



Although Parliament has passed an act to raise the schoolleaving age to fifteen, it has not yet been proclaimed, for the simple truth is that there are neither the necessary buildings nor the teachers required for this essential reform. Because of this the majority of boys and girls leave school at 14 just at the time when they are begin ning to get some glimpse of world affairs and of the cultural heritage of the race. As soon as the necessary ma terials and workmen are available, buildings and equipment can be supplied, but trained teachers cannot be provided at short notice, and little has been done to obtain them. Most of the lecturers at th. New Education Conference istressed the changed methods of teaching that had been gener ally accepted and proved successful in schools in most countries. of the world. Methods that involved more freedom for the individual attention by the teacher to the particular needs of particular children. the introduction of vocational trainingthese and many more tendencies were outlined as generally ac cepted principles. But as a neeessary corollary to the introduction of these methods we. the reduction in the size of classes. It is nothing short of ridiculous to expect our teachers to adopt these new ideas with classes of 50 shildren. Code, forestry inspector, was being farewelled at Ballarat by officers of the western division of the Victorian Forestry Commission (our local knowledge tells us that Messrs. T. D. Bailes and C. V. Wyllie also had a finger in the pie). Mr Code, who completed 47 years' service with the Commission, was presented with a well filled wallet of notes. Mr A. V. Galbraith (Chairman of the Forestry Commission) said that whereas Mr Code's heart was in the Western Division his long and wide experience had served the Commission well when conferences were called to consider the State as a whole forest area. "In his hey-day Mr Code was a virile forester, his was a physique which braved all weathers and endured hardships not so general to-day. Mount Cole State Forest is in my opinion the crowning achievement of the art of the true forester; it will remain his enduring monument and inspiration to generations of Victorian foresters," added Mr Galbraith. If the cover of your old Food Ration Book is missing you must produce, at least, the unused portions of Pages 6 and 7, without which no New Ration Card will be issued. (See below if unable to produce old book.) It will not be necessary to surrender the old Clothing Ration Card,

CHILDREN: New Ration Cards for children will be similarly obtained by the surrender of the child's old Food Ration Book.

Wherever practicable, Ration Cards of children should be collected by their parents or guardians.

Where this is impracticable, (e.g., children in institutions, etc.) the new Ration Card may be obtained by the head of the institution, etc., upon production of the child's old Food Ration Book.

BABIES: In the case of a young child for whom an ordinary 1945-46 Food Ration Book has not been obtained, or in respect of whom a special blue covered Food Ration Book has been issued, the parent or guardian should apply on Form Rg. 1 (obtainable at post offices) to the Deputy Director of Rationing for the new Ration Card.

Application must be made on Form Rg. 6 which s obtainable at post offices, and the application must e accompanied by your old (1945-46) Food Ration took.

COLLECTION (By agent): Where it is incon-personally at an Issuing Centre, a Ration Card may be collected by agent. An agent must produce the old (1943-46) Food Ration Book of the person for whom

No form of authority for agent is necessary.

The new Ration Card must be handed by the agent to the owner as carly as possible.

COLLECTION (By post): If an invalid, or seri-ing maternity, or living more than 5 miles from the mencest Issuing Centre, and you are unable to person-ally attend an Issuing Centre and are unable to syou may apply by post to your Ration Card by agent, Officer for your Ration Card.

IF YOU CANNOT PRODUCE YOUR OLD FOOD RATION BOOK

If you cannot produce your old Food Ration Book, you must complete a Card Rg. 5 (obtainable at Issuing Centre), and forward same to the Deputy-Director of

The Deputy-Director of Rationing will send you an emergency issue of food coupons. If he is satisfied, after check, of the bona-fides of your application, he will later forward you the new RATION CARD (Food and Clothing).

2 Different Classes of Ration Cards Will Be Issued

(1) BLACK: For persons 6 years of age and over at 1/1/47.

(2) GREEN: For children under 6 years at 1/1/47.

NOTE: The new Ration Card is in three sections, i.e., (1) Meat Ration Card, (2) Food Ration Card, and (3) Clothing Ration Card. It is advisable that these three sections be separated by you (cut neatly along perforated line). Then fold your cards and REMEMBER to keep carefully in a suitable container.
