FIRST SEMI-FINAL.

BEAUFORT DEFEATS LEXTON.

A memorable game, under favorable weather conditions, the first semi-final of the Lexton League's competition was played at Waurba on Saturday between Lexton and Beaufort, and resulted in a win for Beaufort by 31 points. There was a good attendance, and the gate receipts exceeded £63. The match was well umpired by Wright; the goal umpires being Messrs. A. Jeffrey and A. McKenzie (Ballarat), and the time keepers Messrs. A. McGregor, J. Yawkins, and P. Smith. Lexton team took the field with a small mascot leading them.

At the first change Beaufort led by 13 points, and by half-time had increased their lead to 17 points. At three-quarter time Beaufort had the useful lead of 29 points, and were in a comparatively safe position. Lexton, who were superior to Beaufort in the air, made a determined effort to retrieve their position in the last quarter and obtained 5-2 to Beaufort's 5-4; the scoring being close enough to make the game very interesting half-way through the term but Beaufort thereafter registered four goals straight and placed the result beyond doubt. It was a strenuous hard-fought game, in which both teams put all they were capable of.

BEAUFORT'S EARLY LEAD.

In the first quarter Beaufort had six scoring shots to three. Lexton drew first blood; Joe Briody registering a behind with a free. Cole got two frees within easy distance of goal, but was unable to score for Beaufort. Allen passed to Cole, but the Lexton back man marked the latter's shot. Beaufort kept attacking; the strong Lexton back line holding. Following nice work by Ferguson, Morris, and K. Morvell, the latter secured a behind for Beaufort. Lexton made a thrust and, a meritorious mark by Bates and handball by the Beaufort side held them up. The ball was forced to the other end, and Morvell snapped a behind for Beaufort. A snapshot by Jack Briody gave Lexton a behind. Morvell's shot was marked in the goal mouth by the Lexton back man. Morvell was given a free, and he scored Beaufort's first goal. M. Bradley was repeatedly conspicuous for excellent work on the Lexton back line. Sandlant placed Cullinan in possession, and that player registered a goal for Lexton. From Morvell and G. Grant the ball was passed to O'Brien, who booted it through the opening for Beaufort's second "sixer" with one of his long-range shots. A slight wind was blowing in Beaufort's favour. Bates was rendering splendid service on Beaufort's back line. Morvell placed O'Brien in possession, and a behind for the black and white team was the outcome. Grant passed to O'Brien and the latter to Morris, who goaled for Beaufort. Quarter-time scores: —Beaufort, 3-3; Lexton, 1-2.

BEAUFORT INCREASE THEIR LEAD.

In an evenly-contested second term, Lexton scored six times to five. J. Briody was awarded a free close to the Lexton objective, but did not score; Bates clearing the goal. Soon after, Jack Briody snapped a goal for Lexton. So far the game had not been a good exhibition of football. J. Briody found the opening with a nice kick, but the ball was touched and only a point resulted. Martin was putting in some nice defence work for Beaufort. Morvell secured a behind for the Magpies, who now opened up the play. Lexton obtained a minor point; the ball being forced through by Bates. J. Briody was responsible for another behind for Lexton. The ball was forwarded to Morvell by medium of nice play by several Beaufort men, and then McCracken and Morvell placed G. Grant in possession; the latter responding by scoring the maxi-

mum. Passes by Morvell and Cole gave G. Grant another opportunity, and he goaled for Beaufort. Allen and McCracken forwarded the ball to G. Grant, who scored a single. A snapshot by A. Sandlant gave Lexton a behind. Singles were scored for Beaufort and Lexton by Ferguson and Harrison respectively. Half-time tallies: — Beaufort, 5-6; Lexton, 2-7.

BEAUFORT HAVE GREATER SHARE OF HONOURS IN THIRD QUARTER.

With a lead of 17 points at the outset of the third quarter, Beaufort again scored six times and Lexton four. In the opening minutes M. Bradley was very prominent in Lexton's defence. Ferguson passed to G. Grant, who obtained a behind for Beaufort. Beaufort kept attacking but their efforts were nullified by the good work of Bradley. Eventually Cole punched the ball through the opening to register a behind for Beaufort. A. Briody placed Black in possession, and he scored a single for Lexton; J. Briody immediately duplicating it. O'Brien passed to G. Grant, who marked smartly and goaled for Beaufort. Lexton replied with a goal snapped by Joe Briody. Cole and Grant forwarded the ball to Clark, who scored the maximum for Beaufort. Beaufort made an ineffective attack and again opened up the play. Jack Briody's snapshot gave Lexton another goal. Bates and S. McCracken were often in the picture on Beaufort's back line. S. Clark registered two goals for the black and white side in succession; one being the result of a nice, low shot. Beaufort again attacked, and K. Briody checked them. A good, straight shot by Morvell was rendered by K. Briody just before it reached the target. At three-quarter-time the scores were: — Beaufort, 9-8; Lexton, 4-9.

LEXTON'S SUPREME EFFORT.

