





STAFFORD DYSON PICKS A WINNER



STUDENT, SPORTSMAN AND RADIO PRODUCER.

STAFFORD DYSON. Producer of Drama and Features in Adelaide, devised the series "Radio Rodeo," heard on Mon-days at 8 p.m. on Interstate relay. The show is designed to provide entertain-ment and information for the man in the outhack. W HEN he conceived the idea o

W "Radio Rodeo," Stafford Dyson telt that he was on a good thing for radio listeners; and he is certainly a fair judge of what the discriminating listener likes. "Radio Rodeo" was among the prize-winners in the recent A.B.C. Idea: Competition, and the story of the man who devised "Radio Rodeo" makes interesting listening.

Stafford Dyson's parents were English: his father (the Rev. H. E S. Dyson) was a priest of the Church of England in the diocese of Adelaide. Born in 1918, Stafford wa educated at St. Peter's College, Adelaide, Even as a schoolboy he was interested in drama, and held the position of president of the school dramatic society. In his final term he played "Dr Haegert" is "The Late Christopher Bean."

With the idea of studying for the Church of Regland ministry, Staffor-

sailed for England in 1936, and entered Keble College, Oxford. For three years he studied in the Honours School of Theology, but, as he himself confesses, his interests did not entirely lie in that direction. "Most of my time was spent with amateur theatre and student political move-ments." This may not be surprising, for Keble plays had the distinction of being produced by that well-known English stage and film per-sonality, Leslie Banks-himself an old Keble man.

PRICE THREEPENCE

While at Oxford, Stafford Dyson was greatly interested in rowing. He had the honour of being one of two freshmen chosen to row in the 41mile long-distance race in his first term. Later, he rowed in first Torpids and Summer Eights.

Returning to Australia in 1939. Stafford brought home with him his fiancee, Vicki Evetts, of Oxford. They were married shortly after their arrival in Adelaide. The Commission soon appointed him to the Adelaide staff as cadet announcer.

With his wife, he wrote and compered a weekly Sunday night magazine feature entitled "Mixed Pickles." In 1941, Stafford resigned from the Commission, but in 1945 he returned to the A.B.C. to become Product of Forma and Fortune in Producer of Drama and Features in South Australia.

As an Ideas Competition winner with "Radio Rodeo," Stafford Dyson has definite ideas for breaking new ground in features and rural broadcusting. He realises that radio, as a means of education and entertainment, must cater for the big proportion of radio audiences outback, who have their own particular interests, but who, nevertheless, form

an integral part of the Australian national and economic life.

This, then, is the aim behind "Radio Rodeo" to direct a radio programme having a faithful backround and atmosphere of the Great outralian Outback, presented in a samer that will yet interest city ivellers and bring to them a wider nowledge and understanding of the stept to which our great country dependent on the life and labour people of the outback







Give the threads a good soaking with kerosene and oil and the nuts will then respond to the well-fitted spanner. Loose brackets or bands allow tank vibration and rattle, and will eventually cause a leakage if neglected. - R.A.C. V. Hint.

It is not merely excessive use that burns your brake linings when the brakes are being used to retard the car on a long descent. When the brakes are called upon to do heavy work of this character, the drums become hot and expand and the brakes are, in effect applied beyond what the driver believes is the case. It pays to relieve the pressure on the pedal from time o time during such a descent, pecause the driver may not be aware of the fact that the brakes are applying themselves under excessive use. -R.A.C.V.
