Batting first, Waubra lost one vicket for four, but L. Westbrook, batting in his best style, put on a splendid 57 runs, including two sixers; being well supported by K. Dean, who played a steady knock for 28. This pair took the score to 102 before losing their wickets, and at the call of time Waubra had lost 4 wickets for the total of 102.

Beaufort tried six bowlers; M. Cole being the most successful, taking two wickets for 12. L. McGregor also bowled well; sending down nine overs for 10 runs and one wicket.