Beaufort led by 29 points at the last change, and Lexton made a supreme effort to retrieve their position, and at one stage had a possibility of succeeding. They scored 5-2 to Beaufort's 5-4 for the term. Early in the quarter Clark got a goal for Beaufort. Lexton took the ball to their end, but Martin applied the check. L. Karlslake secured a goal for Lexton with a low-flying shot. The pace was now on properly. With an accurate, long-range kick, Jack Briody goaled for Lexton. Jack Briody passed to Brother Joe, who gave H. Harrison an opportunity; the latter responding with another goal. Morris then snapped a behind for Beaufort. Allen passed to Clark, who was in an advantageous position, but could only manage a behind. Sandlant and Karlslake forwarded the ball to Harrison, who kicked a goal for Lexton, whose stocks had risen considerably. Then Beaufort took a hand. From a free McCracken passed to Clark, who was responsible for a goal for Beaufort. Sandlant had to leave the field owing to injury. With a mighty kick D. McCracken put a goal on the board for Beaufort. Pulling down a nice mark, G. Grant added another "sixer." Ferguson passed to Clark, who again registered a goal for Lexton; Joe Briody securing another. R. Grant marked the next Lexton shot in the goal-mouth. Jim Briody goaled for Lexton. Before the bell rang, Clark and O'Brien had added behinds to the Beaufort tally. Final scores: — Beaufort, 14-12 (96); Lexton, 9-11 (65).

OBITUARY

MRS. EMILY S. AUSTIN.

Mrs Mary Susan Hamilton Austin, who passed away at Wodonga on August 27, was the widow of the late Mr E. G. Austin, of Borriyalook, Skipton.

MR. J. C. WARE.

The death occurred on August 29 at Sandringham, of Mr John Charles Ware, of Yalla-Y-Poora. Mr Ware, who was 85 years of age, leaves a son, daughter, and granddaughter. His wife predeceased him.

Mr Ware (writes the "Ararat Advertiser") was a very old resident, whose family had been connected with the pastoral industry in the Ararat district since the pioneering days. Yalla-Y-Poora, Tatpoo, one of the oldest runs in the Western District comprised 60,000 acres when it was first taken up by Stevens and Thompson in 1841. Later it was acquired by J. C. Ware and then by his brother, John Ware, who left the property to his son, John Charles Ware. When John Ware came to Yalla-Y-Poora the place was practically a wilderness, but owing to his pioneering work, it became one of the finest pastoral properties in the State. The Yalla-Y-Poora flock, one of the most noted merino studs in Australia, won fame for this district and held the world records for the 1920, 1921 and 1922 clips.

Mr J. C. Ware was born at Yalla-Y-Poora and was educated at Geelong College and in England. For some years he was a member to the Ararat Shire Council, but since retiring from the active management of the station, he has lived in Melbourne, and his home was at Murrilee, Sandringham. In his young days he played polo and had a fair measure of success on the turf with his horses. Although, especially of late years, he was not a very frequent visitor to Ararat, Mr Ware was keenly interested in the town and district and a generous contributor to local appeals for patriotic funds or other worthy causes. The interment took place at the Springvale Crematorium after a service at the Bathurst Memorial Chapel, conducted by the Rev. A. McMeekin.

"STUMPY" PERSONALITIES.

TWO young actors who have recently broken into A.B.C. play productions in Sydney are Ben Gabriel and Eileen Crennan, who play Kenny McCrae and his girl-friend, Kitty Cooper, in "Stumpy." Ruth Park's new serial of life in the semi-urban town of Yalla-Y-Poora is broadcast on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at 6.45 p.m. over the A.B.C. Interstate Network.

The son of well-known radio actress, Ethel Gabriel, 28-year-old Ben served for six years in the A.I.F. A member of the 6th Division, he was among the first Australians to go to England. Later he transferred to the 9th Division, and served in Tobruk, Alamein, New Guinea and Borneo.

Before the war he worked as a radio technician, spending his spare time acting with repertory theatres and studying singing. Some time after he returned to Australia, he had an audition with the A.B.C. and broke straight into radio. He was recently heard as the narrator in the play, "As Ye Sow."

Ben intends to carry on with his repertory work, and he is also concentrating on studying singing. He is a bass-baritone, and his greatest ambition is to become a concert singer. Ben feels that acting and singing are very much akin, and one helps the other—singing training naturally improves the speaking voice, and stage work helps in the presentation of songs, and both help the artist in the command of an audience. As an example of this, Ben quotes the wonderful stage presence of John Charles Thomas. Of quiet appearance, Ben dislikes the outlandish clothes often affected by radio actors, and dresses neatly in lounge-suit, collar and tie. Conscientious, he says that studying singing and acting absorbs most of his time and that he now has few outside interests.

Vivacious Eileen Crennan, who plays opposite Gabriel in "Stumpy," moved to Sydney from Melbourne some months ago to try her luck in radio. She earned considerable praise for her recent appearance as the Irish girl, Many Ann McBride, in Ruth Park's A.B.C. play, "Far from the Land."

Of Irish descent, Eileen easily slips into the brogue, and says that the role of Many Ann was practically the story of her own grand-uncle, educated, Eileen began dramatic acting in Melbourne with Lee Murray. For two years she did announcing with a commercial station, and then she began to freelance as an actress. In between times she went on a stage tour to Tasmania with Dot Rankin and John Fraser.

During the war she worked as a chemist's assistant in the Commonwealth Serum Laboratories, still acting in her spare time. Some of her appearances in A.B.C. plays since she has resided in Sydney include parts in "The Old Foolishness" and "Campbell of Kilmorie," also, for a while she played Sylvia Jordan in "The Lawsons."

Eileen loves riding and country life. She is also keenly interested in anything Irish, and is an enthusiastic student of Irish folk lore. She also likes writing verse and short stories.
