giving full concert performances as well as modified programmes adapted to hospital wards and isolated outposts.

After his discharge from the A.I.F., Eddie Corderoy went to America to do research in radio, and to hear as much music and as many of the leading musicians as possible.

Starting from San Francisco, Eddie Corderoy slowly trekked his way across America. In Chicago he heard and met Charlie Spivak, also the late Glenn Miller's Orchestra, which has kept together and is now conducted by Tex Beneke (saxophonist with the band). As well as he heard Louis Armstrong's Orchestra, which he describes as "just as mighty as ever, with a modern band setup of seventeen pieces." He found that all the "Big name" band leaders were interested in Australia and asked him many questions about entertainment conditions in this country.

"In broadcasting, and on theatre circuits the trend in America is for big bands, averaging between twenty and forty pieces, and more strings are being included," commented Eddie Corderoy.

In New York Eddie Corderoy paid many visits to 52nd Street, the "Jazz Street," as he calls it. There he heard Coleman Hawkins, Stan Stewart, and Maxine Sullivan.

In Hollywood he toured the studios of Fox, R.K.O., and Columbia, where he heard top-line vocal favourites, including Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra. "Bing Crosby is a wonderful fellow to meet," said Corderoy. "He is a giving the producers the benefit of his research, especially in the field of variety, where, as well as in music, audience reaction is a very important feature. He has already started on this work in Melbourne, and he will continue to Adelaide, Perth, Sydney and Brisbane."

During the war years Eddie Corderoy served in the A.I.F. as musical director of the "Yarra-Rons," the Victoria Lines of Communication Concert Party, which was a mobile entertainment unit that served in northern battle stations. It travelled thousands of miles

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Graziers' Association of Victoria. SKIPTON BRANCH. THE MEAT FOR BRITAIN APPEAL.

STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT OF GRAZIERS' ASSOCIATION. Mr T. Leigh Simpson, president of the Graziers' Association of Victoria, has issued the following statement regarding the Meat for Britain Appeal...

We have been informed that exports of meat to the United Kingdom in the half-year ending 30th April next may fall 10,000 tons below earlier estimates and that unless this shortage can be averted by an immediate increase in shipments, the British civilian ration may have to be further reduced.

This is not a period of the year when any quantity of meat normally is available for export from Victoria. In the present season there is a serious shortage of stock and local market prices are considerably higher than export parity.

The Commonwealth Government has refused to share any portion of this difference in value, and apparently is content to place the whole financial responsibility on the individual stockowners, who may have fat stock suitable for export.

The urgency of Britain's food needs is so great, however, that I feel we must put on one side any feelings we may have regarding the general attitude of the Commonwealth Government towards the export of meat.

I appeal to each Victorian stockowner immediately to examine the possibility of supplying some of his stock for treatment as export meat during this month.

In the existing circumstances, this is the only practical way in which the Government's quantity of meat can be made available for early shipment to Great Britain.
