems to have a hereditary trait, and policies were forgotten in the home of Mr R. H. Pitcher, of Beaufort, a gold fields poet in Brennan's, Middle Creek, had the Henry Lawson tradition, who regaled his visitor with poems and stories of gold fields from New Zealand to Kalgoorlie, and explained the "true theory" of the position of the undiscovered reef which shed the gold of the famous deep leads of the district.

At Lexton Mr Stacpoole met one of the well known old time managers in the person of Mr Stratman, still alert and energetic at the age of 80, who has, however, turned his attention from gold to the development of a high grade deposit of porcelain clay in that district.

It was good said Mr Stacpoole, to see the attention of the people in these districts turn to industries of a really permanent character, the development of forestry and of secondary industries. In recent weeks the forest areas of Mt. Cole have been opened up and at Beaufort a large modern sawmilling plant has just commenced operations. Brickworks are being established throughout the area and at Maryborough and Avoca many new houses built from local bricks are springing up. Under the inspiration of Mr C. P. Stoneham. MLA for Maryborough, new secondary industries are being cstablished throughout the district Beaufort has a flourishing shirt factory, and Maryborough has no less than six secondary industries, employing in all upwards of 750 hands.

The progress made in these northern areas, said Mr Stacpoole, should surely be an object lesson for the Southern portion of the electorate. Around Mary borough, Beaufort and Lexton much of the land is of very poor quality, but here in the south we have an unbroken belt of 19,000 square miles of the richest land in the State, capable of supporting a farming population alone many thousands greater than at present. If Maryborough, surrounded on three sides by second and third class scrub country can support by its secondary industries a population of 6000 people. there is no reason why Mortlake, Terang, Skipton, Camperdown, Cobden, Penshurst, should not become equally populous centres, while Colac or Camperdown, in the heart of the region should become another Ballarat, and Warrnambool and Portland other Geelongs.
