The main rea-Men -- Captain's team won by son was in case of accident-to get in touch with parents or a doctor. Such a thing might happen here, the same as anywhere else. The Department, he thought, would not do anything in the matter at all, and Mothers' Clubs paid for official calls. This school was a centre for scholarship and teachers' examinations, and if papers were not set properly, a telephone would enable them to get in touch with the Department or inspector promptly and get the matter rectified.

> The chairman agreed that a telephone was essential, but the point was the cost of installation. Mr Davey also spoke in support, and said that he understood next year the Education Department would supply the children with milk for morning cocoa, which would save the Mothers' Club £30. If that were so, the Club would not mind a few pounds for the telephone.

It was decided to write to the Education Department, asking for permission to install a telephone, and enquiring whether they contributed to installation, rental, and official calls.
