



## LABOR PARTY

#### RIPON ELECTORATE.

THE PREMIER (HON. JOHN CAIN) AND MR E. MORTON, M.L.A., AT BEAUFORT.

The best attended and most enthusiastic Labor meeting held at Beaufort for many years was that at the Picture Theatre on Thursday night, when the spea-kers were Mr E. Morton, M.L.A. Labor candidate for Ripon, and the Premier of Victoria (Hon. John Cain). About 250 electors were present, and both speakers were given an attentive hearing. Mr E. Power (president local A.L.P.) presided At the outset of his address, Mr Morton, M.L.A., referred to ccertain promises made two years ago when he asked electors for their support for himself and the State Labor Govern-ment. Those promises had been carried out to the best of his ability. Soon after the Government was returned to Parliament they honored the promise of an inde pendent tribunal for the public service, and if elected again would do their best to further improve the conditions of the public servants of Victoria. The teachers had also been given an independent tribunal and the conditions in the Education Department improved. In this ectorate alone £15,223 had been spent for the benefit of education, in new schools and school residences and repairs to school buildings, and in addition bus services had been extended to give country children the opporinity of secondary education. Formerly members of the police orce were not allowed to attend interstate conferences or join a political party but these inhibi tions had now been removed. Two years ago, Mr Morton coninued, practically nothing had been done to re-habilitate soldiers on the land. The Government immediately set to work. I took a lot of time to get such a vast organisation functioning and he was proud and happy to say that in the Ripon electorate along the present Government had purchased 83,000 acres in six estates to settle 90 soldiers. The latest acquisition was Langi-Kal-Kal. 27,500 acres, and five other estates were under consideration.
